Cook's Corner

FRENCH CHOCOLATE BON BONS These candies are quite rich and sweet. The addition of the coconut and chocolate—and their combination in the ensemble—both add to the interest.

Yield—3 1/2 dozen bon bons. 3/4 cup hot mashed potato 1 teaspoon butter or margarine 1 ounce unsweetened chocolate, melted over hot water

Work about half of sifted icing sugar into the potato mixture—the mixture thins right down at this point.

Work in vanilla and remaining sifted icing sugar. Mix in coconut.

In a double boiler over hot water, if it is being used. Dip the flat side of the candies into the melted chocolate, one at a time—let excess chocolate run back into pan; place on waxed paper and let stand at room temperature until set (in warm weather, candies will have to be chilled to set the melted chocolate).
