## THE GRAND OLD FLAG.

### [From the Toronto Mail.]

"From battle, murder and sudden death -  
-good Lord deliver us!" Duty doing congregations by the hundred, with headless eyes and remorseless hearts, listen to these solemn words on Sunday, with no emotion save that of amazement, and with many a unlearned by the many, for the few they had a terrible meaning. Good enough cause in these to remember that day - the 25th of October, the twentieth anniversary of the battle of Balaklava, and the twenty-first anniversary of the "Charge of the Light Brigade!"

There is in England at any rate one spot where these direful days are marked, and that with real solemnity - the care and love of England towards those who have bled for her. There, indifferent or only passively interested as the outside world may be, the empty sleeves, the missing legs, the empty boots, the empty hats, the empty faces, the empty hearts, and among its inmates many a gray moustache can tell, eye and show too, what curious patterns a "Rooshian" bullet or sabre can work into the human body.

The English commander by Lord Raglan, and the French under General Canrobert, together with a small and almost worthless force in reference to Balaklava, which by virtue of its natural situation - a high abrupt mountain range overtopping the plain - was deemed almost impregnable. To this position was the object of the Russian force. The night previous had been a busy one with them, but so well had they held their own, that the Russian force at half-past seven on the morning of the 25th news was brought in that a strong force of some 30,000 men, under General Ispahani, consisting of infantry, cavalry, and artillery, had crossed the straits of the many gorges of the district, leading from Sebastopol, and was then actually in the valley below the English position.

The alarm given, all was astir. Orders were despatched to the Duke of Cambridge and H. H. ## CORRESPONDENCE.

### TO THE ELECTORS OF THE SECOND LEGISLATIVE DISTRICT OF QUEEN'S COUNTY.

GENTLEMEN - A false and injurious report to the effect that I had at Vernon River, pledged myself to the support of Separate Schools, having on the night previous to the late election been carried to the Protestant public places, and used to my very great prejudice, I deem it due to myself, as well as to you, to make a public statement of the manner in which the School Question was drawn into the contest, leaving you to judge as to whether I have acted as an honorable man.

On the Monday previous to the Election, while canvassing on the Monaghan and Disput Road, where the people were principally Catholics, I was surprised to find that while almost every man was in my favor, scarcely any one would promise to vote at all. This strange indifference was utterly inexplicable to me, until I met a gentleman on my way to a meeting to be held on Piquit Road, who informed me that the Rev. James O'Connell, Parish Priest at Vernon River, had on the previous day, in the Chapel, advised his people not to support either of the Candidates, as they were both understood to be opposed to the claims of Catholics on the School Question. The effect of this advice would fall almost exclusively upon me, as I had strong assurance of support from many leading Catholics in the Parish of Vernon River, while it was well understood that Mr. Munn would receive but very little support from the Catholics of that place. At the meeting subsequently held, I was asked to explain my views on the education question. In reply, I said that I considered myself unfairly dealt with. I was encouraged into the field by Catholics in Vernon River, without any intimation from anybody that the School Question was to be an element in the contest, and now, within two days of the election I am for the first time, asked to declare myself on that question. I declared, however, in the most explicit and emphatic manner, that I was opposed to the establishment of separate schools, that their effect would be to deprive minorities of the benefit of education altogether, that they would promote religious discord, and virtually break up the educational system of the country. I declared further, that I was not, and never had been, of opinion that religion should be eliminated from schools where practical difficulties did not exist, and that in the City of Charlottetown, where the public schools had fallen into disrepair, where highly efficient schools had been established by the Wesleyans, Episcopalians and Roman Catholics, I saw no reason why they should be deprived of public support, if they were so far placed under Government control as to insure the imparting of a good, sound secular education. I added that I was under the impression that nothing but separate schools would satisfy the Catholics, and that the Pastoral of last winter to that effect. A gentleman present referred to a petition and draft of a Bill that had been read in the Chapel, on the previous Sunday, and gave a synopsis of their contents, and I was asked if I would support the prayer of the petition. I replied that I would not promise to support any document that I had not seen, and that if two or three gentlemen expressed themselves favorably to my opinions, while others disapproved of them, and said that if Mr. Munn was present he would probably go the "whole hog," and the meeting broke up. On leaving the school-house, I informed my leading Catholic friends that I was not satisfied with the situation, and that I intended, on the following day, to send my resignation to the different polling places, and publish the reasons which led to my withdrawal.

After leaving the place, however, I was informed that four gentlemen - two supporters of Mr. Munn, and two opponents - had been taken to wait on me. Mr. Munn, and to represent to him the views which the advice given on Sunday, operated against me, and the false position, in which it placed themselves. I met these gentlemen viz. Messrs. M. Grant, John Fraser, David O'Keef and M. Curran, and Mr. George O'Neill, on Tuesday at noon, when they informed me that Mr. Phelan had been misunderstood as he did not mean to advise his people to disfranchise themselves, and that in the event of no candidates agreeing to support the claims of Catholics, they were at liberty to vote for the man they preferred on other grounds. They informed me further that if I would support a petition and draft bill, which they would produce, the Rev. Mr. Phelan would take means to remove the impression that had been created Sunday, and secure for me the undivided support of the parish. I replied that if I signed of my name to any of these documents, I would not subscribe to them, that my canvass had been in the Protestant districts and I would not set in good faith with my Protestant supporters, and that unless I received the Catholic support I was assured of before the preceding Sunday, I would immediately withdraw from the contest. They replied that they would endeavor as far as they were able to remove the impression that had been made with that the conference ended, it being clearly understood that the Catholic support I was to receive would be given on other grounds than the Education Question.

I fearlessly challenged any man, friend or foe, who was present at the Piquit Road meeting or at Mr. O'Neill's, to deny the accuracy of the above statement of facts, and I leave you to judge whether my decision is most judicious and prudent, or whether the false reports which were carried to Piquit Point and other places, had been obtained by honorable means. In conclusion, I leave you to judge whether my decision on the Education Question, and my action at Piquit Road or Mr. O'Neill's, are worthy of the man who has acted with the utmost candor and courtesy for which they have my hearty thanks.

STABLES. - It is a lamentable fact that so little attention is paid to the condition of the buildings in which we keep our cows. Ventilation is something that is entirely overlooked, not so much, I hope, from want of knowledge, as from the want of care on the part of the owner, or from his ignorance of its necessity. Warm, ill ventilated stables will save food, but at the expense of the health of the cow and the quality of the butter. Better the cold, open barn, but there is no need of either. A little study and application will generally enable us to remedy both.

TRINITY THOUGHT. - It is too late to prepare for the rigors of winter when cold weather is upon us. The first frost of the season is most injurious, and the one from the effect of which stock that may be exposed to it does not readily recover.
