

Bombers Defeat Eskimos 21-15

An illegal substitution penalty that erased a last-second Edmonton touchdown gave Winnipeg Blue Bombers a vital 21-15 victory over Edmonton Eskimos Saturday night in a Western Inter-provincial Football Union game.

Later, Eskimos coach Sam Lyle said he hadn't seen referee Paul Do-jack signal "time in" before guard Art Walker was sent in with the last Edmonton play—a 12-yard Jackie Parker pass to end Bill Walker in the end zone. Do-jack's 10-yard penalty gave Eskimos another chance but it didn't pay off.

At Calgary Frank Tripucka's throwing arm and the running of Mike Hagler sparked Saskatchewan Roughriders to a 22-14 triumph over Calgary Stampeders Saturday night.

The victory put Roughriders in sole possession of second place, two points up on Edmonton Eskimos.

WINNING MARGIN
Charlie Shepard scored what became the game-winning touchdown for Winnipeg on a six-yard end sweep which followed two 24-yard passes by quarter Jim Van Pelt to Leo Lewis and Frank Gilliam.

It was Bombers' fourth victory in as many games this year with Eskimos, Bombers hold a five-point first-place lead.

Van Pelt's 15-yard pass to Gilliam in the first quarter counted for one bomber touchdown, and the other game on Leo Lewis' sensational 46-yard run through a maze of Eskimos in the second quarter. Van Pelt converted all three Winnipeg touchdowns.

Parker passed for both the Edmonton touchdowns, firing 13 yards to Walker in the first quarter and 15 to Joe Mobra in the second. Mobra converted both and counted a single in the third upfield goal wide.

TRIPUCKA HOT
Saskatchewan scored two touchdowns in their game, when Ken Carpenter and Ron Dundas took passes from Tripucka. Cookie Gilchrist scored the first quarter. Tripucka had passed his club into scoring position.

Stamps scored on touchdowns by Veryl Switzer, who plunged from the two-yard line in the second quarter, and by Gene Filipowski who caught a pass from Knobby Witkowski late in the game. Both were converted by Doug Brown. Reg Whitehouse converted two for Riders and added a single when a field goal attempt was wide. Larry Isbell.

GOOD MORNING baseball fans and a special hello to those Milwaukee fans who are just waiting for Lew Burdette to pitch the Braves to another world championship this afternoon.

It is indeed anything but a blue Monday for you folks who hopped on the Milwaukee wagon before this series got underway. This could be it this afternoon and should the Braves come through our good friend, the editor of Sports Views and Reviews in your Evening Patriot will have hit it right on the nose. He called for Milwaukee in five games.

SINCE WE CHATTED with you Saturday morning each team has registered shutouts and Braves still hold their two game lead. It's a bit different now however because the Braves need only one win and the big slice of the world series money is theirs. Larsen and Duren pitched fine ball Saturday to give the Yankees their first win and that fellow Hank Bauer single-handedly took care of the Yankee offense. The New Yorkers got only four hits and Hank was the proud possessor of three of those, driving in all the runs in that 4-0 Yankee victory. Braves' hurlers Bob Rush and Don McMahon pitched fine ball but the world champions just couldn't get the big hit at the right time.

YANKEE HOPES soared with the victory and New York fans everywhere were talking about a repeat of 1956 when the Dodgers grabbed games one and two then proceeded to lose the championship to the Bombers. Whitey Ford was ready for Sunday and that meant the Yankees were going to tie the series at 2-2.

Well, Ford pitched a very fine ball game. He was the victim of some really horrible fielding that led to the winners first and third runs. Whitey's effort was deserving of victory but how could any opponent get a victory the way Warren Spahn was hurling Sunday. He was terrific as he completely outfoxed the Bombers who were able to garner two base hits off his offerings.

You would think that Spahn was the New York hurler getting the Bombers on an even basis, the way the 71,000 fans cheered him every time he strode to the plate. It didn't make a bit of difference that Warren was humiliating their Yankees, the way he was doing it, was certainly worthy of the ovations the New York fans gave him.

