MONDAY

ACCOSTED ON STREET - Persistent rumors in Summerside have been circulating for some time that a wandering "Jack the Rigger" is on the loose in this town. On Saturday evening, this reportedly scantly clad lothario accosted a local girl on Eustace Street but she was able to elude the fellow and reach the safety of her home. Although a member of the household immediately made a search of the district no trace of the fellow could be found.

A lifelong ambition was satisfied by Col. W. H. Ellis, Command Signal Officer, Headquarters Eastern Command when he travelled from Halifax to attend the 5 Signal Regiment's Annual Mess Dinner held at the Charlottetown Hotel Saturday night.

In a brief address he thanked Col. K. M. Johnson for the invitation and said, "I am very happy to be here, to meet some old friends and to make new ones and to achieve a lifelong ambition which was to come to P. E. I. and visit its famous Signals Regiment." In response Col. Johnson expressed his hope that Col. Ellis would visit Charlottetown more often in the future.

A serious fire Saturday night completely destroyed the farm home of Mr. Frederick Trainor, Johnson's River, and all its contents. Mr. Trainor managed to escape safely with his children, one of whom was in bed when the fire started.

Mr. Trainor, who had been working in the barn with a gasoline lantern, had returned to the house to refill the lantern which had burned dry. As he was pouring the gasoline, the lantern exploded causing superficial burns on Mr. Trainor's hands. The resulting flames quickly enveloped the house which burned to the ground within a short time. Adding to the loss was the fact that at the time of the blaze Mr. Trainor had \$340.00 in cash in the house. It also was lost.

TUESDAY

The death occurred at his home in Kensington yesterday afternoon of one of the town's most prominent citizens, Mr. Wesley Champion at the age of 66 years.

Mr. Champion, who was by occupation a barber, was born at Darnley and in his early years spent some time in the U.S.A. and then returning to his native province he took up residence in Kensington and has lived there ever since.

Believed to be the first time presented here, the Canadian Forces Decoration has been awarded to WO 1 Eugene G. Lewis, Regimental Sergeant Major of 21st Armored Brigade Headquarters here. The presentation was made by Major J. T. Davies of the Headquarters staff, in the absence of Brig. W. W. Reid who was out of the Province.

The award to WO 1 Lewis was based on his 12 years service with the Reserve Army Force and his excellent record during that period.

High honor was conferred on a cattle breeder in this Province when Major MacRae, Central Royalty, was chosen as reserve judge for Ayrshire at the Canadian National Exhibition to be held in Toronto this year. It is the first time an Islander has been selected for the post.

Major MacRae is well known among cattlemen, especially in Eastern Canada where he has frequently been a judge of the breed in past years. Some of the fairs where he officiated include the Central Nova Scotia Exhibition at Truro and the Ormston, Que., fair.

Dr. H. Terry Van Patter, husband of the former Helen Elaine Porter of this city, has won the \$8,000 Allan Blair Memorial fellowship for 1952-54, according to recent reports from Montreal.

Dr. Van Patter, 25-year-old Montreal pathologist, and his wife, the daughter of Mrs. Lockie Porter, Charlottetown, were married here last summer at St. James Church.

This award, offered on a strict competitive basis, will enable Dr. Van Patter, to gain a year's advanced study in pathology under the guidance of the eminent Dr. Fred W. Stewart of the Memorial Centre for Cancer and Allied Diseases, New York. The other year will be spent at leading British cancer centres.

A young man from Borden, charged with "joy riding" appeared before Magistrate R. S. Hinton in county magistrate's court in Summerside yesterday morning and was remanded for trial later this week.

He was arrested about midnight on Saturday when Constables MacKay and Champion spotted a car belonging to Ross McEwen, Stanley Bridge, that had been stolen earlier that evening from in front of the Imperial Diner.

The Constables gave chase and in endeavoring to escape the police, the accused found himself cornered in an alley way leading to Holman's Wharf, where he abandoned the car and took off running across the harbor ice with Constable Champion in pursuit.

Inspired by a desire to eliminate the frequent theft of cars in Summerside, the Constable proved to be the faster runner and soon had overtaken the culprit and placed him under arrest.—S.

WEDNESDAY

Mr. Lloyd Rogerson, manager of the Clwyd Creamery and Cold Storage Co., last night was elected the new commissioner in Craupaid at the second annual meeting of the residents of that village—the first in P. E. I. to be incorporated under the Village Service Act. Under the act the affairs of the village are conducted by three commissioners, one of whom retires from office each year.

Mr. Rogerson, whose election was without opposition, succeeds Mr. John Leard, who retired from the board of commissioners at last night's meeting. The other commissioners are B. C. Wood and Arthur Simmons.

