Midsummer Examination.

WEST KENT STREET SCHOOL.

THE Public Annual Midsummer Examination of West Kent Street School was held yesterday, 23rd inst. The usual routine work of the departments was conducted by the teachers. Visitors and strangers were, however, invited to test the pupils in the various lessons; and in several instances availed themselves of the opportunity thus offered them. The discipline maintained and the attainments of the pupils were very satisfactory. In several instances the test made, showed that there were a high degree of intelligence and a thorough acquaintance with the subjects taught. All the departments were visited by parents of the pupils and others interested in the progress of the schools.

At 12 o'clock, noon, the pupils of all the departments were convened in the large hall, where an entertainment was given by the pupils, consisting of original essays, dialogues, recitations and singing. We have no space to particularize; but the pupils all performed their parts well. Hon. John Longworth, Chairman of the School Board, occupied the Chair. On the platform were Hon. A. A. Macdonald, Thomas Handraban, Esq., Archd. Kennedy, Esq., members of the School Board, Dr. Murray, Prof. Anderson, Rev. Archdeacon Read, Rev. Mr. Harris, and several other gentlemen. Prof. Anderson, Dr. Murray and Rev. Mr. Harris severally addressed the meeting, congratulating the School Board on the efficiency of the School.
