New Seating Arrangement Is Planned By Committee

Lobster suppers at the Summerside Lobster Carnival will be enjoyed from seating arrangements which will be located along the 12 foot wide balcony walk extending around the Summerside stadium and overlooking the activities on the main floor where entertainment will be provided and where display booths will also be located, according to tentative plans approved at a meeting of the carnival committee last night.

The location of the supper seating accommodation within the stadium was decided after the members viewed the proposed accommodation and felt that the new location would be more advantageous than the earlier idea to provide the eating accommodations within marquee tents located just outside the stadium. The meeting also favoured a recommendation of the entertainment committee that professional entertainment be engaged for the two performances daily from a stage to be located within the stadium, and that this entertainment be supplemented with specialty numbers by local talent.

30 FLOATS
Carnival director Charlie Hogan announced that 30 floats have been assured for the carnival parade, and there are more than 25 other possibilities for floats from Summerside.

Purchasing of the floats will be done by a special committee, and all other purchases for the carnival will be handled by a central committee with carnival director Hogan as chairman.

Proposed duties for the 1959 carnival as tentatively suggested at last night's meeting will delegate to the Board of Trade the arrangements for the official opening, and the maintenance of an information booth.

The Rotary Club will be responsible for track and field events, a souvenir booth, and a cane booth.

The Kinsmen Club will conduct the dances and crown and anchor booths.

The Y's men have been requested to conduct the Sea Queen contest, and coronation parade, the boat races, supper tickets, and a lobster booth.

The Canadian Legion are expected to arrange the tug-of-war contests, and to operate the bear pit, and beat the dealer booths. The RCAF Association have been assigned canteen, ice cream booths, dog and doll booth, and a chocolate wheel booth.

PARKING
The Lions Club are being asked to look after parking, and to conduct the doll carriage parade and the soap box derby.

Parades and floats will be under a committee with Dave Carney as chairman, while Jim MacLean will head a committee.

Flames Destroy Union Road Barns

A grass fire which raged out of control yesterday afternoon, destroyed two barns owned by Klaas Brink of Union Road.

The fire, which started about 3 p.m. was unattended at the time. Lost in the barns was a goat and a quantity of hay and farm implements. Also in the line of fire was a chicken coop containing 200 chickens, the house and another shed. Through the efforts of neighbors and the Montague Fire

Department, which had responded to the call, the fire was kept from spreading further.

The barns, 25 by 35 ft. and 30 by 60 ft., were in a good state of repair. The smaller had formerly been the Union Road Methodist Church and was moved to its present site approximately 30 years ago.

Golden Hawks To Feature RCAF Day Slated July 1

The Golden Hawks, a team of aerobatic flyers will be a featured part of Air Force Day at RCAF Station, Summerside, July 1.

The Hawks, a six-man troupe flying golden painted Sabre jet fighters, are designated to be the highlight of Air Force Day celebrations across the nation.

Previously the day was marked by simultaneous open houses and ceremonies at air force stations throughout the Dominion. However, this being the 35th anniversary of the RCAF and the 50th anniversary of powered flight in Canada, the celebrations at various bases will be held to coincide with the visit of the stunt experts.

Although plans are not yet complete, this team is expected to perform at the Canadian National Exhibition in Toronto, the Calgary Stampede, the Pacific National Exhibition in Vancouver and at other big shows — and

On the ground, guided tours will be given through the aircraft. Airmen who fly and services the planes will be on hand to answer questions and explain the operations of the equipment.

Preparations are also underway to arrange interesting ground displays which will include every phase of air force life.

A "mule train" will be available to carry kiddies to points of interest around the station.

Ample parking space will be provided and refreshments will be on sale at convenient locations.

