TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Diplomatic Relations.
LONDON, Jan. 6.
The Times' Lisbon correspondent says: Another note from the Marquis of Salisbury was delivered to-day. It is believed that this note threatened that unless prompt satisfaction is given for Serpa Pinto's action there will be an immediate rupture of diplomatic relations. The Cabinet immediately convened. Senor Gomes was charged to answer at once. The Portuguese claims and pretences were ignored somewhat cavalierly in the Marquis of Salisbury's former note. A despatch from Pielto to the Standard says that the Portuguese Government have employed German engineers to lay a torpedo wire in the Tagus in view of possible action by a British fleet.

Fatal Accident.
ANTIGONISH, N. S., Jan. 6.
Annie McDonald, daughter of Donald McDonald, Middle South River, fell or jumped from the west bound express to-day, about half a mile east of Antigonish, and was instantly killed. It is supposed that the girl thought Antigonish, her destination, was passed, as the conductor shouted "Antigonish" just before she left her seat. She was followed by a passenger, but by the time he reached the platform she had disappeared. She was observed to fall from the train by some men who were working on a bridge, one of whom brought word to Antigonish station.

Convention.
ST. JOHN, N. B., Jan. 6.
The convention of supporters of the Local Government was held to-night to select candidates for the approaching election. Ex-Mayor Thorne and John H. Parkes were chosen as candidates for the city, and Hon. D. McLellan, M. Quinton, H. L. Sturdee and W. B. Carvill for the county. The meeting was a large and enthusiastic one.

Municipal Elections.
OTTAWA, Jan. 6.
Municipal elections took place throughout Ontario to-day. In Ottawa very little interest was taken in the contests. Mayor Erratt was elected by twelve hundred majority over W. B. Lewis. In Toronto E. F. Clarke was returned by fifteen hundred majority.

Russia Interferes.
BERLIN, Dec. 6.
It is re-affirmed that Russia has sent a circular note to all the powers that signed the treaty of Berlin in regard to the violation of article 24 of the treaty by the present condition of affairs in Bulgaria, particularly by the pretended sovereignty of Prince Ferdinand.

The Queen Indisposed.
LONDON, Jan. 6.
It is officially announced that Her Majesty the Queen, while able to perform the ordinary duties of her position, has lately been suffering a great deal with rheumatism and it will be impossible for her to undergo the fatiguing exposure of opening Parliament in person.

A Waste of Money.
NEW YORK, Jan. 6.
District-Attorney Felton said to-day that he believed it was a waste of public money to try any more hoodlum cases as acquittal or disagreement certainly result in every case. He will not go on with the trials.

Judge Brewer Sworn In.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.
Judge David Brewer was sworn in as Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States at noon to-day. He immediately took his seat upon the bench.

Appointment of Queen's Counsels.
OTTAWA, Jan. 6.
Thirty-seven legal gentlemen belonging to Ontario, Manitoba and the Northwest, have just been appointed Queen's Counsels.
