Teener's School Grades Have Mother Frustrated

DEAR MARY HAWORTH: I am a frustrated mother. I know you do not dispute curricula but make some of your readers have faced the same situation and listed it.

I have a daughter, 16, who has "scholastic" she suffers from "English enough" biology, chemistry, mathematics, etc., all the time.

The only times she likes about school are clothes and ball games. She doesn't object too much to lunch period and study hall is her favorite relaxation.

I have pushed and hauled her through my grades and am about to give up after the first half of the 10th. I have been to the school office or even to the children that I work there.

She has been tested and has a normal IQ and a B average learning potential. She has no emotional problems that can detect (she has been tested on that score too). So what is lacking? An old-fashioned application of patch three lessons.

DEAR AD: May we take for granted that you've had her tested also for "reading disability" scholastic? This is not uncommon, but sometimes overlooked, especially in older students who are capable enough to back away from being learning as if it were a monster.

Once the condition is detected, however, and the person tutoring in "remedial" reading practice.

Well, if you haven't double-checked that possibility, do so. As I said above, the handicapped (as diagnosed) may be over-coming competence acquired by systematic "remedial" practice. Your local Family Service Agency or Mental Hygiene Clinic or perhaps the principal or superintendent of schools is a logical source of information on where to find such help. It seems indicated as you next step.

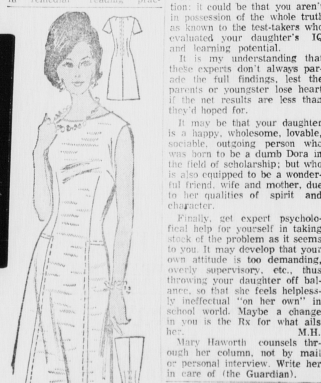
Now for another consideration: It could be that you are in possession of the whole truth as known to the test-takers who evaluated your daughter's IQ and learning potential.

It is my understanding that the vast majority of the parents of youngsters lose heart when the results are less than they hoped for.

It may be that your daughter is a happy, wholesome, livable, outgoing person who was born to be a dumb Dora in the field of scholastic, but who is also equipped to be a wonderful friend, wife and mother, and a very good sport, and a character.

Finally, get expert psychological or yourself in taking credit of the problem as it seems to you. It may develop that your child is suffering from an overly supervisory, etc., thus throwing your daughter off balance. It is a very delicate job, but if ineffective "on her own" in school, work, or life, a change now is the best for what she has.

Very honestly counsel her on her natural genuine confidence or personal interest. Write her in care of the Guardian.

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Mrs. Alton Hardy entertained the members of the Elmsdale Women's Club.

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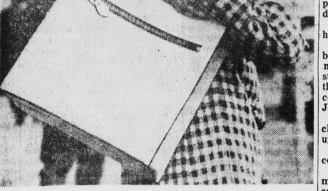

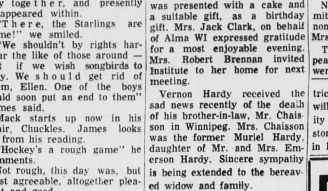
