HENRY LONGWORTH, Esq., lost two of his most valuable sheep last night. His flock was attacked by dogs, and driven from their shelter in the barn-yard to the fields.

The whole flock was more or less worried, and two fine Ewe's killed outright. Mr. Longworth and his sons heard the noise. They chased the dogs with guns but they escaped unhurt. It is not time that the law relating to dogs running at large without their owners was enforced, the tax on city curs collected and unlawful dogs destroyed? There are in Charlottetown at present hundreds of useless curs, liable at any moment to sneak off and prey on the valuable flocks in the Royal, and if something is not done to exterminate these curs, or keep them safely at home, the loss to our farmers will be great. Mr. Longworth will be obliged to keep his flocks housed at night, besides losing two ewes, which were worth not less than \$40 each.

THE RIEL REBELLION!

Saturday's Fighting.

Attempt to Capture a Gatling.

The Rebels Hold their Position.

OUR TROOPS RETREAT

Troop's Loss—1 Killed and 7 Wounded.

RIEL LOSS HEAVY.

BATOUCHE LANDING, May 9. There was an engagement here to-day, and as shots are still being interchanged, it is not actually ended. The engagement was

NEITHER DECISIVE NOR DISASTROUS, except in this, that the rebels having held their position throughout the day, will regard themselves as victorious.

THE PARTICULARS are as follows: Gen. Middleton left the camp nine miles in the rear and advanced in the following order:

Boulton's scouts, seventy-five men and a gatling gun commanded by Captain Howard, of the Royal Grenadiers.

Two hundred and sixty-two men of the 90th Battalion of Winnipeg.

Two hundred and seventy-five men of the Midland Battalion.

One hundred and sixteen men of "A" Battery with two guns.

Ninety-five men of the Winnipeg Field Battery with two guns.

Sixty men—French scouts—as flankers.

Thirty men, with hospital and ammunition wagons, line the banks of the river.

SCENE OF THE BATTLE. Just behind the settlement is a deep ravine. When nearing Batouche we found the enemy was being engaged by the steamer Northcote.

We met the advance party of the rebels in two houses near the bank of the river. They fired and retreated behind the houses towards a hollow.

The gatling gun was brought to bear on them, when they ran into a house near the Church of St. Laurent.

This was also fired on by the gatling gun, when they ran out into the bushes.

A battery by this time got into position, sending several shells after the rebels.

The Royal Grenadiers dashed into action and got into line, continuing to advance in skirmishing order till the church was reached, when a priest came out

WAVING A WHITE FLAG. Gen. Middleton advanced and shook hands with the priest. Seven other priests and five Sisters of Charity came out of the church. Numbers of half breed children were inside.

Father Martin said the steamer Northcote had arrived above Batouche at 5.30, and the rebels commenced firing on her from both banks of the river. He also said rebels had six killed and twelve wounded at Fish Creek. The Grenadiers still advanced in skirmishing order through the bushes the gatling being pushed forward down the declivity toward Batouche, and now plainly visible in the valley below here, "A" Battery unlimbered on top of the ridge.

SENDING SHELLS INTO THEM, and whilst doing so were almost surprised. A number of the rebels who crept up through bushes were not discovered until twenty yards distant, when they made a rush for our guns, firing and yelling as they ran. Capt. Howard, in charge of the gatling gun saw the danger, and with cool daring ran his gun a couple of yards in front of a battery and opened fire, thus driving the rebels back. On reaching the shelter of the bush they opened fire again and Howard's escape was marvellous, the bullets flying around him, but he gallantly maintained his position. The rebels unable to stand the terrible fire of the gatling gun retreated to retranchments in the ravine. For several hours we tried to drive them out of this ravine without exposing our men very much, but failed, and finally

HAD TO RETREAT from it ourselves. Our men behaved coolly but we have not enough of them. Where the rebels are hidden, one is equal to ten of us, as at Fish Creek. Firing on our part has to be at puffs of smoke, or the locality where the enemy is known to be.

At six p. m., hot fire continues, but without effect. We camp near the battle field to-night. But the rebels continue to occupy their position. The fight will be resumed Sunday.

THE KILLED AND WOUNDED. Our loss was one killed and seven wounded. The killed was Phillip, of "A" Battery. The wounded were,—

Napoleon Carpenter, shot through both legs. Michael Toohy, shot through the thigh. W. Fairbanks, shot through the thigh. Thomas J. Stout, had his ribs broken, being run over by a gun.

All the above belong to Quebec battery. Scout Cook had his left leg broken below the knee.

Scout Allan was shot in the arm. We don't know what the rebel loss was. There were 400 rebels in the fight, 200 on the east side of the river.

A Steamer Foundered in the Gulf.

HALIFAX, May 11. The steamer Helobia, of the White Cross Line, was badly damaged by ice in the Gulf, and foundered while making for Sydney. Her passengers and crew were landed at Hawkesbury by the Allan Line, Str Acadia. The Helobia was from Antwerp to Montreal. She was a sister ship to the Daniel Stuenkel and was commanded by the same Captain who lost that ill-fated ship.

In the trial of Richard Short, for attempting to kill Capt. Phelan in O'Donovan Rossa's office, a New York jury on the 6th, returned a verdict of not guilty. The verdict was a great surprise and as it was given by the foreman, the judge remarked sternly: "Gentlemen, I am much astonished at your verdict. You are discharged from all further service on this panel." The prisoner was then released.

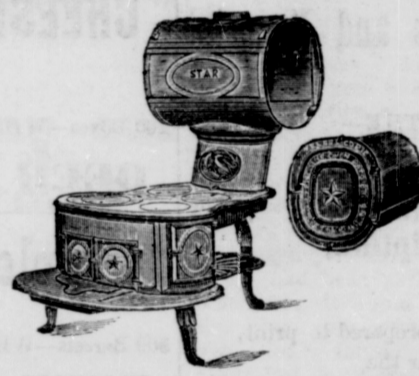
