NEW YORK (AP) - The stock market took another sharp loss Tuesday, but remained above the lows reached in the big convulsion of May 28-29. Trading was active and the tape ran in the close. Gold mining stocks resumed their advance in true bear market. A late wave of selling sent prices down to their worst of the day in final dealings. An attempt to stop the trend in mid-afternoon came to nothing. An estimated \$2,000,000,000 was clipped from the quoted value of stocks listed on the New York Stock Exchange, based on the fall in the Associated Press average. The loss brought the market fairly close to the testing level represented by the lows of May 28-29. The AP 65-stock average lost 4.70 at 215.20, the sharpest loss since the June 4 decline of 6.50. The ticker tape ran five minutes behind transactions as selling snowballed near the close. Bouquet, the Philippine gold mining stock, was the most active, rising 1/2 to 1 1/4 on 97,000 shares. Polaroid was second, sinking 10 points to 9 1/4 on 81,800 shares. Another gold stock, Campbell's Red Lake, was 15th most active on 1/4 at 17 1/2. Homestake rose 1/4 to 17 1/2. Dome Mine 3/4 and McIntyre-Porcupine 1/4. Other Canadian issues fell, with International Nickel down 3/4, Aluminum Ltd. 1/4, Distillers Seagrams 1/4, Walker Goodham 1/4 and Canadian Pacific 1/4.
