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Catholic Mission of St. Thomas, Palmer Rd.

NOW "IMMACULATE CONCEPTION"

This mission was formerly a portion of Tignish parish and is composed of French and Irish settlers. The French are the descendants of those who removed from River Platte in the old parish of Malpec to Tignish in the year 1799. Those pioneers, when dying, divided their farms among their sons who in their turn shared their inheritance with their numerous olive branches, so that, in time, the farms became too small to yield the means of subsistence to their owners, who accordingly, removed back to the western shore. To the same three sons, Joseph Gaudet, Nazaire Poirier. Pastors of the Immaculate Conception Church at Palmer Road: For some years previous to 1867 Rev. Dugald M. MacDonald, and Rev. Dugald MacIsaac, pastors of St. Simon and St. Jude Church of Tignish, held stations at various homes in the western part of his parish. At that time this was known as the Mission of St. Thomas. In 1867, the first church was built and dedicated to the Immaculate Conception. Father

locality came Irish emigrants from Newfoundland and Ireland. About 1840 Mr. Henry Palmer of Charlottetown, who owned a part of Township One, had a road opened from Nail Pond to Miminigash, which road gave its name to the new settlement. For several years the residents of Palmer Road were obliged to attend Mass in Tignish.

In the year 1867, a resident of the mission, Mr. Richard Noonan, offered a grant of three-quarters of an acre of land for a church site, to Father D. M. MacDonald, the priest of Tignish, the only condition attached being that he was to be exempted from paying a marriage fee.

This offer was readily accepted and the building of the little church of the "Immaculate Conception" was forthwith commenced. At that time there were only twenty-seven families in the parish and they all assisted in the construction of the church which was opened in 1870. It was 64 feet in length by 30 in width and was furnished with large galleries, capable of accommodating a considerable number of persons. But soon, it was much too small to contain the Catholics of the rapidly increasing settlement. The altar was white and gold. At the entrance to the sanctuary were brackets, bearing statues of the Sacred Heart and of the Blessed Virgin. The stations of the Cross were very small, but were very fine old specimens of the engraver's art.

New settlers kept moving into D. M. MacDonald continued as pastor to July 1882. From July 1882 to Jan. 1885: Rev. Azade J. Trudel. From June 1885 to April 1891: Rev. G. A. Picotte. From June 1891 to Sept. 1892: Rev. J. C. MacMillan, D.D. From October 1892 to May 1902: Rev. Jean Chaisson, D.D. From May 1902 to August 1929: Rev. P. C. Gauthier, D.D. From January 1, 1930: Rev. Patrick Walsh, present pastor. Assistant priests have been: Rev. Angus MacDonald, Rev. Fortunals Guay, Rev. P. Sylvestre, Rev. Stephen S. Phelan, Rev. A. E. Burke, Rev. P. J. Hogan, Rev. John F. Johnston, and the present curate, Rev. Emmanuel Richard.

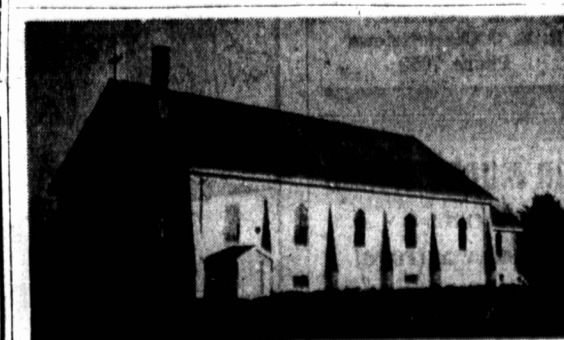
The first church built in 1867 was totally destroyed by fire on May 24, 1890. On January 5, 1891, His Lordship Bishop James Charles MacDonald accompanied by Rev. Dugald M. MacDonald, pastor of Tignish, and Rev. A. E. Burke, pastor

this district and it was not at all uncommon for them to bring their houses with them. One frequently met a long line of carts and truck wagons, loaded with walls, doors, windows, and sections of the roof of somebody's dwelling, which would be put together on the neighbourhoods of its owner. This sort of working party was called a "frolie". It was not until 1878 that a paragon house was begun at Palmer Road. When it was completed in 1882, Rev. A. J. Trudel, in 1885 Father Trudel left the diocese, and was succeeded in Palmer Road, by Rev. G. A. Picotte, a priest of the diocese of Montreal.

First Catholic settlers of the Mission of St. Thomas (now Immaculate Conception) - Palmer Road: Patrick Callaghan, William Shea, Maurice McInnis, John McInnis, John Mockerly, George Kelly, Christopher Cadigan, Simon Luttrell, Francis Arsenault and his

of the Immaculate Conception which was blessed by His Lordship Bishop MacDonald, on August 13, 1893, and placed in the niche of the North tower of the church. The present parish hall was built in 1901. The mission church at Miminigash was begun in 1845 and completed in 1846. The first Mass was said in this church on Christmas Day 1846. On August 20, 1890, it was solemnly blessed by His Eminence Cardinal James McGuigan of Toronto. It was given the title of Notre-Dame de l'Assomption.
