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Turks Reject Package Deal To Restore Peace In Cyprus

NICOSIA (AP) — Turkish Cypriots rejected Wednesday night a package proposal by President Makarios for a general amnesty and other measures to restore peace to this troubled Mediterranean island.

The Turks only fought to defend life and property from attacks and robbery and other acts as suggested by Makarios. Defence Minister Osman Turker said to accept his offer of an amnesty would amount to an admission of guilt.

The shooting developed between the two Turks in fortified positions and two Greek policemen in a roadside ditch at an abandoned British army camp just north of Nicosia.

Continued from page 1) all-time high and prospects look good for this year. Mr. Harvey told a general session of the Fisheries Council of Canada annual meeting here exports last year were worth \$12,000,000, a 10 per cent increase over 1962, when exports were \$11,600,000.

Reports from overseas trade commissioners indicated that 1964 outlook for fresh and frozen fish appeared "fairly good," he said. It was expected demand for salted groundfish would be strong and quality would be important factor.

Renamed salmon was in demand and might output supply, he said. Mr. Harvey said there was a "keen demand around the globe" for canned sardines and no major difficulty was anticipated in selling the available supply. Demand for fish meal was strong as well as for some fish oils including those made from herring. Synthetic vitamins for fish, however, continued to be in demand for cod liver oil.
