Diphtheria is epidemic at Ludington,

where the sickness exists.

Large quantities of P. E. Island eggs,
besides 316 barrels of potatoes, 53 cases
fresh salmon and other big lots fish, formed
part of the cargo of the steamer "New
York" for Boston yesterday.—St. John

A Newfoundland says that if Mr.
Gladstone wanted to pay \$16,000 to the
United States he was at liberty to pay it,
but they hope they will not be called upon
to foot the bill. They wish to know how
the damages were assessed, and state
that the sole injury inflicted at Fortune
Bay was the loss of a cod seine worth
£40.

Rev. D. D. Currie, rather surprised his
congregation in the Centenary last even-

HANLAN AND VISE MATCHED.—TORONTO,
June 10.—A race in lapstreak boats has
been arranged between Wisa of Riverside
and Edward Hanlan. The race is for
\$1,000 a side, and to come off in six weeks
from date on Toronto Bay. Course, five
miles in length with turn. A deposit of
\$500 has been made. Courtney is reported
as not going to row Hanlan this season, as
the latter wants too much money. Ross,
Smith, Morris and Hoanor will probably
be singled out by him for victims, as he is
more than sure of easy work with either of
the above quartet.

each card as follows: "This card is to be
returned to the secretary in the event of
the holder wishing to discontinue his
pledge."

England Disappointed.

THE Monetary Times says:—"The
hope of bringing the nations to Free
Trade practices, once so strongly indulg-
ed in by English economists and states-
men, has for the present vanished. The
disappointment, now so keenly felt,
rouses many to talk strongly in favor of
a radical change of policy. That a radi-
cal change of policy is possible, in Eng-
land, we very much doubt; though some
change is not improbable. Be this as it
may, the present attitude of the English
press affords a full justification of the
policy of Canada, in suiting her tariff to
the circumstances of the country. Our
increased tariff is a better revenue tariff
than the one it superseded; for it brings
more revenue; yet it has been the fash-
ion of English journals to speak of it as
having a prohibitive character; and, in
spite of the present change of base, we
fully expect to hear these utterances re-
peated on the first occasion that offers."

The Contest in Picton.

A telegram to the St. John Sun reports
that "the last meeting of the campaign
took place in Carmichael's stronghold this
afternoon (June 13th). The new Market
Hall was crowded full. The following were
the speakers: Adam Bell, M. P. P., for
McDonald, who was engaged elsewhere,
Carmichael, Tupper, Anglin, Tupper in
reply, and then Anglin. The speakers had
all a good hearing, till Mr. Anglin's final
reply. Mr. Anglin frantically indulged
another hearing, and made himself ridicu-
lous by intimating that Picton would get a
bad name abroad if he were refused a hear-
ing. His clumsy attempts to abuse and
defame acted as a foil for Sir Charles, who
keenly dissected him, carried the house
very generally with him, and aroused tre-
mendous cheering and enthusiasm, while
Mr. Anglin was gnashing his teeth with
rage on a back seat. The crowd escorted
Sir Charles Tupper out, took the horses
out of his carriage, and drew him through
the town, Sir Charles receiving cheers
everywhere. To-day's meeting is a crush-
ing blow to the Grits, who are crestfallen.
Sir Charles Tupper leaves this evening and
meets Lady Tupper at Rimouski. As an
evidence of the feeling, not a bet can be
placed on Carmichael on any terms."

London Truth has reason to believe
that the Marquis of Lorne will go to
England in October, and be elevated to
the Peerage. His present title is only
his by courtesy, as son and heir of the
Duke of Argyll.

The Very Rev. Principal Grant writes
to the Presbyterian Record on the endow-
ment of Queen's College. He says that
\$100,000 has been subscribed to the en-
dowment of the college, but that each in-
stalment, as it is paid, does little more
than make good an equivalent amount
which is lost, so that there is in reality
no addition to the revenue. At the time
of the union, Queen's College had an an-
nual grant from the Colonial Committee
of \$2,700, which was enjoyed so long as
it was considered endowment. At the same
time several of the professors were made
beneficiaries of the Temporalities Fund—
being an addition to the revenue of
\$1,950 a year. The professors may now
be removed from the beneficiaries, as the
fund is so reduced. Losing in the two
directions indicated, \$4,650 a year, equi-
valent to a capital of \$80,000. The ad-
ditional endowment when received, will
not make so much difference after all.

An attempt is being made to introduce
English pheasants among the Rocky
Mountains, and Lord Morley has already
despatched a number of fine healthy birds
to a friend who is settled in that quarter.
