THE RACES.
Long before the appointed hour (two o'clock this afternoon) the Grand Stand was occupied by a large crowd of expectant people, while a much larger crowd stood at the fence surrounding the track.

The Judges were E. H. Greeley, Ellsworth, Me., starter; W. S. Dewett, St. John, and J. J. Davies, Charlottetown. Distance Judge—John Mullins, Kensington.

The three-minute class was first called. The horses which came to the starting post in this class were:—

1. Golden, owned by Newton Large, driven by Mr. Wiman, color blue.
2. Boodler, owned by J. P. Delahunt, Moncton, driven by owner, color pink.
3. Harry C., owned by H. C. Conolly, driven by Joseph Durant, color red.
4. Neptune Lee, owned by Duncan Martin, driven by Peter Carroll, color yellow.

The race was called promptly—Neptune Lee having the pole, Harry C. second, Boodler third, and Golden fourth. The horses got away on the second start.

At the quarter pole Golden began to draw ahead, and at the half had secured a good lead, with Harry C. and Boodler almost abreast, and Neptune Lee in the rear. At the three-quarter pole Boodler drew ahead of Harry C. At the finish Golden was about three lengths ahead, with the others in a string in the rear. Time 2:42.

Second Heat.—They got a send-off on first score. Golden drew ahead easily and led from the start. There was a hard struggle for second place between Boodler and Harry C. ending in the triumph of the former by about a length. Neptune Lee was badly in the rear—Time 2:46.

Third Heat.—Neptune Lee was drawn at this heat. Golden led, as before, from the start, and there was again keen competition between Boodler and Harry C. The heat ended as the others. Time 2:41. Golden won first money, Boodler second, and Harry C. third.

2:57 CLASS.
In this race only three horses came up to the mark, viz:—

1. Whistler, owned by Geo. Esory, driven by Wiman, color blue.
2. Peabody, owned by Peter Carroll, driven by owner, color red.
3. Blackbird, owned by E. Cameron, driven by R. Steele, color yellow.

In the first heat Whistler had the pole; Peabody second, and Blackbird third. The horses got away well together on the first score. Whistler soon obtained a lead, but breaking badly, was passed by both Peabody and Blackbird. Blackbird was a decided lead shortly after the half mile pole was passed, and maintained it till the finish, but was not back for making five breaks. Whistler started well after passing the three-quarter pole, and came in second. But the judges awarded him first place; Peabody second, and Blackbird third. Time 2:39.

Second Heat.—The horses got away on the second score. Blackbird again obtained first place and led after the first quarter. But Whistler came up game at the finish, and was almost abreast of the mare when he passed under the wire. He was again awarded first place on account of finishing by Blackbird; Blackbird second, and Peabody third. The heat was exciting. Time 2:37.

THREE YEAR OLD CLASS.
The horses entered in this race make a very pretty class. They were:—

1. Nellie Bly, b. m., by All Right, owned by Newton Lee, driven by owner, color yellow.
2. Masonic Pilot, b. k., by All Right, owned by Henry Horke; color red.

3. Peatie, b. m., by Hernando, owned by Reddin Bros; color green.
4. Hernona, b. m., by Hernando, owned by Wiman, driven by owner; color blue.
5. Dinah, b. m., by Israel, owned by A. C. Bell; New Glasgow, N. S., driven by Atherton; color pink.
6. Millionaire, by Black Pilot, owned by James Byrne, driven by Coughlan; color white.
7. Starlight, c. g., by Dean Swift, owned by Samuel A. Hooper, driven by Henderson; color red, white and blue.
Nellie Bly had the pole, Masonic Pilot second, Hernona third, Dinah fourth, Starlight fifth, Millionaire sixth, and Peatie seventh.

A good deal of time was lost in scoring. After the horses got away there was a tough struggle between Dinah, Millionaire and Nellie. The finish was in the following order:—Dinah 1, Hernona 2, Millionaire 3, Nellie Bly 4, Starlight 5, Masonic Pilot 6, Peatie 7.—Time 2:55.
