Canada's Top Juniors Practice Here Today

British Columbia won the national championship on Saturday in Charlottetown for the next five days. A member of the western team, Wayne Volmer, was named MVP for the individual championship.

The last of the field of 80, mostly from Ontario and Quebec, arrived in Charlottetown last evening. It is the first time a Canadian golf championship has been held in Prince Edward Island.

The 168-year Bellevue course will be available to competitors throughout the day for official practice rounds.

A number of the title-seeking juniors have been in Charlottetown for the past few days brushing up on the narrow Island course. The qualifying handicaps are eight.

NO. 1-355 yards (par 4) — Drive and a short iron to the green makes this an easy start.

NO. 2-345 yards (par 4) — Slightly downhill to sloping green. Trees line the right side of fairway, which is trapped on right 210 yards from tee and parallel to No. 1.

NO. 3-400 yards (par 4) — Fair way uphill, bounded on right and left by wooded area. Good long tee shot is essential, otherwise golfer finds himself shooing blind to flat green. Fairway directly behind green. Fairway parallel to No. 2.

NO. 4-365 yards (par 4) — Calls for straight tee shot on downhill fairway, bounded right by rough and left by wooded area. Flat green, difficult to hold balls, with bunkers front and left. Fairway parallel to No. 3.

NO. 5-130 yards (par 3) — Pretty hole. Prevailing winds make iron selection difficult. Sloping green bunkered left and right.

NO. 6-330 yards (par 3) — Long dog's leg in right, with out-of-bounds on right of fairway all the way to green bunkered right and left. On left and 900 yards out is wooded area. Real trouble hole.

NO. 7-205 yards (par 3) — Narrow uphill fairway to green. Heavily wooded area on both sides. Tee shot needs a lot of carry to green bunkered right and left, with wooded area directly behind.

NO. 8-405 yards (par 5) — Beautiful hole requiring two long shots to green. Water hazard in the form of a deep gully 25 yards front of green. Second shot needs good carry. Real test of skill.

NO. 9-130 yards (par 3) — Again prevailing winds play important role in club selection. Short carries same hazard and penalty as No. 8. Easy par 3.

NO. 10-220 yards (par 4) — Tough par 4, slightly uphill, on too much roll. Wooded areas on both sides of fairway 100 yards from green. Another long tee shot required, otherwise green is partly hidden on second shot.

NO. 11-155 yards (par 3) — Short narrow fairway completely surrounded by wooded area. Flat rolling green, bunkered right and left.

NO. 12-335 yards (par 5) — Long straight and wide fairway. Picturesque hole with new clubhouse directly behind green. Wooded areas on both sides 220 yards from tee, then opens up. Hook or slice spell trouble.

NO. 13-465 yards (par 5) — Sharp dog's leg left to right and narrow fairway. Straight long hole requiring an open up green. Heavily wooded areas on both sides all the way to green.

NO. 14-275 yards (par 4) — New, tough hole, with wooded areas on both sides of fairway. Large green is uphill. Second shot can golf foggers.

NO. 15-510 yards (par 5) — Another new hole, with wide fairway. Wooded area on right can spell trouble. Bunkers right and left yards from tee. Very large green.

NO. 16-160 yards (par 3) — 7-21, most hole with wide green on both sides of fairway and extremely large green, bunkered right and left. Difficult front shot.

NO. 17-365 yards (par 4) — Very narrow hole, with wooded areas on both sides all the way to stepping green, with more wood behind. All shots have to be straight.

NO. 18-440 yards (par 4) — Many feel this should be a par 5. Long narrow fairway opening up at the 225-yard marker. Out-of-bounds on right all the way to green. Two well-placed shots necessary to hit green, with clubhouse and parking area directly behind. Lovely hole with a finish.

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Maddin Top Star At Track Meet

WINNIPEG (CP) — A new 100-yard dash record was set in a trim white uniform that identified Winnipeg's Flying M club. Maddin, a 17-year-old high school senior, set the record in 15.7 seconds in the 100-yard dash. Maddin, established records in two events making their first appearance on the championship program and anchored a Manitoba midget women's relay team that shattered a Canadian age-class record.

Paced by a strong contingent from Toronto, eastern competitors won 45 of 71 events. Ten standing records were broken, 13 records were set in new events and one national mark was equalled.

Mew Maddin won the midget women's 100 yard dash in 11.6 seconds, the 60-yard dash in 10.2 seconds and the 220-yard sprint in 25.5 seconds. Her time in the 60 and 220 yards established unofficial Canadian records.

ANCHORS RELAY TEAM

She anchored a Manitoba team to 50.7 seconds in the midget women's 400 yard relay — two-thirds of a second faster than the Ontario record set in 1962 by the second team.
