

U.S. Promises Safeguards On Atom-Sharing Program

By FRANCIS W. CARPENTER. UNITED STATES, N.Y. (AP) — The United States promised Monday to place its atomic-sharing program under safeguards proposed for an international atomic energy agency if others would do the same.

U.S. delegate James J. Wadsworth made the offer in opening general debate in the 31-nation atomic energy conference. He said the strong provisions in a proposed statute for the agency could be extended to bilateral agreements among countries upon their request. The United States has such agreements with 10 other countries, Britain, Canada and the Soviet Union also have them.

"The United States," Wadsworth said, "hopes that parties to bilateral arrangements throughout the world will avail themselves of this provision (to extend safeguards to these agreements), thus contributing toward the eventual establishment of a uniform system of safeguards of universal application."

CORNERSTONE

"If this is done," he added, "the United States can look forward to making the agency the cornerstone of its international activities in the field of atomic energy."

Wadsworth told the conference the proposed statute was agreed upon by 12 negotiating powers in Washington but that it was not perfect. He said, however, the questions still not settled "do not loom large."

He renewed the proposal of President Eisenhower on March 1 to Soviet Prime Minister Bulganin that all production of fissionable materials anywhere in the world "be devoted exclusively to peaceful purposes."

RUSSIANS DISAGREE

Georgi N. Zarubin, Soviet ambassador to Washington, made no reference to the Wadsworth offer in a speech to the conference but disagreed on the issue of safeguards. He contended the control provisions in the statute infringed on the sovereignty of nations. He said there would be sufficient safeguards if countries pledged against military misuse of the materials and then report how they were using them.

Despite the lack of agreement on this point, the United States and the Soviet Union apparently are making strong efforts to see that the constitution of the agency, drafted by them and 10 other countries including Canada in Washington, is approved by this conference. Wadsworth envisioned the agency at work within a year.

The statute provides that the agency may send inspectors into countries getting its help and may withdraw such help from any that turn it to military uses.

Papal Pronouncement On Significance Of Eucharist

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The Pope reiterated Sunday the long-held Catholic Church's tenet that Christ is truly present in the eucharist, declaring "science must conform to revelation, not revelation to science."

The 80-year-old head of the Catholic church came here from his Castel Gandolfo summer home expressly to give a detailed discourse on the highly technical subject of the church's liturgy.

His address ended an international congress on pastoral liturgy held at Assisi and attended by Roman Catholic prelates from all parts of the world.

Much of the Pope's address concerned the liturgy of the mass and its central action — the eucharist sacrifice.

Quoting the Council of Trent, which in the 16th century defined many tenets of the church, the Pope said, "In this divine sacrifice which takes place in the mass, the same Christ is present and is immolated in an unbloody manner, who once on the cross offered himself in a bloody manner."

The pontiff said there can be no doubt that the true presence of Christ in the eucharist, this too, was defined by the Council of Trent, he said.

"It suffices, moreover," the Pope added, "to take the words

ALMA Will Consider Applications For New Television Stations

OTTAWA (CP)—Six applicants for new television stations will be considered at the next meeting of the CBC board of governors here Oct. 26.

Two of the TV applications come from Quebec City. Both ask for a licence to operate an English-language station there. The others are for stations in Medicine Hat, Alta., Kamloops, B.C., Argentina, Nfld., and Rouyn, Que.

Television de Quebec (Canada) Ltd., operators of the French TV station CFCMTV, Quebec City, and Good Will Broadcasters of Quebec Inc., owners of English radio station CJCQ, in Quebec are the separate applicants for the English-language station.

Television de Quebec applied for a licence to operate a station on channel 5, with a power of 5.6 kilowatts video and 2.8 kilowatts audio. Good Will Broadcasters wants to operate on channel 9 with a power of 3.2 kilowatts video and 1.6 kilowatts audio. Newfoundland Broadcasting Co. Ltd., operators of CJONTV, St. John's, Nfld., applied for the licence to operate a TV "satellite station" in Argentina, on channel 10 with a power of 190 watts video and 97 watts audio. The station would be connected to CJON-TV.

Radio station CKCV, Quebec, applied for a power boost to 5,000 watts from 1,000.

Radio station CKCL, Truro, N.S., asked for a licence to set up a standby transmitter for use in case there is a failure with the main transmitter.

Dr. W. C. Ross, N.S. Educator Dies

HALIFAX (CP) — Dr. W. C. Ross, organizer of physical education in Nova Scotia's schools and a former track star, died in hospital Sunday after an illness of three weeks. He was 71.

He received his arts degree from Dalhousie University, worked several years as an accountant and graduated in theology from Pine Hill Divinity Hall in 1914.

Dr. Ross held a pastorate at St. Paul's Presbyterian Church in Amherst until 1915 when he joined the army.

After the war he joined the headquarters staff of the Canadian YMCA in London. On his return home in 1920, he was appointed dean of the Presbyterian boy's residence at Pictou Academy.

When the United Church of Canada was formed in 1925, he was transferred to Mount Allison University and the next year became principal of Mount Allison's ladies college. The college honored him with a doctorate of divinity in 1935.

After 1936 to his retirement in 1954 he worked for the Nova Scotia department of education where he organized the physical education department and became director of temperance education.


