British Force to be Left in Egypt.

LONDON, Nov. 2. It is proposed to leave a force of eleven thousand British troops garrisoned in Egypt.

Bismarck on Egyptian Control.

BERLIN, Nov. 2. Prince Bismarck strongly opposes the executive management of Egyptian finances by Great Britain. He desires that the financial affairs of Egypt shall be controlled by an International Board and not by one nation.

Russian Hostile Movements.

LONDON, Nov. 2. A despatch from Erzurum, Asiatic Turkey, says that it is believed the Russian troops are being prepared for a march on Erzurum and Van. The Turkish troops are concentrated at the latter place and will resist the march.

Rome and England.

ROME, Nov. 2. His Holiness, Pope Leo XIII. has entrusted to M. Errington, the British agent at the Vatican, an autograph letter to Queen Victoria, thanking her for the interest she has manifested in the Roman Catholics of her Dominions, and extolling the civil and religious freedom which exists under the British Government.

A Hungarian Refusal.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 2. The Government of Hungary has refused to allow recruiting for the Egyptian army in Bosnia and Herzegovina.

Arrested Under the Crime Act.

DUBLIN, Nov. 1. Matthew Harris, a member of the late Irish Land League, and others, has been arrested under the Crime Act for addressing a meeting of tenant farmers at Newbridge.

Mrs. Scoville in Canada.

MONTREAL, Nov. 2. Mrs. Scoville, sister of Guiteau, who disappeared from Chicago where the Courts pronounced her insane, has turned up at London, Ont.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

NEW YORK, 31. Mrs. Seguin, 36 years old, wife of Dr. Seguin, the noted specialist on brain diseases, shot and killed her three children, aged 6, 5 and 4 years respectively, this afternoon, and then killed herself. Mrs. Seguin took the children to an empty spare room in the top of their five-story house, in the absence of her husband, and when the servants were engaged in the basement, locked herself in with them. The servants believed they had gone for a walk. Mrs. Seguin's brother called at five and, with suspicions aroused by the long absence of the family, made a search of the house. The mother and children were found dead—all shot through the head. The children's hands were tied on the back with a whip cord. They were blindfolded with handkerchiefs, and from all appearance it seemed that they must have been shot while playing at blind-man's-buff with their executioner. The only cause that can be assigned for the deed is insanity in the mother.

LONDON, Oct. 31. In the debate in the Commons on the closure rules, Mr. Gibson, Conservative, moved a crucial amendment in favor of two-thirds majority. He declared it impossible to indicate the evident sense of the House by a bare majority. He pointed out that Mr. Gladstone had to make this concession before the course of business was interrupted last session by the Phoenix Park murders.

Mr. Gladstone stated that the Government had proposed the closure solely because the business of the House could not proceed without it. He was justified in withdrawing the concession offered last session, as the Opposition had shown no signs of accepting it. The Government did not think it right to pay. If their plan was rejected they would resign. The House must be the judge in regard to the transmission of its own business, but two-thirds majority would be a deterioration rather than an improvement.

CAIRO, Oct. 31. Sir Edward Malet, British Consul General, has communicated to the Khedive a telegram from Lord Granville, stating that, as the settlement of affairs in Egypt involves a most complicated question, it would be unfair to Sir Edward Malet to leave him the entire responsibility, and that, therefore, Lord Dufferin would be sent to Egypt.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 31. Lord Dufferin will have an audience with the Sultan on Thursday. It is expected that he will return to Constantinople in two months.

MADRID, Oct. 31. The Massina Theatre at Barcelona has been destroyed by fire. Nobody killed.

LONDON, Oct. 31. The Times' correspondent from Constantinople says that the British Ambassador explained to the Porte that the project of Egyptian reorganization has not yet been sufficiently advanced to form a subject of negotiations.

PARIS, Oct. 31. The Central Committee of Radical Republicans repudiated all connection with the fomenters of disorder in Lyons and Montceau les Mines. They held advanced political views but they have too much good sense to think that their condition can be bettered by violence.

LONDON, Oct. 31. A despatch from Lyons says the theatres there were fairly filled on Sunday evening notwithstanding the threats of anarchists. Two other persons suspected of being concerned in the explosion in the cafe there a week ago have been arrested.

NEW YORK, Oct. 31. Henry Clark, who was injured at the Park Theatre fire last evening, is believed to have inhaled the fumes, and his lungs are dangerously affected. Wm. F. Doan had his thigh fractured, but will survive. John Leo, the stage carpenter, is missing, and has doubtless perished. The bad working of the fire alarm telegraph delayed the firemen reaching the fire promptly.

ROME, Oct. 31. The election of Signor Cocappalieri, a violent radical, to the Chamber of Deputies in the election on Sunday, is the general topic of conversation. Four months ago Cocappalieri was not known publicly. He was recently imprisoned for wounding Angelo Gognetti. A portion of the press, indignant at his election, consider it a disgrace to parliamentary institutions. Cocappalieri attacked Democrats and Republicans, and was subsequently prosecuted for libel. His fame was increased by an alleged attempt to kill him, and by the Government imprisoning him for a long time without allowing him trial.

LONDON, Oct. 31. Mount Etna is showing great and increasing activity and emitting fire and volumes of smoke.
