An investigation was held yesterday by the Stipendiary Magistrate into the charge preferred by Councillor Smith, to the effect that Officers Warran and Cameron slept in the Police Station the morning of the 20th ult. with the door locked, and further, that they kept a prisoner in a cell with shutters on the cell door—thus depriving him of pure air. Councillor Smith was the only witness examined. He said that while taking a walk at 2 a. m. on the 20th, he fell in with Watchman McKinnon, and asked the watchman to go with him to the Station. On their arrival Councillor Smith rapped loudly at the door, and one of the officers appeared. On entering he perceived that the shutters were on the cell doors, and on being told that the cell was occupied by "Jimmy Maguire" he requested the officer to take off the shutter that he might not stifle. The officer admitted that the door was shut and that the shutter was on the cell. The Magistrate explained that after the death of Gilbey, he ordered the shutters to be kept off the cells. But more recently there were complaints of foul language proceeding from the cells, so much so that ladies could not pass the street. He therefore ordered, when prisoners were disorderly, to put on the shutter. The prisoner in the cell on the night in question was, without doubt, disorderly. Regarding the door being locked, the matter had been reported to him at the time, and the police explained that the latch was broken and could not be opened from the outside. When he discovered it to be the case he ordered a new one to be put on, which could be easily opened from the outside. He assured Councillor Smith that if any of the police were found sleeping in the station during hours of duty, with the door locked, he would instantly dismiss them.

**NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.**

**Supreme Court—Prince Co.**

*Special Despatch to Examiner.*

SUMMERSIDE, June 8. The Supreme Court opened at eleven o'clock this morning, Chief Justice Palmer presiding.

The following gentlemen compose the Grand Jury:—Dugald S. McNutt, foreman; Arthur Hooper, Donald Taylor, George A. Buaristo, James Brazil, Roubin Taplin, Walter Matheson, John Gillis, George W. Cameron, Andrew McGregor, Donald Morrison, Albert J. Craswell, James McNutt, Senr.

The docket is light, there being but three criminal and twenty-one civil suits, several of which have been disposed of.

Thompson vs. Ottawa and others, an action of ejectment, is now before the Court.

LISBON, June 5. A telegram from Mozambique informs the Government of the capture of the principal slave exporters, three Dhows. They were taken with 100 slaves on board.

LONDON, June 5. Eighty-six members of Parliament have signed a memorial asking the recall of Sir Bartle Frere.

GENEVA, June 5. It is believed that the engineers of the St. Gothard tunnel will be able to overcome the difficulty arising from the porous white stone formation where the vaulting has given away.

LONDON, June 5. Sir Henry Halford writes regarding the international rifle match at Wimbledon: "I intend to hold no competition for the purpose of choosing my team, but to take them from their public shooting and general performances."

LARNACA, Cyprus, June 5. The cattle plague has reappeared here, and 2,000 animals have died out of a total of 100,000 in the island.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 5. The funeral of the late Empress of Russia will be solemnized at Petropaulorsk Fortress on Wednesday next. The remains will be removed to-day to the large chapel in the Winter Palace, and the funeral services will be held there, to which all persons attached to the court have been directed to attend. The remains will be taken to the fortress in the morning to lie in state. All high officials of the Government now on furlough will return to St. Petersburg to be present at the obsequies.

CABUL, June 5. A number of Khokand pilgrims have arrived here. They were fugitives from Samarcand, where some were arrested bearing letters inciting revolt in Bokhara, Turkestan and Khokand to aid the Chinese. They report that the Chinese had driven the Russians back to the Kuldja frontier, capturing many villages.

RANGOON, June 5. The Burmese ambassador has left for home. Before leaving he sent a letter to the British Commissioner, but it was returned with the intimation that in the present state of relations between Burma and Great Britain, no communication could be received.

CONDENSED DESPATCHES. A duel was fought on Saturday at Angouleme, France, between the editor of the Bonapartist newspaper, *Le Suffrage Universel* and the editor of a Republican provincial journal. The former was slightly wounded.

Charles Lessing, the German painter, is dead.

The Japanese Government does not officially co-operate with Shufeldt's mission, although its agent in Corea has been informally instructed to show the American visitors every attention.

The Nihilist agitation in St. Petersburg is declining.
