

Summerside Legion Asks For Daylight Saving Time

A resolution to petition the Provincial Government to enact legislation enforcing daylight saving time on P.E.I. this year, was passed at the regular general meeting of the Summerside branch of the Canadian Legion (No. 5) held in the home Monday evening with the president Dr. H.B. MacNeill presiding.

The resolution, proposed by Com. Roland Phillipson states that whereas the railways and the R.C.A.F. Station are going on Day-

light Saving Time (the latter on April 26) that the branch request the Government to enforce legislation to begin D.S.T. not later than April 26th.

Business consisted of the appointment of 10 delegates to the zone rally at Kensington on May 7th; a notice of motion for the next general meeting regarding the new by-laws, and reports from the various commi tee chairmen.

FILM BOARD

Mr. John Martin, district service officer with the National Film Board, Charlottetown, addressed the members at the conclusion of the meeting after being introduced by Com. Alyre Arsenault. Mr. Martin related many of the services of the N.F.B. as they apply to P.E.I. and told of the organizations growth and expansion over the past few years. He stated that 28 film councils have been established in the Province and that last year, 3,342 programs of film were shown to an audience of 190,585.

Mr. Martin stated that one of the Department's biggest tasks at present is assisting various groups and organizations in their informal discussions on films they have just been shown.

Mr. Martin was thanked on behalf of the branch by Com. Francis MacNeill. A film portraying the story of two Hungarian refugees and their flight to freedom was shown later in the lounge.

Six Provinces Will Take Part In Drama Festival

TORONTO (CP)—Two French and six English plays will compete in the Dominion Drama Festival May 20-25 at Edmonton when the festival is held for the first time in Alberta. Six provinces will be represented.

The plays will be staged in the new \$4,500,000 Jubilee Auditorium in the Alberta capital. Chairman will be Mrs. Mary Mooney, daughter of Lieutenant-Governor Bowen of Alberta.

The eight plays were chosen by Cecil Bellamy, noted British actor, producer and playwright who has spent 3½ months travelling from coast to coast in Canada adjudicating at regional festivals. Judge in the final competition will be Robert Spaight, British actor and producer noted for his role as Thomas A. Beckett in T.S.

ELIOT'S Murder in the Cathedral. The eight choices were announced Sunday by David J. Ongley, president of the Dominion Drama Festival. They will compete for a \$1,000 annual award.

EIGHT PLAYS

The plays (in order of appearance at the festival) are: Anastasia, Vancouver Little Theatre Association; Stalag 17, Medicine Hat, Alta., Civic Theatre; Ma Petite Villie, L'Union Theatre Francaise, Sherbrooke, Que.; Dangerous Course, Playcraftsmen, Toronto; The Crucible, Hamilton Players' Guild; The Hasty Heart, Theatre Arts Club of St. John's; La Tour Eiffel qui Tue, Le Theatre de Quat Sous.

Mr. Bellamy selected the Toronto University Alumnae Dramatic Club's To Ride a Tiger as winner of the Sir Barry Jackson Trophy and a \$100 award as the best Canadian play presented at regional festivals. Playwright Norman Williams of Toronto was given the award.

Mr. Bellamy seemed in an interview, to favor La Tour Eiffel qui Tue, as the best performance he had seen.

As a general criticism of Canadian acting—which, on the whole, he found was as good as that in good English repertory theatre—he said that Canadian actors failed to achieve characterization through intonation and voice modulation. This was less true of French-Canada acting, he said.

Mr. Bellamy said he felt a bit "muzzy" after his packed tour. He said he would do little after returning to London Thursday morning but rest.

Doctor Complains Of Roads Around Tyne Valley

The monthly meeting of the trustees of the Stewart Memorial Health Centre was held last night at Tyne Valley School.

Dr. G.E. Robinson spoke about the lack of adequate roads in the district and deplored that there was not one pavement out to the Western Road in spite of the presence at Tyne Valley of a busy hospital.

He told the meeting that unless steps were taken to remedy this in the near future, he would plan to leave the community in 1958. He felt that most of the responsibility for the lack of pavement fell locally rather than with the Provincial Government because everyone wanted pavement right past their own doorstep and the government was too bewildered to know which way to put it.

He said that although he did not want to move to another province, he did not feel that he was being fair to himself to ignore other opportunities when road conditions under which he had to work were so bad. He claimed that poor roads were one reason why it was difficult to keep general practitioners in country districts in Canada and that it was up to the community to press for better conditions so that they could be able to keep doctors for a reasonable period of time rather than have a change every year or two as has been the custom.

The trustees decided to call an emergency meeting of the entire district interested in the paving of roads around Tyne Valley. It was decided to hold this public meeting in Tyne Valley school tonight, April 16, at 8 p.m.