The official opening of the new one-room classroom school at Margate to accommodate grades one to seven took place on Monday evening, February 4. The chairman of the meeting was Mr. Heath Mayhew, one of the trustees of the school.

Present for the occasion were Premier J. Walter Jones, who is also Minister of Education, Hon. C. C. Baker, Minister of Agriculture, Dr. W. Shaw, Deputy Minister and Director of Education, Mr. Malcolm MacKenzie, chief superintendent of schools and Mr. C. B. Jelly, superintendent of schools for this section of the province.

A lively and frequently heated meeting last night saw the election of a new commissioner and the resignation of the two other members when the voters of Parkdale met at the Hall to fill the vacancy due to the expiration of Commissioner Henry MacLaren's term of one year.

Elected for three years was Mr. Maurice McAleer on a ballot which saw him win by a count of 70 to 50 over his only opponent, Mr. Harry Hennessey. Shortly after the announcement of the result of the election Commissioner Ben Birt, whose term still had one year to run, expressed his disappointment over the expressions of opinions heard on the actions of the commissioners and tendered his resignation. He was followed a few minutes later by Commissioner Edwin Cook, chairman, whose term has two years to go.

As a result of the resignations a special meeting will be called at a later date to elect two new commissioners. Dissension was apparent at the start of proceedings when the Commissioners were criticized for the form of notice and advertisement calling the meeting. It was claimed from the floor by Mr. Wellington Dixon that the meeting called was an annual meeting of the Commissioners—not of the electors.

THURSDAY

Bold burglars sometime Tuesday night or early Wednesday morning "jimmied" their way into Courtes Rexall Drug Store in Summerside through the front door facing Central Street.

The Summerside police are investigating the theft and yesterday rounded up several persons for questioning.

Included in the merchandise stolen by the thieves were cigarettes, cigarette lighters, and billfolds. The thieves made their escape through a side door into First Street.

This drug store was broken into a year ago last December, and the persons responsible for this break were subsequently apprehended and punished.

"The condition of cattle in general throughout the Province was exceptionally good when going into winter quarters and we have every reason to believe that the average producer of both milk and beef products will benefit very greatly from the sales which they have had from time to time," stated Mr. L. W. Roper, Dominion livestock fieldman in his report to the Provincial Agricultural Conference yesterday.

The export trade from this Province is reported to be running considerably in the year 1951, but it was noticeable that the few buyers who visited here during the summer months were most anxious to buy dairy cows of a higher quality than previous years, and they also paid a much higher price.

As a result of the veterinary policy of the Provincial Department of Agriculture, five veterinarians have been placed in the Province, covering definite territories within the limits of which each man operates on prescribed fees and regulations, stated Mr. W. R. Shaw, Deputy Minister, in reporting to the Agricultural Council conference yesterday. Headed by Dr. George Fisher, who is in charge of this branch and also of the agricultural laboratory on Prince Street, the veterinarians include Dr. Glen R. Hendry, Kensington, Dr. J. E. Stiers, Charlottetown, Dr. J. R. McCrea, Montague, and Dr. H. L. O'Leary.

Each vet is subsidized from \$2,200 to \$2,800 according to the territory in which he is placed. The service in the main has proven satisfactory, although some further arrangements may be necessary in order to adequately take care of the demand, Mr. Shaw reported. Student aid was employed during the year to assist in the field work.

Mayor J. David Stewart was re-elected by acclamation yesterday when his was the only nomination filed on Nomination Day, one week prior to the Bi-ennial civic election for mayor and councillors.

The only other nominee to receive an acclamation was Councillor J. Arthur Gormley who has represented Ward 1 in the City Council for the past two years.

Contests will be waged in Wards 2, 3, 4 and 5 with the only surprise coming in Ward 2 where Mr. M. Alban Farmer, former Councillor who was expected to be a candidate for the Mayoralty, will oppose present Councillor Lester P. O'Donnell in a two-way battle for the Council seat.

In Ward 3 Councillor Wendell H. Beaton will be opposed by Mr. Frank J. Storey, well known businessman of this city. Each of the first three wards in the city is represented by a single Councillor. Ward 4 is represented by two Councillors, who will have four men in the field next Wednesday. They are present Councillors G. R. Keefe and C. M. Cox, and two new entrants into the Council field, Mr. W. J. Brown, manager of the Forum, and Mr. Elmer MacDonald well known grocer of this city.

