Notes and Comments.
—The steady drain of gold from the United States to Europe is causing more or less uneasiness among our neighbors as to the monetary future. In less than two and one-third months the total gold has decreased nearly \$30,000,000, the gold owned \$14,800,000, and the gold balance, exclusive of the hundred million reserves, has fallen from \$25,815,040 to \$11,071,257. At no time since resumption has the balance been so small, and it is steadily decreasing.

—The Montreal Gazette remarks that there is significance and a moral in the fact that the American public men most active in pressing forward measures of retaliation against Canada are the friends and sympathizers of the Liberal party. Mr. Hill, who is ready to father any scheme likely to injure the Dominion, and as he thinks, bring about annexation, was the ally of the Liberal party in the unrestricted reciprocity movement, and there is good reason to believe that he and Sir Richard Cartwright perfectly understood each other in the game.

—The new British House of Commons contains 21 bankers and financiers, 144 barristers in and out of practice, 18 brewers and distillers, 2 builders and architects, 15 colliery proprietors, 8 diplomats, 9 civil and marine engineers, 10 farmers and agriculturists, 83 landowners, 10 iron-masters and metal merchants, 15 labor representatives, 57 manufacturers, 10 doctors, 55 general merchants, 1 ex-minister of religion, 35 newspaper proprietors and journalists, 34 peers sons and brothers, 18 retired business men, 19 ship owners, 21 solicitors, 4 stockbrokers, 9 university professors, 53 naval and military officers and 13 members unclassified.

—Instead of sending Mr. Cleveland a formal letter of his nomination as candidate for the Presidency, the Democratic national committee adopted this year a new plan, and it worked well. There was a great notification meeting at the Madison Square Garden on Thursday evening last, at which eighteen thousand persons attended, or tried to attend. They came from all parts of the union. "It was," says the New York Herald, "the first time in the history of the country that the candidates of a party have been publicly notified of their nomination." Of course Mr. Cleveland accepted the position given him by his party.

—The withdrawals from the Government savings banks, which have been large and continuous since the establishing of the three and a half per cent rate of interest, are now gradually falling off. In June the amount at the credit of depositors in the Dominion Government savings banks decreased from \$16,683,626 to \$16,669,204, which small reduction would probably be more than made up by the excess of deposits in the postoffice savings banks. This is probably the turning of the tide in savings bank deposits. When the rate was reduced to four per cent., large withdrawals followed for a time. Then the deposits began to rain on the withdrawals, and continued to do so until the Government was offered more money at four per cent. than it could afford to take.

—Father Burke gave his impressions of Canada to a reporter of the Vancouver Daily Telegram as follows:—
"This country has only to be seen," said Father Burke, "to arouse in one's bosom the most supreme contempt for its hiring decriers. Its future seems to me and to all our party a great and prosperous one, should we only go on in the lines we have been following, and frown down effectively political croakers. Our greatness as a nation, unlike so many other countries, is ahead of us, and he who will not see it shuts his eyes to evidences the most convincing. It will take centuries to discover all our varied treasures and develop them as they should be developed. This work under a wise policy must build up and enrich a Canadian Dominion. We have all that makes nations powerful, and why will we not be such? It is all in our own hands, and from what I have seen of Canada, from Prince Edward Island to Vancouver, I am profoundly impressed with its extent and its resources, and satisfied that its citizens are awake to the value of their heritage, and resolved to develop and defend it."

—These sentiments of the reverend and learned gentleman, remarks the Telegram, "were shared in by the whole party, and will find a willing echo, we are sure, in every loyal Canadian heart."

Many years have fled, great changes wrought,
Since your forefathers crossed the main,
In hopes to make themselves a home
On highland, swamp, or plain.
Tree after tree, from towering height,

Grief changed to joy as work proceeded,
Noble children, stood amazed,
To see those laid trees lifted up

Their household furniture was plain—
Nails, black or drab;
Their easy chair was found legs

No table with mahogany top,
No chairs to sit on;
Contented they partook their meals
Just from a home-made block.
No church to edify the old,
No schools to teach the young;
The praises of assembled throng,
They seldom heard them sung.

No doubt, within those wildwood homes
Their children, and their wives,
In course of time His servant came,
And preached four times a year.
Through cold and stormy winter months
Their chopping work was done,
In summer all was logged and cleared,
Beneath a burning sun.
Young noble sons of noble sires,
With all His comforts, wealth
And lands, think how your fathers toiled
For what you now enjoy.
Your stately house of brick or stone,
Shade trees to keep it dark;
Your father's first—a log bog hut,
Covered with birchwood bark.

Your pleasant home affords you much,
Both as to taste and cheer,
But don't forget the brave old man

The Rate of Taxation.
(Montreal Gazette.)

A striking fact in the trade returns of the Dominion for the last fiscal year is the decline in the customs taxation. Whatever criticism may be passed upon some details of the National Policy, it cannot be charged, as presently applied, with imposing any onerous burden of taxation upon the people, and least of all upon the farming class. The abolition of the sugar duties cut down the revenue from that source by \$3,000,000, and to that extent directly benefited the consumers of Canada, who are, also, exempted from taxation upon tea and coffee. The amount of duty collected in 1892 upon an import trade of \$110,476,444 was \$19,122,314, or 17.3 per cent., a rate which can hardly be deemed excessive, but it is by measuring the taxation per head of population that the best idea of the tariff burden is formed. Our population, according to the census, is 4,900,000, so that the customs income of 1892 represented \$3.90 per head. Contrast that rate with preceding years:—

It will be observed that, except in 1877 and 1878, the rate of customs on tariff taxation was less last year than for a very long time past, and less than at any previous period since the introduction of the existing fiscal system; and as respects 1887 and 1888, it is to be borne in mind that the revenue of those years fell below the expenditure, and necessitated an increase of taxation in order to maintain the credit of the country. A customs taxation of \$3.90 per head of population is certainly not excessive, nor can any real or fancied lack of individual prosperity in the community be fairly attributed to this impost. The fixed charges of Government necessitate the collection of some twenty million dollars annually from customs duties, and no matter what the scheme of the tariff may be, taxation to that extent will fall upon the people. What is greatly to the credit of the Government is that it has practiced so close an economy in expenditure, and has so carefully avoided assuming new liabilities, as to have been able to throw off \$3,000,000 of taxation in 1892, without impairing the credit of the Dominion or embarrassing the public finances.
