POLICE STATISTICS.—There were twenty-one arrests in Montreal last month against twenty-seven for the same month last year. The receipts from fines and costs this year amounted to \$45 against \$41.60 for October of last year.

REMEMORDED CHANGES.—The Toronto Globe's London cable says: "It is rumored that Lord Lansdowne is to be appointed British ambassador at Rome, and that he will be succeeded in the Governor-generalship by Baron Stanley, of Preston."

INSOLVENCY LEGISLATION.—At the meeting of the Montreal Board of Trade, held on Tuesday last, a letter was read from Hon. W. W. Sullivan, acknowledging the receipt of the Council's memorandum regarding the desirability of uniform insolvency legislation, and stating that the proposition would be duly considered by the Provincial government.

A GOOD ANSWER.—The Manitoba census furnishes an answer to the complaint that no great progress is made there. The increase in population in the five years ending 1886 is 75 per cent. The number of acres under cultivation tripled in the same period. The wheat crop of 1887 was six times, and that of 1887 about twelve times that of 1881.—Sun.

The Fisheries Question.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.

At a meeting to-day of the Chamber of Commerce, resolutions were adopted favoring a peaceful settlement of the Canadian fisheries question. A committee was appointed to investigate the possibility of the material expansion of our commerce in this direction by inviting arguments for and against Commercial Union with Canada and documentary evidence as to the prospects of trade between the two countries and to report such recommendations as will enable the chamber to contribute an influence to an early adjustment of the fishery question, and the procuring of such legislation as will promote the interests of the commerce of the country, should such action be deemed advisable.

The British Arbitration Commission.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Nov. 3.

The members of the British Arbitration Commission, visiting Andrew Carnegie, are expressing opinions without reserve upon Irish home rule. M. B. Proband, member for Glasgow, said Home Rule means much more than it literally appears on the surface. It means something for the United Kingdom. It means no separate government for Ireland, no separation from the Kingdom only local self-rule. With Home Rule accomplished, the first decisive step in National reform will have been made. John Inglis said it will come without a resort to arms, without the necessity of a popular uprising or overtax. It will merely be a peaceful triumph of the Democrats.

Toronto Municipal Election.

TORONTO, Nov. 3.

Mayor Howland announced to-day, amidst great excitement, that he wouldn't run for the mayoralty. The council tonight resolved to submit to the people at the next election the question of reducing the term of offices from 150 to 100, and shop licenses proportionally.

Summoned Under the Crimes Act.

DUBLIN, Nov. 3.

Thirty persons have been summoned under the Crimes Act at Ballyhanna, to answer charges in connection with evictions, the majority being young girls. Pyne and Gilhooly, Nationalist members of Parliament, are also summoned.

A Big Law Suit.

OTTAWA, Nov. 3.

A suit for \$40,000 damages has been entered by the Dominion Government against the owners of the vessel which recently ran down and sank the lightship at the lower Traverse.

Assigned.

HAMILTON, Ont., Nov. 3.

John Harvey & J. B. McLeston, Proprietors of the Hespeler Woolen Mills have assigned for the benefit of their creditors. The liabilities are over \$200,000; assets nominally the same.

Commercial Union.

TORONTO, Nov. 2.

A Commercial Union Club was formed here to-night. At a cabinet meeting of 400 influential citizens Prof. Goldwin Smith was elected President.

Vigorous Measures.

LONDON, Nov. 2.

The cabinet to-day resolved to continue the present vigorous policy in Ireland, especially as regards speeches at proclaimed meetings.

PROMPT PAYMENT.—The New York Life Assurance Company carried a policy for \$20,258 on the life of the late Senator Senecal. THE TWENTY-FOUR HOUR SYSTEM.—Sandford Fleming, the originator of the twenty-four hour system, has received a letter from the Japanese minister in London, stating that this system will be adopted throughout the Japanese empire on January 1st next. He is also informed that it is giving satisfactory results in Sweden, and expresses the belief that it is only a matter of a few years before the system will be universally adopted.
