#### Potato Disease.

#### The Delegates Reports.

THE Minister of Agriculture made a decided hit when he invited delegates representing the tenant farmers of the Mother Country to visit Canada. Copies of their reports to their constituents are now before us in the form of a "Blue Book." The reports are without exception highly favorable to Canada; and cannot fail to impress those who think of leaving the old land with the idea that they will here find conditions of life second only to those existing at home. It is to be regretted that none of the delegates visited this Province.

#### Development of Our Iron Mines.

THE *Truro Sun* publishes statistics, showing an increase of \$15,604.32 in the Intercolonial Railway receipts of March, April and May, at Londonderry Iron Mines over the receipts of the railway at the same station during the corresponding months of last year. It says that for the three months the station received 3,391 loaded cars, and forwarded 407. These gratifying statistics show the beneficial effect of the impetus recently given to the production of iron in this country. Both iron and coal mines of Canada have greatly increased their outputs during the past year; and we sincerely hope that the development of these immense sources of wealth and independence will go on.

#### Gold Mining in Nova Scotia.

A Halifax despatch says:—  
What is known as the Skerry lead, at Montague, and for which \$30,000 were offered by an American Company a short time since and refused, was lost about a fortnight since. It was recovered a day or two ago about two and a half feet south of the place where it was lost and appears from the specimens already taken out to be richer than ever.

The free claim given to Mr. McQuarrie, at Montague, for being the first to discover gold in that locality, some 16 years since, and which was sold by him and others associated with him, and afterwards abandoned by the purchasers, has recently been prospected over by one of the then purchasers Mr. Taylor, and it is reported that he struck a rich bed there two or three days ago.

The tea trade in India is very much depressed. The impression is eminently prevalent that a crisis is close at hand which may disastrously affect many companies and planters in Assam and other tea districts.

The Prince of Wales has been promoted to the colonelcy of the First and Second Life Guards and of the Horse Guards. He retains the command of the Tenth Hussars. A handsome sum will thus be added to his income without increase of responsibility.

A HOUSE, four barns, a number of cattle and a quantity of grain were destroyed by fire at Andover, N. B., on the 17th.

### The Professional Race.

(Halifax Herald's Account.)

PROVIDENCE, R. I., June 18, 1880.

Another long wait, with the professionals in line, before they started, which they did at 5.29 p. m. Plaisted fairly jumped his frail craft to the front, and Ross was close at his heels, while over on the East Providence side, Hanlan and Boyd were seen almost together. The two latter kept it for about sixty strokes, when the champion shot away ahead of the Britisher, and began to creep up to Plaisted, who was leader, and right nobly was he cutting out the pace. Ross was close behind him, however, and at the quarter mile was on even terms. Then Hanlan, who had left Boyd, began to tell with his powerful regular strokes, and slowly to creep past Ross. So tremendous was his speed that at the half mile he had about half a length lead on the field. A prettier sight is seldom seen than was presented by these four men who were rowing nearly abreast, straining every nerve for mastery.—Hanlan, Ross, Plaisted and Riley, who had come up rapidly on the finish of the first mile. Away they went from half a mile to a mile and a half, when the champion, to the surprise of those who could see the course, stopped rowing, and Ross swept gradually ahead, with Plaisted and Riley neck and neck. Just beside, while the leaders were struggling so gallantly, Lee, Ten Eyck and Gaudier were having a close contest among themselves. Dempsey, Delane, and Boyd were in another triangular contest and brought up the rear of the procession. Hanlan, when he stopped rowing, put his hand to his side, as if in pain for a moment, then he pulled his sculls with determination, and rowed with a will, holding second place to the turn, which he made immediately after Ross. From then to the finish, he slacked up, and rowed home leisurely. Ross seeing that Hanlan was disabled turned buoy No. 1, and fearing that he was wrong, also turned buoy No. 2, and squared away homeward at a magnificent pace, leading the field by at least twenty lengths to the finish, and crossing the line in 28 min. 54 sec., an easy winner, amid the cheers of thousands of spectators and sailors from the yachts round about. Plaisted and Riley, after a struggle and great liability of fouling turned the stake together. As soon as they were fairly on their way home, Riley, by extra exertions managed to shake Plaisted and was a dozen lengths ahead. At the two-mile stake, having passed Hanlan he securely settled down to second place, which he gained without much further exertion, passing the second stake boat in 30 min. 30 sec. After Plaisted, Ten Eyck turned, then Gaudier, Lee, Delane and Boyd, Dempsey giving up the race before reaching the turn. As Ross had it all his own way on the home stretch, so did Riley as second man, and Ten Eyck as third man, who came in third in 30 min. 58 sec., five or six lengths ahead of Plaisted, whose boat was half full of water. Craft on craft on the river are now rowed in the general turnover at the finish, shut out the others, and the great race was over. Various rumors are abroad to-night, relative to Hanlan giving out, but the referee, Curtis, says he was out of condition, and lost the race through illness caused by not being acclimated.

#### The War in South America.

Late dispatches confirm the news that the ports of Buenos Ayres and Usanda De Barragon have been closed, and that mails are not allowed to land. Usanda is a village on a bay of the same name, nearly in the Argentine Republic, about thirty miles south-east of Buenos Ayres in the estuary of the Plate River. The British squadron now in those waters has been ordered to proceed up the River Plate to the city of Buenos Ayres. There is reported to be less probability than ever of a peaceful settlement of the dispute between the existing Legislative Assembly and Governor and the faction claiming the right to power. It is understood that the revolutionary party demand the restoration of the liberty of the press and of constitutional government, the latter having been practically abolished by the acts of recent executives. It is also rumored that the purpose of the British squadron in going to Buenos Ayres is to ascertain whether the mediation of England would be accepted if offered, and to look after the safety and interest of resident British subjects and of the large amount of commerce ordinarily carried on between Great Britain and the Argentine Republic through the port. Should the ports above-named remain closed for any considerable time, it will be a serious thing for English exporters who ship large quantities of manufactured goods thither.

#### More Trouble in Ireland.

Despatches from Dublin state that the land agitation is seriously increasing in all parts of Ireland. The peasantry are reported to be very much excited by the shooting the other day, at Hestrum, of Meehan, by Henry B. Atcheson, near Ballinavore. They characterize Atcheson's act as a cold-blooded murder, and seem to have made up their minds to tolerate no more attempts at eviction, no matter what the result of resistance may be. It is stated that Atcheson has received letters notifying him that the eviction of any of the tenants will end in his being shot.

Intelligence from various districts speaks of the rising of the peasantry in arms, and states that companies have been formed, and are drilling regularly. The situation is considered much graver than ever, and unless Parliament takes early and efficient action to relieve the tenantry from the oppressive land laws, general revolt and bloodshed may be anticipated.

THE *St. John News* states that it has been many years since the harbor presented as lively an appearance at this season as the present one.