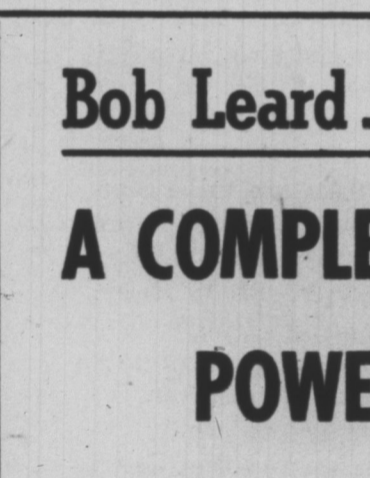

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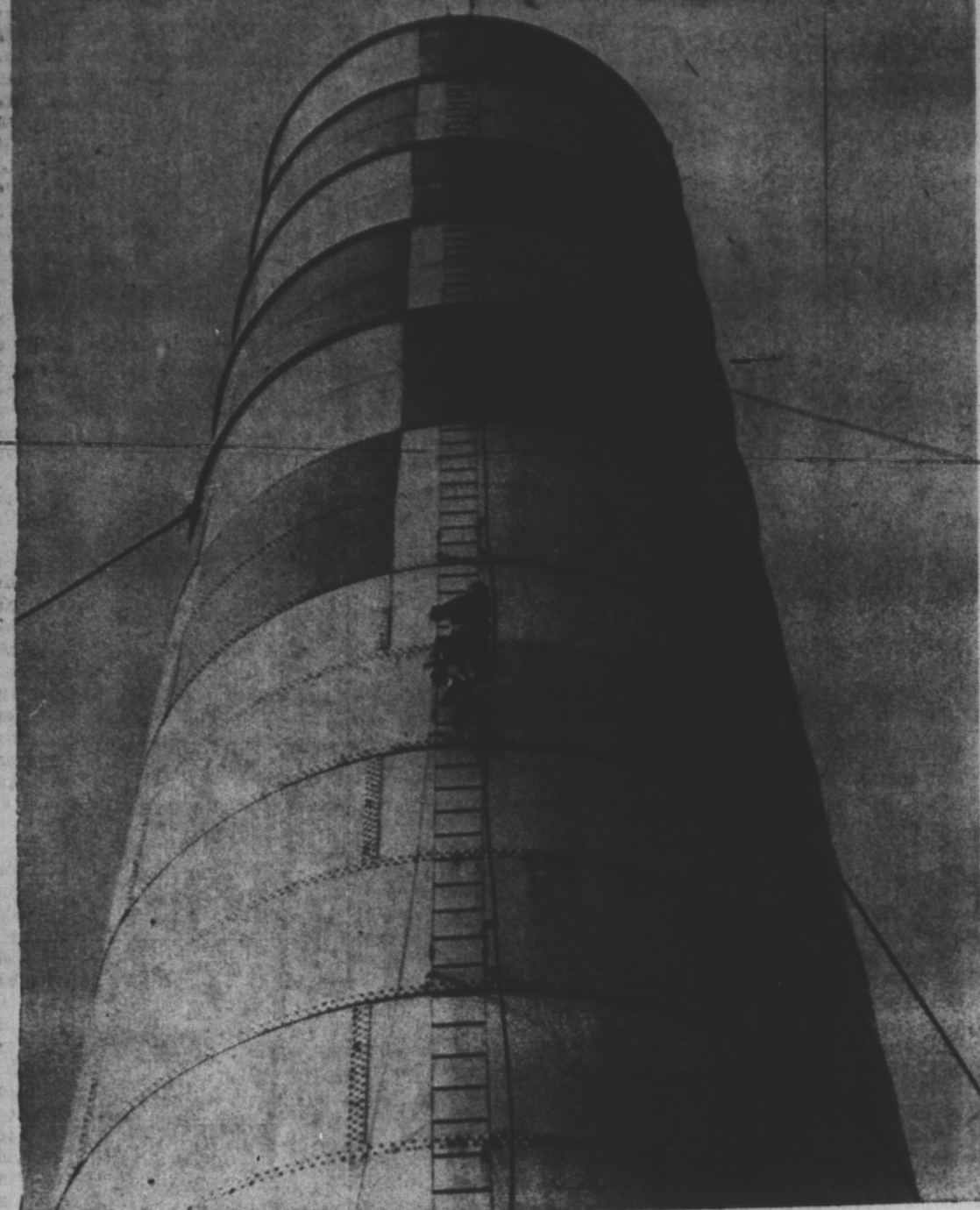


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120-FOOT STANDPIPE CLIMBED

ISLAND BRIEFS Georgetown Plagued By Many Grass Fires

RETURNS HOME
George A. Bowness returned to his home in Summerside on Wednesday after spending a very pleasant winter with his sons and daughters in Kilmarnock, Ontario; Fort St. John, B. C.; and Baltimore, Maryland.

GEORGETOWN — A rash of grass fires plagued Georgetown on Thursday afternoon and kept citizens on the run from one fire to another in their efforts to keep them under control.

DELICACY APPEARS
Fresh herring appeared on some Summerside restaurant menus for the first time yesterday.

A small but fierce grass fire for a time threatened the B. A. Service Station on Kent Street and nearby homes. At the same time practically all of the common lots on the east side of the town were afire and a barn on the property of the late William Howlett caught but was quickly extinguished. On this property the house was seriously threatened.

The fresh fish was provided by Cecil Souier who made the first catch reported locally this season off Sea Cow Head.

Farther along the same street a barn on the vacant property formerly owned by Mrs. Nancy Robertson who is 101 years of age, was threatened but the fire hose was laid from the reservoir on Victoria Street and water was played on the racing flames just in time.

A large crowd of citizens gathered at the scene of the different fires and worked strenuously with shovels and buckets to assist greatly in stopping the further spread of the flames.

Born at Morell, WO Jay enlisted in the RCAF in January of 1942. He was stationed at various points across Canada including 18 months at RCAF Station, Summerside, before being transferred to his present post at Goose Bay, Labrador.

Mrs. Herbert Saunders said she heard an explosion seconds before the fire broke out. Her husband works in Charlottetown.

FORECAST MOSTLY COOL

Much of Western Canada, from the Lakehead to the Pacific, is expected to have below-normal temperatures during the April 15 May 15 period.

This map, based on the 30-day outlook of the United States weather service, also forecasts near normal weather for most of Quebec, central Ontario, a large part of the Maritime provinces and northwestern British Columbia. Southern Ontario will have above-normal temperatures.

Precipitation in the period is expected to be moderate throughout most of Canada. Heavy rainfall is expected over southern Ontario and Quebec while light precipitation is forecast for Vancouver and southwestern B. C.

Tables at right show normal temperatures and precipitation in various centres for the April-May period.
