Further Drop in Unemployment Benefits Noted

Less than half the number of people who were drawing Unemployment Insurance benefits in late March are still receiving weekly payments.

In the last week in March, 1750 claimants were in receipt of weekly checks, as compared to 836 as of yesterday.

The swift decline in the total is an annual occurrence, and follows in the footsteps of increasing employment every spring.

Next week Employment officials predict that the figure will be sliced still lower when the lobster canneries open. Hundreds of men and women will become re-employed at North Lake, Souris, Gasbeaux, Murray Harbor, Montserrat, Lower Montague, Georgetown, Moreil, Savage Harbor and Rustico.

At all of these fishing centres the usual last minute preparations for lobster fishing are being made, as the plants and boats make ready for the big event.

The local National Employment office reports a scarcity of farm labor, a problem which has become almost chronic at this season of the year.

Some German farm laborers were available about two months ago, and most of the farmers who applied for them at that time have either received them, or will be allotted one of the newcomers in the next few weeks.

Farmers who are applying for help now are less fortunate, and it is very doubtful whether many farm vacancies can be filled.

There is a large number of carpenters and very little local construction work under way, or in sight, to absorb the surplus.

Labrador was expected to provide employment for many of these tradesmen, but the American authorities have reduced hiring drastically for the present at least. It is possible that big scale recruiting of labor for the Labrador job will be resumed later on when the American contractors are given details as to projects not yet completed, and others in the planning stage.

Meantime it is not expected that any more workers will be recruited for the North Country until late in May, and then only a limited number.

Several N.Y. Banks Boost Loan Rate

NEW YORK, (CP) — Several major commercial banks in New York City Monday raised their "prime" loan rate to 3 1/2 per cent from 3 per cent, effective immediately. This is the highest minimum borrowing rate in the banking system since 1944.

Financial circles predicted that other commercial banking institutions will soon follow suit.

COSTLY SUBWAY

TORONTO, (CP)—Toronto's new subway, a 4 1/2-mile underground railway running up the city's main street, now will cost at least \$50,000,000. That's \$21,650,000 more than the original estimate. The publicly-owned Toronto Transportation Commission told Mayor Allan Lamport in a letter Monday it wants to borrow \$18,000,000 to finish the job and buy some new subway cars.

Heavy Dockets At Magistrate's Court

In Queens County Magistrate's Court on Saturday before Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet, two speeders from Hunter River, were fined \$10 and costs or 10 days each, one from Milton was fined \$15 and costs or 10 days, one from Charlottetown \$20 and costs or 20 days, and a resident of Argyle Shore was fined \$10 or 10 days.

A man from Iona was fined \$5 and costs or 5 days for operating a motor vehicle without a licence, as was also a resident of Milton for a similar offense. For driving a motor vehicle while his faculties were impaired by alcohol, a resident of Eldon was sentenced to a fine of \$60 and costs or two months imprisonment. Two residents of Milton were fined \$20 and costs each, one for having liquor in his possession in a place other than his residence and the other for consuming liquor in a public place.

A resident of West Royalty found guilty of having liquor in his possession not purchased from a vendor, was fined \$25 and costs or 30 days. A resident of Charlottetown Royalty was given a suspended sentence for taking a motor vehicle without the consent of the owner.

Yesterday morning before Magistrate Gaudet, two residents of Vernon River were found guilty of consuming liquor in a place other than their residences and each was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days. A City resident and a man from St. Peter's Road and one from Vernon River, found guilty of consuming liquor in a public place were each fined \$20 and costs or 30 days. A City resident for having liquor in his possession at a place other than his residence was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days. A Vernon River resident was fined \$60 or two months for having liquor in his possession not obtained from a vendor.

One speeder from Kensington was fined \$10 and costs or 10 days and two city residents operating motor cars without the required lights were each fined \$5 and costs or 5 days.
