The first international match for the world title was held in Bermuda in 1950. An American team won the event in a three-cornered match which included a British team and a Swedish-Icelandic team.

This hand was the very last one played in the match between England and the United States. It brought to a dramatic climax the 100-board match which the Americans won by 3,600 points.

The entire interest of the hand centers on the bidding. Tario (for England) opened with a club. Stayman doubled. Over Gardner's spade bid Rapee jumped to four hearts to show his solid suit.

**Moon Rocket, Nuclear Plane Planned By Russia This Year**

LONDON (AP)—The Russians will be able to send a rocket around the moon, and fly a nuclear-powered civilian plane during 1959, Moscow radio said Thursday.

A French-language broadcast entitled Soviet Science in 1959 said the New Year "will see still greater development in the field of interplanetary rockets and Sputniks."

"Here progress of technology and automation will without doubt make it possible to send an interplanetary rocket around the moon in 1959," the broadcast said. By using the word "possible," Moscow avoided saying flatly that the Russians would try.

**U. S. ATTEMPTS**

The United States Air Force has made three unsuccessful attempts to send rockets around the moon. The U. S. Army failed four weeks ago to hit the moon. A second army attempt is expected within the new few months.

Ever since the Russians sent up their first Sputnik 15 months ago, the West has been expecting a Red attempt to shoot the moon. Completely unconfirmed reports have circulated that the Soviet Union has tried and failed at least once.

The broadcast noted that Soviet scientists are concentrating on the problem of nuclear reactors.

**CLOSELY LINKED**

It declared: "The prospects of conquering these sources of concentrated power are closely linked with the problem of penetrating into cosmic space. Soviet scientists have been working for a long time on the problem of efficient use of atomic engines for civil aviation and the results already obtained make it possible

**B.A. Oil Co. Earnings Down**

TORONTO (CP)—British American Oil Co. Ltd. estimates its 1958 earnings in the range of \$20,000,000 to \$21,000,000, compared with \$22,000,000 in 1957, E. D. Brockett, president, says in his fourth quarter report to shareholders.

The company had a record volume of refined product sales, Mr. Brockett said, but rising costs, lower product realization and curtailed demand for Canadian crude oil had an adverse effect on earnings.

The company's crude production in western Canada in 1958 is estimated at 29,589 barrels a day, compared with 34,987 barrels in 1957.

**Patient Influx Expected By N.S. Hospitals**

HALIFAX (CP)—Hospital officials predict an influx of patients will crowd their institutions when Nova Scotia enters the national hospital insurance plan, New Year's Day, but two days before the deadline there was no sign of congestion.

At Nova Scotia's largest general hospital, the Victoria General here, only 297 of its 550 beds were occupied Tuesday. Dr. M.R. MacDonald, assistant superintendent, said things are usually slack at the Christmas season but he believes many people are waiting for free hospital care to begin Jan. 1.

He expects the hospital will be filled to capacity again next week.

At the 223-bed Halifax Infirmary 26 beds were vacant. However, hospital supervisor Sister Catherine Gerard said occupancy is higher than usual for the holiday season.
