PRICES AND PROSPECTS.

Dr. Robert Griffin, the well-known English statistician, has lately made an interesting statement before the Royal Commission on Agriculture.

On the question of prices Dr. Griffin presented a calculation showing the value of the total agricultural production of the United Kingdom in 1891, at the prices which actually prevailed in that year.

The annual report of the Saving Bank of New South Wales shows that at the end of 1893 the number of depositors was 65,657, having at their credit a sum of £3,302,458.

It is, therefore, expected that the gold supply will presently be above average.

NO FOREIGN INTERFERENCE Will Be Permitted With the Policy of Great Britain in Africa.
