Island Guernsey Top Producer.

Owen Younker and Son (Roy), Golden View Farms, Kingston, P. E. I., are prouder than ever of their show cow, Fraserdale Fore Heroine, which Roy purchased as a calf from Fraserdale Farms, Concord, Ontario, for not only has she been a consistent winner at the shows since her purchase but she has now developed into a top producer as well.

"Heroine" first came into prominence in 1954 when she was top Junior Yearling at Charlottetown and at Amherst Winter Fair and was voted Honourable Mention All Canadian Yearling Heifer for the year. In 1955 she was top two year old and Senior and Grand Champion at Charlottetown. In 1956 she was top three year old and Reserve Senior and Reserve Grand at Charlottetown and again in 1957 she topped her class as a four year old at Charlottetown.

"Heroine" has just completed an official R. O. P. record in 365 days on twice daily milkings of 119 1/2 lbs of milk containing 583 lbs of butterfat. This in terms of B. C. A. or Breed Class Average is 123 per cent for milk and 120 per cent for fat, which is the highest production reported from P. E. I. during September.

"Heroine" has dropped two bull calves, both of whom have found success in the show ring —

Heroine's Pure Bred was Junior and Grand Champion at Charlottetown in 1956 and Golden View Gay Lea was second bull calf at Charlottetown this year.
