

LIBERAL-CONSERVATIVE CONVENTION. A Large Representation. Delegates from all parts of the Country. Hon. L. C. Owen in the Chair. Sympathy with Hon. J. C. Pope. BRECKEN & JENKINS Unanimously Nominated SIR JOHN'S POLICY ENDORSED

HON. L. C. OWEN was called to the chair. DR. McNEILL, of New London, in a few well-chosen words, moved the following resolution, which was seconded by T. W. Beers, Esq., and carried unanimously:— "Whereas, We, the Liberal-Conservative delegates of Queen's County, in convention assembled, learn with deep regret of the continued illness, which has laid aside the Leader of our party, the Hon. James C. Pope, Minister of Marine; and we take this opportunity of expressing our high appreciation of his many services to our country and party, and we trust, under the guiding hand of Providence, his health may yet be so restored that he may be able to take part in the public duties for which he was so eminently adapted.

HON. DONALD FERGUSON moved, seconded by William Haslam, Esq., and carried unanimously.

Whereas, The Government of Sir John McDonald have faithfully redeemed the pledges made to the electors previous to the election of 1875; and

Whereas, The measures the Government have passed have encouraged and developed the agricultural, manufacturing and commercial interests of this Dominion;

Therefore Resolved, That we the Conservative Delegates of Queen's County, in convention assembled, desire most earnestly and heartily to express our confidence in the administration of the Right Hon. gentleman, and to put on record our cordial approval of the National Policy, which in our judgment is calculated to greatly foster and promote the industries of our Canadian home. We also heartily approve of the policy of the Government on the question of the Pacific Railway and the North West Territory, believing as we do that that policy is in the highest degree conducive to the welfare of the whole Dominion, and we earnestly hope that the Right Hon. gentleman may long be spared in health and strength to lead the Government, and mould the destinies of a great and free people. The following gentlemen were then put in nomination, viz:—

FREDK. BRECKEN, ESQ., DR. JENKINS, DONALD MONTGOMERY, ESQ.

A short discussion followed. Delegates from all points of the County took part. It appeared that Mr. Montgomery's name had not been generally canvassed in connection with the nomination, and that a very large proportion of the Delegation had been instructed to vote for Dr. Jenkins. The friends of Mr. Montgomery, therefore, withdrew his name; and BRECKEN and JENKINS were unanimously and enthusiastically nominated the Liberal-Conservative candidates for Queen's County.

It is a most gratifying fact that while several gentlemen spoke in high terms of Mr. Montgomery, his attainments and capabilities, and while a large majority expressed themselves strongly attached to Dr. Jenkins, there was but one unanimous voice for Mr. Brecken, who, in the absence of the Hon. J. C. Pope, has borne in Parliament the honorable responsibility of representing Queen's County.

Messrs. Brecken and Jenkins, having been informed of the decision of the Convention, briefly expressed their thanks, and said that they would be able to speak at length in the Market Hall this evening.
