Man Committed For Supreme Court Trial

GEORGETOWN — Gerald Archibald MacLean of Murray River was committed yesterday to stand trial at the next sitting of Supreme Court in Georgetown. MacLean appeared yesterday before Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, in Kings County Magistrate's Court at the conclusion of his preliminary hearing on a charge of possession of an offensive weapon (a butcher knife) for a purpose dangerous to the public. The Crown was represented by Deputy Attorney-General J. Arthur McGuigan, QC, and the accused by Bert Campbell.

Four Crown witnesses were heard: Lovatt Bell, Mrs. Cecilia Bell, Andrew Junior Bell, all of Murray River and Cpl. D. J. Hender, Montague RCMP detachment. The accused did not make any statement or call any witnesses. He was remanded in custody with bail set at \$500 with two justifiable sureties of \$250 each.

HAD ARGUMENT

The charge arose from an incident in Murray River Dec. 26, 1964. Evidence of Crown witnesses said the accused, following an earlier meeting, an argument with Lovatt Bell, later was outside Bell's home, and when Bell entered the house and closed the door, the butcher knife was driven through the quarter-inch plywood panel of the door. Mrs. Bell said she called the RCMP who were soon on the scene and took possession of the knife, which had earlier been taken from the door. Cpl. Hender said he and Cst. David Power had apprehended MacLean shortly afterwards in Murray River and took him to Kings County Jail in Georgetown.

CN Changes Aid Travel To Island

MONCTON (Special) — The bus service between Charlottetown and Amherst which cut hours off the time needed to travel between Prince Edward Island and Montreal last summer is being reintroduced by Canadian National Railways April 25.

The bus service is one of the changes in the new CN schedule which comes into effect with the introduction of daylight saving time April 25.

The buses will leave Charlottetown at 6:40 a.m. and 11 a.m. ADT to connect with the Ocean Limited eastbound and westbound at Amherst. From Amherst the buses will leave at 11:05 a.m. and 7:15 p.m. ADT to take passengers from the westbound Ocean Limited and Scotian to Summerside and Charlottetown. This will reduce travelling time to and from such places as Montreal and Halifax and Island points by as much as four and a half hours.

Under the new schedule the Ocean Limited will leave Montreal at 5:05 p.m. EDT instead of 8:30 p.m., and will take 30 minutes less to make the trip to Halifax. It will arrive in Amherst at 10:57 a.m. Westbound the Ocean will leave Halifax half an hour later — 12:45 p.m. ADT instead of 12:15, but will arrive in Montreal at the same time as at present — 8:30 a.m.

Connecting rail services between Truro and Sydney, Moncton and Saint John provide fast links between these points and Prince Edward Island. As in previous years, CN trains, buses and ferries on Prince Edward Island will operate on daylight saving time. On Mainland Canada CN clocks will continue to record standard time throughout the summer.

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Fire Chief Comments After Blaze

MONTAGUE — A grass fire yesterday morning required the services of the Montague fire brigade to bring it under control.

The fire started about 11 a.m. and for a time threatened to spread to homes in the vicinity. The property is owned by E.F. MacDonald who was not home at the time.

Fire Chief D.H. Coffin, following the fire, stated grass fires must not be started within the town limits without permission and he hoped this one was no indication of what to expect in the next few weeks.

He also stated on being questioned that no grass or any other fire would be responded to outside the town limits unless the \$3 fee was paid unless it threatened the town.

In past years the members of the brigade have spent many hours away from their employment fighting such fires, he said, and it is unfair to expect them to do so in the future.

He pointed out anyone can start a fire "but it takes many men and hard work to extinguish them when they get out of control."

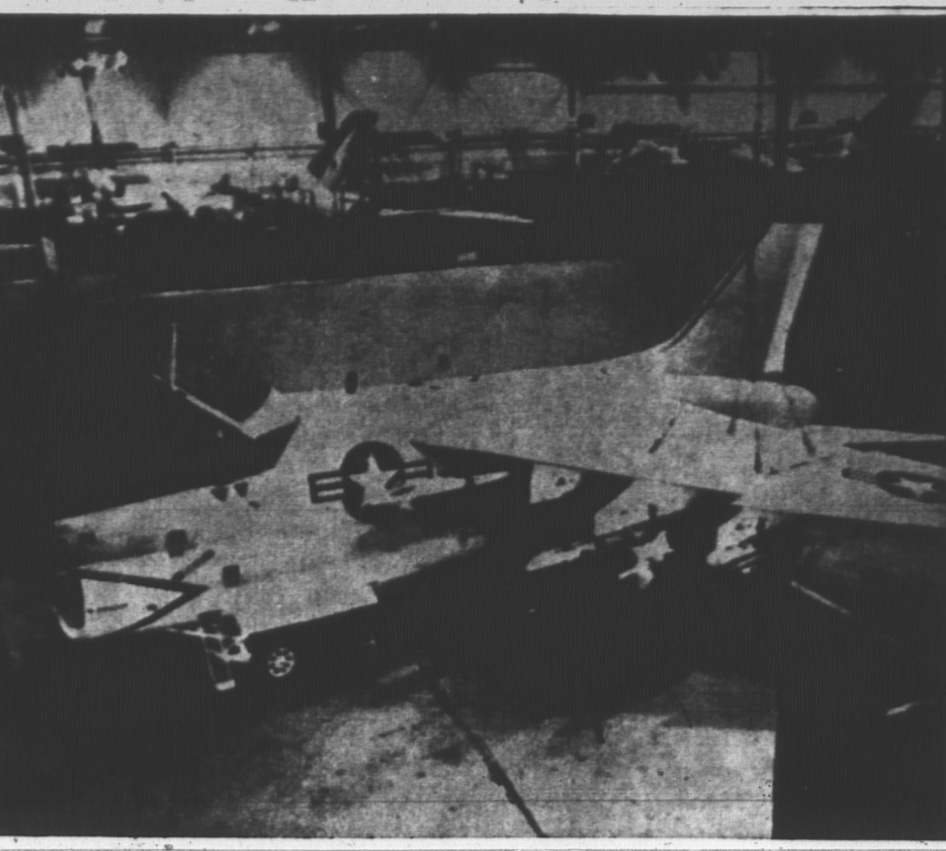

The resolution was one of several passed at a board of governors meeting held at the federation home with Charles Campbell presiding.
