MONDAY

Maritime Central Airways announced this week that it has passed another record year in 1953 with figures for passenger and charter traffic at new high levels.

The company during 1953 carried 85,000 passengers and 4,245 tons of goods over approximately 3,000,000 miles.

"Operation Friendship" was the occasion for a large, attended inter-group rally of the various Young People's Societies of the city churches to meet at the Y.M.C.A. last evening.

The gathering, which was sponsored by the Young Adults of the Y.M.C.A., was the second in a series of meetings which are held annually.

and Mrs. Ralph MacCaul. New school committee are Mrs. Ralph Connolly and Mrs. John Myers.

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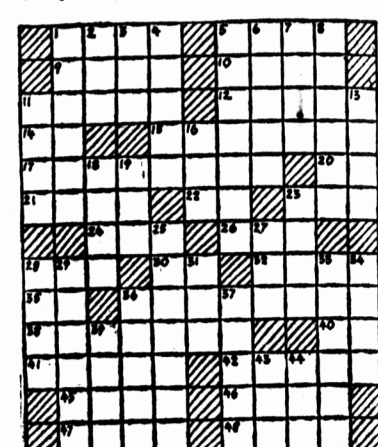

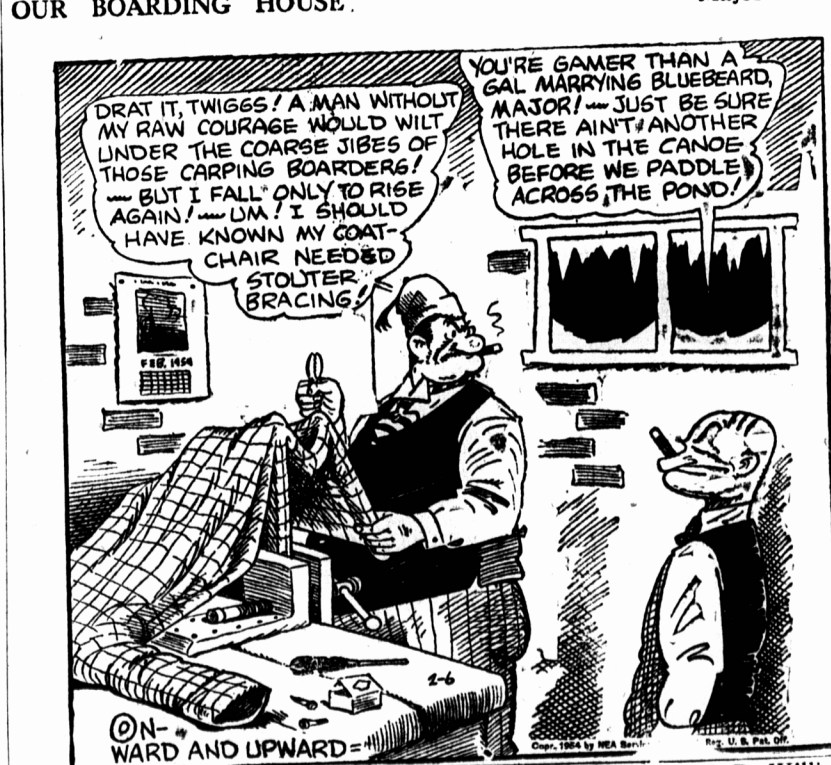
