ENCOURAGEMENT FOR THE FARMERS.

THE SOUTHERN RAILWAY.

To this we reply that if the Southern Railway scheme had been advocated and promoted by Mr. L. H. Davies and Mr. Welsh and their friends with all the earnestness, persistence and ability that have characterized the action of Mr. Hugh Sutherland and others in respect to the Hudson Bay Railway, it would have been built and running long ere this.

Senators Ferguson and Prosser, Mr. Martin, Mr. Macdonald and others have now taken the matter in hand and have already made some progress. Why is the independent (?) Guardian not striving to strengthen their position? The tactics of the Guardian are calculated to promote distraction and distrust, and if successful, to result in disappointment.

As to the Hudson Bay Railway, it appears that the Parliament of Canada some years since approved of granting \$5,400 acres of land per mile and the payment of \$30,000 a year for twenty years, in aid of its construction.

A LESSON TO BE TAUGHT.

Thou art deprived of the lamented Mercier and compelled by the force of circumstances to relegate the ingenious Wiman to their "Secret Service," the conspirators who aim at the absorption of Canada by the United States are still active.

"The recent resolution of the New York Legislature in favor of the annexation of Canada to the United States is believed to be a party of annexationists who are trying to get money in this country to push their programme."

"Those who are on the inside of Canadian politics declare that behind the movement is an interesting story. It is said that Mr. Tarte, of the Canadian Parliament, accredited by ex-Premier Mercier, of Quebec, and accompanied by a delegation of Canadian representatives to New York in the fall of 1893 to see if a campaign fund could not be raised there to put the question of annexation, they said, fairly before the Canadian rural constituency."

"After the departure of Tarte and his compatriots one of the men who had agreed to look after the financial end of the new international alliance concluded that he would make some independent and confidential inquiries in Canada to ascertain if Messrs. Mercier, Tarte & Co. might be trusted with the disbursement of the annexation fund, and whether their political influence was sufficient to put the question of annexation effectively before the Canadian electorate."

"Mr. Tarte, it is stated, then organized a movement on Washington which brought out some complimentary expressions of good will from a few prominent statesmen. The passage of the annexation resolution in the New York Legislature is thought to be the beginning of a third attempt to secure contributions for the annexation policy, and the result will be watched with interest."

"The mystery of the impertinent action of the Legislature of New York is thus revealed. The knavish tricks of the conspirators are, for the nonce, confounded, but their ingenuity is wonderful. Another and perhaps more successful scheme will, without doubt, be adopted ere long. The people of Canada will never be free from the menace to their cherished institutions which exists in the annexation organization until they have shown by the decisive defeat of the Liberal party that its efforts cannot possibly be successful. Rightly or wrongly—but upon grounds which seem to be good—the statesmen and people of the United States have come to regard the party led by Mr. Laurier and Sir Richard—

THE CHINA-JAPAN TROUBLE.

The London News correspondent in Berlin says: "Japan has not yet answered the triple protest. The statement that a more vigorous protest is impending appears to be unfounded, or at all events, premature."

"The London Standard's Vienna correspondent writes: 'The Vienna correspondent in Tokyo believes a settlement could be effected by Russia's restoring Saghalien to Japan and China's compensating Russia with Manchuria. The Standard's Vienna correspondent quotes a despatch from the St. Petersburg correspondent of the Spoliathe Correspondence to the effect that Russia has reason to hope that Japan will consider seriously the protest against Saghalien. His comment is: 'My own information does not confirm the optimistic view. I hear Japan declares it impossible to yield to Russia's demand and in preferring accordingly for complications. She has placed large orders for war material in several European countries. She is acquiring warships, mainly small swift destroyers from European and American builders. Nevertheless, I think such vessels can be delivered the great question has been decided that no respite shall be allowed China regarding the ratification of the treaty. Her action as regards China will be prompt and decisive. The march upon Peking will begin the moment the armistice expires. Russia's claim will be politely set aside. It will then be imperative that the allies bring matters to an end.'"

"The London Standard's correspondent in Paris says: 'The general expression of hostility at France's assisting to coerce Japan has had a salutary effect. Now it is meant to be purely diplomatic and expostulatory, to cover retreat from an untenable position. It is announced that Japan is willing to make concessions in the Kuriles. I think the time of ratification. When the deputies reassemble on the 14th the government will be asked what course has been adopted in the east. I think the answer will be to the effect that the interference was intended to be purely diplomatic.'"

"A special from Tokio to the New York paper says China has asked for an extension of ten days for ratifications of the treaty of peace. Japan has sternly refused to grant the request. The Mikado has called out the entire mass of reserves and the garrisons of Hokkaido have been fully reinforced. Another despatch from the same place says the government of Italy has offered to join the United States in an effort to avert by mediation the threatened conflict between Japan and the three European powers which protest against the ratification of the treaty of peace because it provides for ceding to Japan the Leontor peninsula."

"A despatch from Shanghai to the London Globe says the Chinese with the view of preventing the Japanese from entering Peking, have cut out the embankment of the Peiho and flooded miles of the country. Hundreds of persons were caught in the rushing waters and drowned."

"The Berlin Cologne Gazette says it is able to contradict the statement that the protesting powers are not united upon the question of Japan's accession of Chinese mainland territory. The protestors, it says, 'must have recourse to energetic action, and are resolved to obtain their demands. We advise Japan to comply with their demands without delay.'"

"The London Times correspondent in Shanghai says the emperor has commanded Li Hung Chang to come to Peking to consult with him as to the ratification of the treaty. Certain ministers and princes have petitioned the emperor to pay a vasty indemnity instead of ceding Manchuria. Fuchien officials have drawn up a memorial protesting against the cession of Formosa and offering to contribute to a redemption fund. The emperor intends to fight to the death sooner than surrender Manchuria. It appears certain that Russia has hatched her ultimatum to Japan. The Times correspondent in Odessa reports in Odessa that Russia has made every preparation for war, and is quite ready to mobilize for hostilities against Japan in case Japan does not comply with her demands."

RATS ON THE WARPATH.—A Richibucto correspondent of the St. John Sun says: An array of rats have been getting in some destructive work at Richibucto, twelve miles north of here. They attacked two large pigs belonging to George Raymond, devouring one and nearly killing the other. Another night they entered the same premises and made away with a whole barrel of pork. They gained entrance into the McLeod store which is unoccupied, and feasted on eleven hundred pounds of tallow. Several households have had to get up at night and fight them off. The number of them can be judged best by the fact that where they passed over snow the track was several feet wide and beaten down smooth. The people are unable to account for their visitors which have since left the neighborhood."
