TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Ottawa News. OTTAWA, June 29. The return of Hon. Mr. Tupper for Pictou will be gazetted to-morrow. The Clerk of the Privy Council has been appointed deputy to the Governor-General. Notice is given of application for incorporation of the Halifax and Newfoundland Steamship Company, with a capital of fifty thousand dollars. Notice is given that the light at Port George, Annapolis Co., has been changed to a fixed green light. The withdrawals from the Post Office Savings Banks during May exceeded the deposits by one hundred and forty thousand dollars. Henry A. Gray, Civil Engineer, has been appointed to superintend the public works in connection with harbors and piers in the Maritime Provinces. The election in Nicolet will take place on July 17th. The announcement that Joseph Pope, the Premier's Private Secretary, would shortly be appointed Under Secretary of State, is understood to be premature, although no man judicious or popular appointment could be made.

Diocesan Synod.

HALIFAX, June 29. The Diocesan Synod of Nova Scotia met this morning. There are 120 delegates present, 60 lay and 60 clerical. Bishop Stevens, of Brooklyn, N. Y., assisted in the morning services. Bishop Courtney read a masterly address, being a revised history of the Church and her present position and needs. He said the Church in P. E. Island was in a better condition than reported to him, and he prophesied a good future for King's College. The Cathedral corner stone was laid, but he thought in a poor place, and it would be much better to tear St. Luke's down and build the Cathedral on its present site.

Montreal News.

MONTREAL, June 29. The Post to-night states that A. M. Duhamel, collector of water rates and corporation bailiff of Gouglu, has absconded, and that his defalcations will reach about \$30,000. Albert E. Kralle, another American fugitive, was arrested at the Windsor Hotel to-day. He was employed by Hirsch & Co., button manufacturers, New York, and committed forgeries on them to the extent of several thousand dollars. Pitcher, the Providence Bank defaulter, feels confident of getting out of his predicament and enjoying the money he brought with him.

The First Arrival.

CHICAGO, June 28. The first transatlantic vessel that ever arrived at Chicago steamed into the river to-day. It was the Roseland which left Sunderland, Eng. one month ago. She is brand new from the shipbuilder's yard, and brought a cargo of Portland cement from London. It was reshipped from Montreal and Kingston to get here through the Welland. The Rosendale is a propeller, and a very fast one. She will not go back to England, but will be kept on the Great Lakes, between Toronto and Port Arthur.

Aquatic.

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 29. The annual University four mile straight-away eight-oared boat race, between Yale and Harvard, was rowed between five and six p. m., over the Thames course. Yale led all the way, and won by twenty-four lengths—time 20:10; Harvard 21:20. The series of races now stands: Yale won six, Harvard five. Yale's time is the fastest ever made on the river. They gave the best exhibition of eight-oared rowing ever seen on the Thames.

The Battle of "Home Rule."

LONDON, June 29. Morely, in a speech at Chester this evening said the Liberals still had plenty of time to win the Irish battle to which they were determined to devote themselves firmly, resolutely and unflinchingly. The recent debate in Parliament compelled the Government to admit that the National League was ubiquitous, and that crime in Ireland was dependant upon coercion. The action of the magistrates destroyed the reign of law and substituted an arbitrary will of practically an irresponsible power.

TORONTO, June 29. Mr. McGee, Clerk of the Privy Council, left to-day with Hon. Joseph Royal for Regina, where he will swear in Mr. Royal as Lieut.-Governor of the Northwest Territories.

Manitoba's Governor.

WINNIPEG, June 29. Dr. Schultz will be sworn in as Lieut.-Governor of Manitoba on Monday. Lieut. Governor Aitkens and family left to-night for Toronto.

NEW YORK, June 29. At 1.30 to-day Mrs. Lillian Baron Hamerle was married to the Duke of Marlborough by Mayor Hewitt at the City Hall.
