

Polio Vaccine Available To Proceed With City Schools

The second shipment of vaccine for protection against Poliomyelitis has arrived in the province, the Health Department reports, and there is now enough vaccine on hand to proceed with the immunization programme in the city schools next week. The teachers have prepared lists of the names of the pupils up to Grade Six for the public health nurses, and also have forwarded the Parents signed requests for inoculation to the Health Department. Starting in Queen Square School on Tuesday, it will take most of the day to complete the third inoculation for the pupils who received two doses last year, and to give the first one to the others who are eligible to receive the vaccine this year that is - all pupils in Grades one to six inclusive. On Wednesday, the clinic will be held in Rochford Square School, in Prince Street School on Thursday morning, and West Kent in the afternoon and at Notre Dame Academy on Friday Morning. These clinics are only for the school pupils. During the following week there will be a clinic at the Model School also one in Parkdale and Spring Park.

She entered hospital two weeks ago. In 1903 she married Senator Buchanan, then managing editor of the St. Thomas Times-Journal. Senator and Mrs. Buchanan celebrated their golden wedding Sept. 29, 1953. Senator Buchanan died July 11, 1954. Surviving are two sons, Donald W. Buchanan, assistant director of the National Gallery, Ottawa, and Hugh P. Buchanan, editor and publisher of the Lethbridge Herald; and two brothers.

The Trustees adopted the recommendation of the Medical Staff that the regulation which allows parents only to visit the maternity ward be continued for the present.

Expert Says Square Dancing Gaining Ground

The special square dance to be held at the Community Centre on Thursday, April 19th, marks another important milestone in the revival of interest in square and folk dancing which has steadily been gaining ground throughout Canada and the United States. Rickey Holden, internationally famous square dance authority who will call for the event, attributes this modern development to several factors. "People are beginning to rebel against the growing passiveness of their lives," he says. "The current Do-It-Yourself trend indicates that we are a people who prefer personal accomplishment, yet our recreational forms for adults are getting farther and farther away from active participation. "Further, square dancing may be a family activity, for teenagers and grand-parents join with equal skill and enjoyment in the fascinating figures. Although for some years in the past, square dancing had in some areas fallen into disrepute and gained the reputation of 'rowdiness', it has now returned to take its place in the community as a wholesome recreation."

Hammarkjold Presses Israel To Confirm Cease Fire Ordered

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Hammarkjold Thursday against the raid on the children and the appearance of Egyptian jet planes over Israeli territory. Ben-Gurion said it was clear that Egyptian acts of hostility are continuing. He asked what assurances Hammarkjold had received from Egypt's Premier Gamal Abdel Nasser that orders had been issued to all Egyptian forces to maintain a complete cease-fire, not to cross the armistice line, to put an end to the activities of sabotage and "murder gangs" and to refrain from all other acts of aggression and violence.

SENDS REPLY Hammarkjold in his reply said Ben-Gurion must be aware that in negotiations of this kind the UN must take the word of the government as binding. "You further ask whether I have the certainty that orders 'had' been issued to all Egyptian forces to observe certain rules defined in your message," Hammarkjold continued. "You will in this context remember that I have asked you for your assurance that you will issue orders to the same effect as promised by the government of Egypt. I regret that so far I have not received such assurance."

INVADE CONSULATE In New York, 22 youngsters who said they were members of Brit Empire of America invaded the Park Avenue home of the Egyptian consul and UN delegation. They chanted and prayed for an hour. They called it a memorial service for the three children and a rabbi "murdered by Egyptian killers near Tel Aviv on Wednesday." The youngsters said the organization is the leading anti-Communist group for Jewish youth. Ben-Gurion complained to Ham-

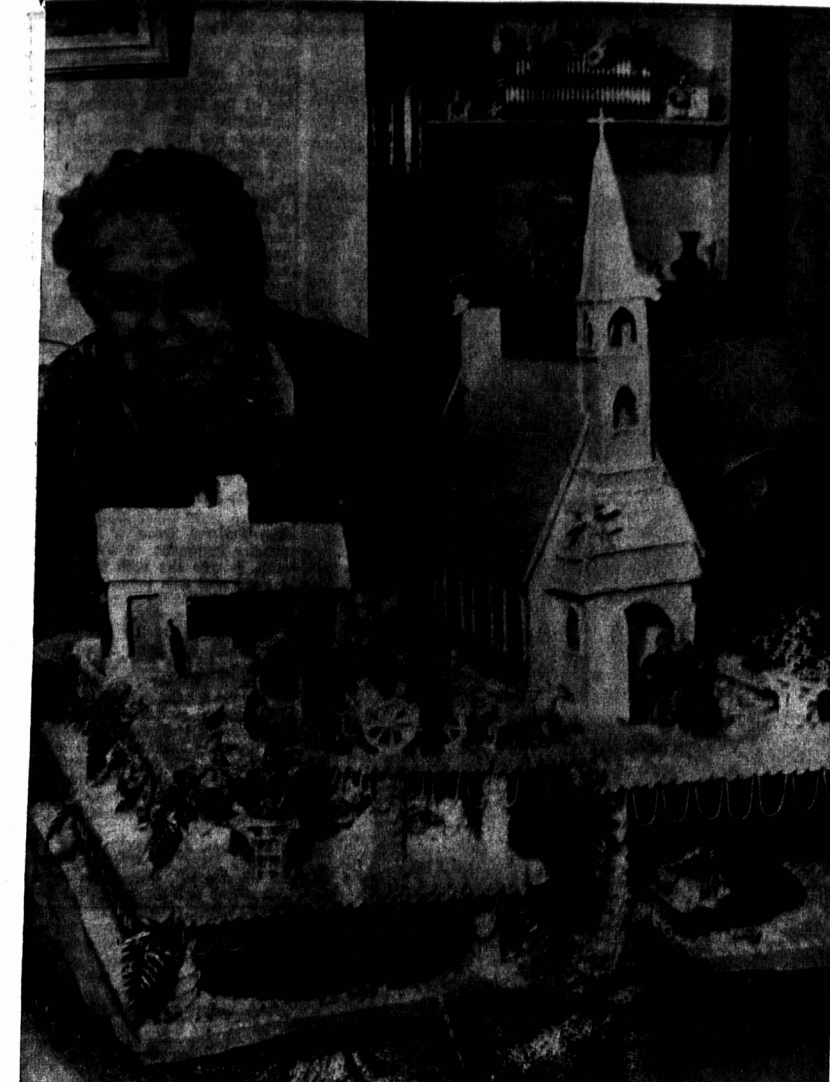

FEDERAL WORKS COSTS OTTAWA (CP) — Federal construction in Ottawa over the next 10 years will cost about \$100,000,000. Works Minister Winters estimated Saturday. New buildings include a \$15,000,000 defence headquarters, a \$7,600,000 post office department building and a \$5,000,000 works department building. A tri-service military hospital to cost about \$5,500,000 also is planned.
