

York Girl Is Winner In K Of C Essay Contest

Ruth Mary Lacey, York is the winner of \$100, the first prize in a historical essay competition sponsored by the Bishop MacEachern Assembly, Fourth Degree, of the Knights of Columbus.

Three country prizes of \$25 were awarded to Mary Eunice Reddin, Mount Stewart, a student at Notre Dame Academy, the winner for Queen's County; the King's County winner, Hazel Marie Curley, Carleton RR 2, a student at the Montague Regional High School, and to Anna Monckley, Southwest Lot 16, a student at the Miscouche Regional High School, the Prince County winner.

The competition was open to all students attending Grade 10 or grade 12 classes in the province and the essay of approximately 2,500 words was on the

topic, "The Role of Prince Edward Island At The Charlotte and Quebec Conferences".

The winner, Miss Lacey, is the daughter of Rev. and Mrs. F. W. Lacey, York. She is in her first year at Prince of Wales College and last year attended school at Chipman, N.B.

The Bishop MacEachern Assembly, Fourth Degree, is the patriotic section of the Knights of Columbus and was named after the first bishop of Charlottetown.

The problem was caused by the piles in construction of the wharf remaining to be completed after the electrical work and the fire protection system.

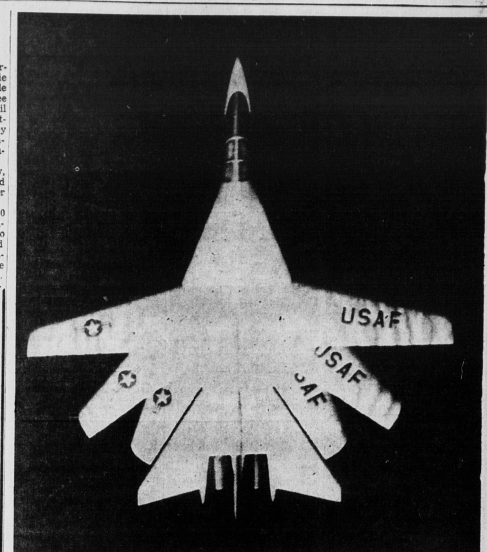
Administration buildings, warehouses and the paving of the pier are to be completed but are not in the present contract.