The biggest of the city's wards, Ward 5, which elects three representatives to the Council, will see five men seeking election. They are Dr. L. E. Prowse and Councillor Edwin C. Johnstone, members of the past Council and Mr. T. Roy Cudmore, proprietor of a men's wear store here. Mr. P. R. McCormac, operator of a laundry, and

Mr. Charles E. Worth, barber. Because of the lack of a contest for the Mayoralty observers of past civic elections believe that only a small vote will be polled.

Although the main interest in the city centres on the election of the Mayor and members of the Council, there will also be a contest for the offices of Water Commissioners, who are elected separately and independent of the City Council.

Named to contest the three posts as Commissioners are present members Mr. W. D. Gillis and H. Roy Bevan, and Mr. Ernest Clawson and Mr. Stewart Ives. There are three Commissioners to be elected.

FRIDAY

APPOINTED J. P.—Mr. Victor Buntain, South Rustico, has been named a Justice of the Peace, it was announced by Premier J. Walter Jones following a meeting of the Provincial Government yesterday.

High ranking members of the Government and the judiciary as well as members of the Bar and court officials were sworn in yesterday as they took the oath of allegiance to the new sovereign.

Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell of the Supreme Court was the first to swear allegiance. The oath was administered by Mr. Justice M. R. McGuigan. The Chief Justice then administered the oath to His Honor, Lieutenant Governor T. W. Prowse. As he did he remarked that he wished to express "to you as our Sovereign's representative in this Province the deep regret of the Court at the passing of His Majesty the King. It is a privilege to gather with you and renew our declaration of fealty to Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Elizabeth 2nd."

Shearing schools in Prince Edward Island, where a number of the necessary husbandry practices in sheep production could be illustrated, was suggested as a matter for immediate consideration by Mr. H. W. Clay, senior livestock fieldman, Dominion Department of Agriculture, in reporting to the Agricultural Council conference now sitting in Charlottetown.

Mr. Clay pointed out that the sheep population in the Province is being increased yearly, but the necessary good husbandry practices "are woefully absent in too many of these newer flocks."

Over two million bushels of seed potatoes were shipped from the Island from January to the end of the shipping season last year, bringing the total for the crop year to 3,386,208 bushels. The figures were by Mr. H. L. MacLaren, district inspector, Seed Potato Certification, in reporting to the Agricultural Council conference now in session in Charlottetown.

He gave the following tables indicating the particulars with reference to destinations, varieties and boatloadings by bushels: U.S.A. (28 States) 2,380,896; Other Canadian Provinces, 737,030; Cuba, 170,053; Chile, 36,705; Jamaica, 27,190; Israel, 24,749; Venezuela, 5,499; Union of South Africa, 3,365; Haiti, 666; British Honduras 55. Total 3,386,208 bushels.

"Dear Mr. Yeo, I have your letter of Jan. 15th, bringing to my attention the resolution passed by the Town Council of Montague, protesting the reversion to mail service by railway, and asking for the transportation of mail by motor vehicles to continue. In this connection, I wish to advise you that the question of satisfactory mail service east of Charlottetown is under constant consideration and receiving continuous study. Yours Sincerely, G. Major L. E. Wellner, second in command of the 28th L. A. A. Regiment here, is presently in Halifax where he will confer with Eastern Command headquarters officers on the form of the memorial service in which all service units will participate on the day of the funeral of his late Majesty King George Sixth.

Officers of all units will take an oath of allegiance to Queen Elizabeth Second and will be required to wear a black armband during the prescribed mourning period. The band will be three and one-quarter inches wide and will be worn on the left arm.

On the day of the funeral the men of the 28th L.A.A. Regiment will fire a 56-gun salute from Victoria Park. The number of guns fired represents one round for each year of the life of the late King. The practice follows that which was established on the occasion of the death of King George V when a 71-gun salute was fired.

MONTREAL, Feb. 7.—(CP)—A small single-engine two seater Fleet Canuck airplane is missing en route from Cartierville Airport here to Magantic, Quebec.

An official of Cartierville Airport said the plane took off at 11 a. m. today. He said the pilot's name was "Holman." He did not know the man's first name.

Holman told airport officials early today that he bought the plane in Toronto and flew it to Montreal last night. He said he intended flying his aircraft home. Officials said he would have to stop at Magantic, Que., to refuel. A report from Quebec City said the plane was last reported this afternoon at 3:15 flying between St. John's and Chamby, Que. (In Toronto, Leavens Brothers Air Services said they sold a plane the other day, to Robert Holman of Summerside, P. E. I., who planned to fly it east.) On his flight from Toronto he was accompanied by a woman instructor. She returned by air to Toronto early today. (At Halifax Search and Rescue said they understood that plans for a search were being made by Search and Rescue at Trenton, Ontario. However, there was no definite information on search plans.)
