The President's Message at the opening of Congress on Monday last is interesting to us, seeing that we divide with the United States the great continent of North America.

On the foreign relations of the Republic, the President ventures to hope that the apparent obstacles confronting the efforts of the U. S. Minister to Chili, in the interests of peace, may eventually be overcome...

Referring to the finances of the country, he states that the surplus revenue was \$145,544,000; total increase in net revenue over the previous year, \$42,743,000; total net revenue \$403,525,000. The balance of trade in favor of the United States, despite the increased imports, was nearly \$26,000,000.

To adjust more evenly the balance between revenue and expenditure, the President suggests a reduction of internal taxes; but his language is indefinite with respect to the revision of the Customs Tariff.

From the fact that the three per cents rule at a premium, the President suggests that the time is ripe for legislation which will enable the Treasury to further continue to refund the debt.

Regarding the important question of Civil Service Reform, the President favours the elevation of the Civil Service, and some plan which will improve it by giving a more stable tenure.

The receipts of the Republic for next year are estimated at fifty million; expenses, forty-six million.

ADDRESS.

To Mr. Henry Lawson, late Editor of the Patriot.

We doubt not that in the future, as in the past, your powerful pen will be enlisted, whenever occasion requires, in behalf of the best interests of the people of your native Isle.

CONVICTIONS.—Before William Heard, Alex. Hayden, and James Curtis, Esq's, J. P's., on the 5th inst. LAST night an attempt was made to burglarize the store of Mr. David Chappell, on the corner of Prince and King Streets. The cellar hatch on King Street side, which had been spiked down and closed for the winter, was torn up. The inside grating was broken and the thieves thus entered the cellar. They then endeavored to raise the cellar hatch in the shop floor, but were unable to do so, and therefore had to leave the premises without any spoils.

An attempt was also made last night to enter the residence of Miss Morris, on Water Street. The thieves broke the window of the store-room, which is in the rear of the house, but the noise alarmed the household, and a shot from a pistol dispersed the robbers.

Current Notes.

The National Policy was to have killed the lumbering industry, yet the Ottawa lumber men alone have cut and sold 800,000,000 feet of lumber during the past season.

From the port of Liverpool during the month of October, emigration was 4,407 less than in the corresponding month last year, when no fewer than 20,155 persons left the Mersey.

Customs returns from Halifax, Montreal, St. John, and Toronto show an increase over November, 1881, of \$70,512, and excise returns from Montreal, Ottawa, and St. John of \$27,923.

The Australian dependencies of England consist, as is well known, of five totally distinct colonies (not including the adjacent islands of Tasmania and New Zealand), each of which has a distinct English Viceroy or Governor, distinct executive and legislative councils, and widely differing taxation and tariff systems. There is even a break of gauge on the Australian railways, when one crosses the Murray—Victoria having the "broad" (5 feet 3 inches) and New South Wales the "narrow" (4 feet 8 1/2 inches) gauge—whence passing into Queensland the lines have the still narrower (3 feet 6 inches) gauge. The most advanced democratic section of Victorian politicians have adopted federation as a plank in their new platform, and are now agitating for the federation of the colonies and the foundation of the Australian Dominion.