Yankee supporters were consoling themselves before yesterday's game with the idea that Spahn couldn't give a repeat performance of last Wednesday's ball game. They figure he's done enough. However they insist his roommate Lew Burdette will finish the job that Spahn started last Wednesday in County Stadium, Milwaukee. Lew gets his chance this afternoon to close out the 1958 world series. He was given a similar chore just a year ago and responded in brilliant fashion.

Bob Turley will try to keep the Bombers still in the series but this afternoon when he goes to the mound against the hard-hitting Braves. Bullet Bob tried it last Tuesday but was out of there before the Milwaukee crew had finished their first turn at bat. Turley will be full of revenge but whether he'll have his stuff today is a problem Yankee fans are worried about.

SIEBERN LOOKED anything but big league calibre in that outfield. No doubt the lad has what it takes but he didn't show any of it yesterday's ball game. Tony Kubek came up with his second series error and this time it was a real one. It allowed the first Milwaukee to come across home plate. At the plate Kubek has been bad, getting one base knock in eight trips. Of course he has lots of company in that department. Once you mention Bauer you mentioned about all the batting power the Yankees have exhibited. The Bombers had four hits Saturday and won a ball game. Their fans argued that this was something that wouldn't happen again. It happened the very next day when Warren Spahn tamed them on two base blows.

THE TASK FACING Casey Stengel is a tremendous one. He must win three straight games from the world champions and two of those in the Milwaukee park. Even if Bob Turley could top Lew Burdette today, Casey is in a bad way for his next starter. Likely if the series went to six games, Don Larsen would be back. Whitey Ford would undoubtedly be the New York pitcher if the series didn't conclude till Thursday.

Of course Fred Haney has no such worries. He figures Burdette will lock things up this afternoon. If he fails, Haney still is laughing. He has Rush, Pizzaro, Willey just itching to get a start Wednesday and back of them comes Spahn and Burdette.

It surely is anything but bright for the New Yorkers and about the only solace they can get is in the record books. Pittsburgh Pirates back in 1925 trailed the Washington Senators 3-1 in games and rebounded to win the next three and the series.

It could happen again. But the Braves or their supporters don't think so.

The daily double paid \$68.50, the quinella \$8.40 and the exactor \$25.70.

