## The Rights of Cats.

PORTLAND, Me., Nov. 21.—A unique case was tried before Justice Bonney in the superior court yesterday. It was a suit to determine the rights of cats. The plaintiff claimed that the defendant shot two of her cats wantonly and willfully, and wanted to know if he had the right to do this. The defendant admitted that he shot the cats, but he claimed they were on his premises in the act of killing his chickens at the time of the shooting. The court ruled as a matter of law, that the defendant had no right to shoot the cats unless he was compelled to use that amount of force in order to save his chickens at that particular time from being killed. Verdict for defendant.

## Big or Small Powers.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—Most of the powers have given an emphatic refusal to the claims of the smaller states for a voice in the Chinese settlement and incidentally to a share in whatever spoils may be divisible. It is understood before he retired from the Foreign Office, Lord Salisbury showed some disposition to entertain favorably the Dutch demand on the grounds that as a Far Eastern power Holland really had some position in China.

The British Premier's attitude is somewhat remarkable in view of Holland's action and sympathies in connection with the war in South Africa, and there is a disposition here to connect it with some secret understanding after the manner in which ex-President Kruger is to be dealt with at the Hague.

## EAST QUEEN'S DECLARATION.

THE declaration proceedings in East Queen's, yesterday, were adjourned by returning officer Morrison until Monday next, on one of the most extraordinary reasons that it is possible to imagine. The election law requires every deputy returning officer at the close of the poll to make out a statement of the result according to a form given in a schedule to the act. This statement must be made in triplicate copies, which copies are to be disposed of as follows, one copy is to remain attached to the poll book, one copy is to be retained by the deputy returning officer, and the remaining copy is to be enclosed by him in an envelope WHICH HE SHALL SEAL, and deposit in the ballot box. The poll book is, with the ballots and other documents in separate sealed envelopes, placed in a large envelope and also deposited in the ballot box. On declaration day the returning officer shall add together the number of votes given for each candidate from the statements contained in the several ballot boxes. It will be observed that there should be two statements in each ballot box, one in a separate envelope and the other attached to the poll book. In several instances yesterday it was found that the deputy returning officer had neglected to deposit the statements in the separate envelopes. In one instance the poll book was not in an envelope and the statement was found attached and counted. In two other instances where no statements were found in separate envelopes, the returning officer was asked to open the envelope containing the poll book and act on the statements attached to it. But he refused to do so, giving as the sole reason that the law did not tell him to open an envelope,—and he thereupon adjourned the proceedings to enable the defaulting deputies to be on hand to give the state of the poll at their respective polls. Mr. Morrison could not have considered the ludicrous position he was putting himself in, and which he now occupies. The law ordered him to add together the number of votes given from the statements in the box. Both of these statements were in sealed envelopes. One was as much a statement as the other. The law did not tell him, it is true, that in order to get at it it would be necessary to open the envelope. But every one with a grain of common sense knows that, to see the return, that was necessary. It is to be noted that whilst there are two original statements in the box, the election act does not prescribe which one the returning officer is to look at,—the inference being clear that he is to act on either, and if, by neglect, only one has been put in, then to act on that one.

It would be well if the deputy returning officers and returning officers, also, would bear in mind that under the 20th section of the act every returning officer, deputy returning officer, election clerk or poll clerk who refuses or neglects to perform any of the obligations or formalities required by the act, shall for each such refusal or neglect forfeit \$200. In the present case, there appears to have been a neglect of two deputy returning officers to send a second statement, and there appears to be a refusal on the part of a returning officer to open envelopes containing poll books to ascertain if a statement was attached to them.

## Local and Other Items

—A London despatch says the second half of the first contingent reached London yesterday. All well.

—W. J. White, superintendent of immigration agencies, says sixty thousand immigrants settled in the Canadian Northwest this year.

—The Halifax will make her last trip from Boston on the 24th and from Charlottetown on the 27th. Shippers and importers should make a note of this.

—It is thought that fifty thousand turkeys will be shipped from Ontario to England for the Christmas trade. Three thousand were received at Toronto on Tuesday.

—Georgetown District of the Provincial Sunday School Association will hold a convention in the Presbyterian Church at Cardigan on December 1st. An interesting programme has been prepared.

—It is said that about seventy-five thousand dollars were placed in Cape Breton County alone to compass the defeat of Tupper and MacDougall. It is a lamentable fact that merit was defeated and mammon won.

—Mrs. Benj. Byers fell over McMillan's wharf last night, and were it not for the prompt action of the captain of the Elliott and some others might have been drowned. It is said that the unfortunate woman was under the influence of liquor.

—It is a significant fact that no less than 59 new post offices were opened in Canada during the month of October, more than one-half being in the Maritime Provinces and Quebec. The number in each province was: Nova Scotia, 17; Quebec, 11; New Brunswick, 10; Ontario, 10; North West Territories, 6; Manitoba, 5; Prince Edward Island 1.

—James Gormley, awaiting trial in the Supreme Court for assaulting Simon Joseph, was this morning, by order of a judge of the Supreme Court, admitted to bail himself in the sum of \$150 and two sureties each in the sum of \$150. The recognizance was entered into before F. L. Haszard, Esq., and Mr. H. V. Palmer, J. P.

—The Ottawa Journal, one of the most progressive newspapers in Canada, has taken another advance step. It has just installed a three-roll Hoe perfecting press, capable of turning out twenty-four thousand complete newspapers each hour, printed, cut, folded and counted. The new press is said to be one of the largest and fastest machines in the Dominion. This is the fourth new press the Journal has had to buy during the past fifteen years in order to keep up with the times.

—The fall arrangement of trains on the Island Railway will take effect on Monday next. The express for the west will leave Charlottetown at 7.35 a. m., and the freight at 4.10. The train for Cape Traverse will leave at 6 p. m. The freight train from Summerside will arrive in Charlottetown at 10.40 a. m., and the freight from Tignish at 1.50. The express from the west will be due at 10.10 p. m. The express for the east leaves Charlottetown at 8 a. m., and the freight train at 3 p. m. The express from the east arrives in Charlottetown at 10 a. m., and the freight at 4.50 p. m. Trains from the east do not connect at Royalty Junction in the morning. Local time is used above.
