The Blues partly made up for the North's drubbing in the Shrine game by whitewashing the Grays 13-0. Mississippi beat Florida 7-3 in the Gator Bowl and East Texas State upset Missouri Valley 26-7 in the Tangerine Bowl.

The post-season games reach a climax Thursday, with Iowa vs. California in the Rose Bowl, the Air Force vs. Texas Christian in the Cotton Bowl, Clemson vs. Louisiana State in the Sugar Bowl and Syracuse vs. Oklahoma in the Orange Bowl.

Jordan Arrested On Suspicion Of Dope Possession

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Don Jordan, world welterweight boxing champion, was arrested Sunday after police found a smouldering marijuana cigarette in a car in which the fighter was riding.

Jordan, 24, and four others in the car were booked on suspicion of narcotics possession.

Jordan, who won the welterweight crown earlier this month by whipping Virgil Atkins, denied any knowledge of the cigarette.

In the early hours, two officers in a cruising police car said they spotted the car in which Jordan was riding driving erratically, and stopped it.

Arresting officers said Jordan did not appear to be under the influence of alcohol or drugs.

Jordan won the 147-pound title Dec. 5 by badly beating Atkins in a 15-round decision. A rematch has been set for March 6 in St. Louis.

Leo Labine scored Boston's goal before the Montreal uprising started. It culminated in a four-goal spurge in the last period, two of the goals coming while the Bruins were short-handed in the last two minutes.
