Tomato Aspic Saladettes
Broiled Lobster Tails Maitre d'
Mushroom-Lobster Newburg-On-Tost
Heated Potato Straws (canned)
Corn Kernels with Green Beans
Cornmeal Gingerbread
Hot or Iced Coffee Tea Milk
Measurements are level; recipes for 6
Cornmeal Gingerbread: Sift together 1 1/2 c. presifted enriched flour, 1/2 tsp. powdered ginger, 3/4 tsp. powdered cinnamon, 1/2 tsp. powdered mace, 1 c. enriched cornmeal, 3/4 tsp. baking soda, 2 tsp. baking powder and 1 tsp. salt.
Beat 1 egg light; add 1/2 c. brown sugar. Stir thoroughly. Add 1/2 c. dark molasses, 3/4 c. buttermilk and 1/2 c. melted butter or margarine.
Make a "well" in dry ingredients. Stir in liquid mixture. Oil 6" by 11" cake pan; dust with cornmeal. Pour in batter. Bake 35 min. in moderately hot oven, 375 to 400 degrees F., or until wooden pick inserted near center comes out clean.
Serve warm as is or with lemon sauce; or cold, topped with whipped cream and crystallized ginger.

CHEF'S MUSHROOM-LOBSTER NEWBURG
Turn contents 2 (10 oz.) cans lobster Newburg into double boiler pot. Add 1/2 (13 oz.) can lobster bisque soup; stir in 1/4 c. cream.
Add 2 (4 oz.) cans dark rich-flavored canned mushrooms cooked in butter, cut profile-style and in small pieces.
Heat 12 min. over hot water; stir occasionally.
Serve on de-erusted halved slices of toast.
Garnish with minced parsley.