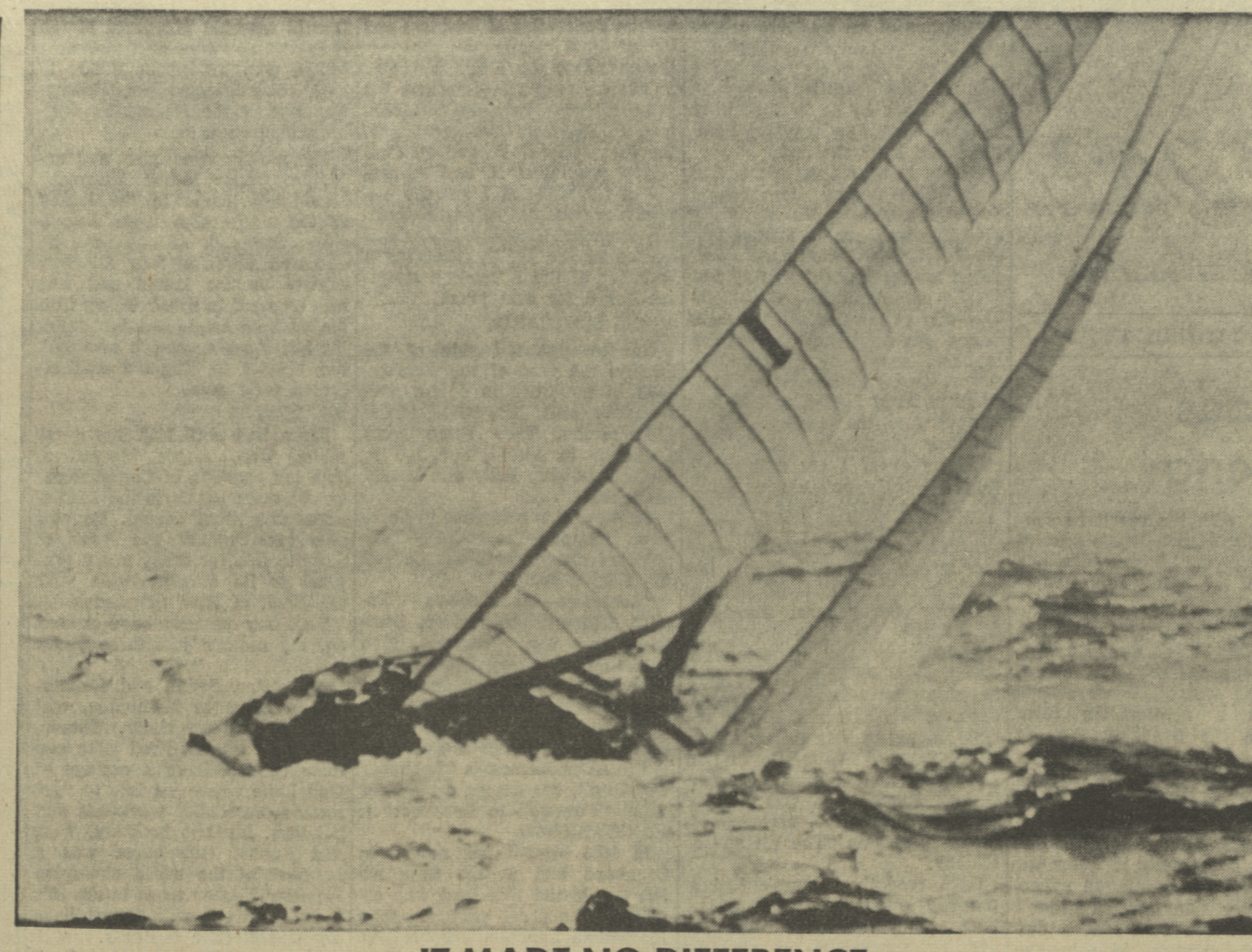

New York Yanks On Ropes After Spahn Masterpiece

NEW YORK (AP)—Crafty Warren Spahn left New York Yankees cliff hanging by his finger nails Sunday, with his Milwaukee Braves needing only one more victory to clinch their second straight world series.

The 37-year-old lefthander, an Oklahoma cattle rancher in the off season, choked off the American League champions 3-0 with only two hits—a triple by Mickey Mantle and a single by Bill Skowron.

The Yankees, trailing 3-1 in games, now find themselves in most desperate straits, only once has a team come back to win a seven-game series after losing three games. That was Pittsburgh against Washington in 1925. Earlier the 1903 Boston Red Sox had made a similar recovery against Pittsburgh in a best-of-nine set.

He quickly recovered and, on one knee, whipped the ball to first in time to get Yogi Berra sliding in belly-whopper style.

Milwaukee broke through Ford—or rather through Siebern—for a tainted run in the sixth inning. Siebern had hesitated on a ball hit by Del Crandall in the fifth, but Mantle backed him up in time to hold the damage to a single.

This time there was no rescue. Schoendienst led off the sixth with a drive to left centre. Siebern started after the ball as though to make a running catch. At the last second he pulled up, apparently thinking Mantle was going to get there in time. He didn't, the ball rolled to the wall for a triple.

With the infield pulled in to cut off the run at the plate, Johnny Logan rapped a sharp grounder at Tony Kubek. The Yankee shortstop, hitless in 13 at bats, let the ball hop through his legs. Schoendienst romped home with an unearned run.

The Braves had picked up another run in the top of the seventh.

Del Crandall, who led the Milwaukee nine-hit attack with two singles, walked on a 3-2 pitch. West Covington fled out, but Andy Patko doubled on a curling drive to right centre that fell between Mantle and Bauer.

Spahn dunked a short fly to left. In came Siebern. Then he pulled up again. The ball fell in for a single and Spahn had a run batted in as Crandall scored.

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Hank Bauer Leads Yanks To First Series Victory

NEW YORK (AP) — Bruiser Hank Bauer put New York's Yankees back into the world series Saturday with the help of shutout pitching by Don Larsen and Ryne Duren and a base-running boner by Milwaukee Braves. Bauer drove in all the Yankee runs in a 4-0 triumph, their first after two jarring defeats at Milwaukee.

The ex-marine knocked in the only two runs off loser Bob Rush when he singled to right with the bases loaded on three walks in the fifth. He crashed his third homer of the series with Enos Slaughter on base in the seventh off relief man Don McMahon. Hank has hit safely in his last 17 series games.

Larsen who tired after throwing 113 pitches in seven innings, struck out eight. Casey Stengel took him out for a pinch-hitter in the seventh.

Duren was wild. He walked three and uncoiled a wild pitch while protecting Larsen's victory.

BRAVES' BONER
The largest series crowd in five years, 71,569, gasped when the Braves pulled a base running blunder in the sixth.

New York had gone ahead in the bottom of the fifth 2-0 and it seemed the Braves were coming to life for the first time in the game.

Red Schoendienst slammed a long drive to right that the fast-fielding Bauer held to a single. After Eddie Mathews struck out for the third straight time, Hank Aaron walked.

Then it happened. Wes Covington's hard drive glanced off Bill Skowron's glove. Skowron quickly retrieved it as Schoendienst started for home.

When Skowron threw to the

plate, Red pulled up and doubled back to third only to see Aaron there.

There was nothing for the red-head to do but make another try at the plate. Skowron's throw to Berra had been relayed to Jerry Lumpe at third by this time. As Schoendienst dashed for home, Lumpe let go with a throw that missed Berra but was caught by Larsen, backing up at the plate.

Larsen ran after Schoendienst and tagged him near third base. By this time, Aaron was back on second.

Instead of one run in and men on first and third with one out, there were no runs, men on first and second and two out. Just to turn the screws a little harder, Frank Torre then fled to Bauer in right, deep enough to score a man from third. In all, the Braves left 10 men on.

Bauer left no doubt about stretching his record series hitting streak when he beat out a roller to deep short for a single in the first inning. Until he singled in the fifth that was the only hit off Rush, who pitched a magnificent game until wildness caught up with him.

With a one-hitter going into the fifth, Rush went to 3-2 on Norm Siebern and finally lost him on a walk. Jerry Lumpe flied out and

Schoendienst went far to his left to throw out Skowron.



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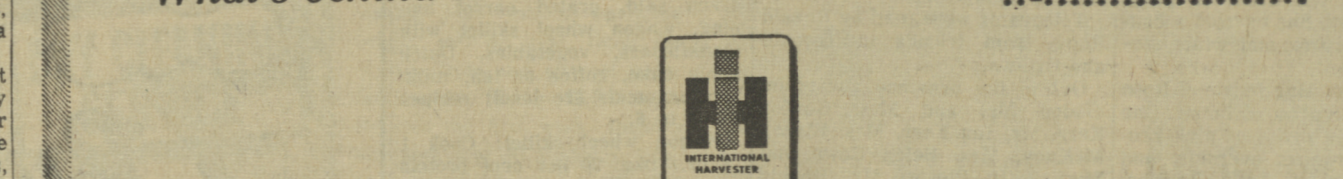
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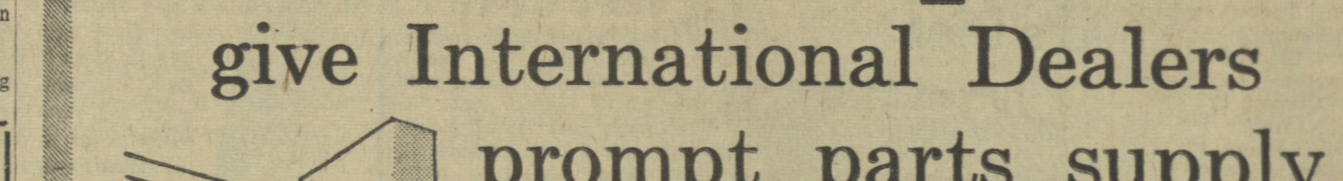
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
