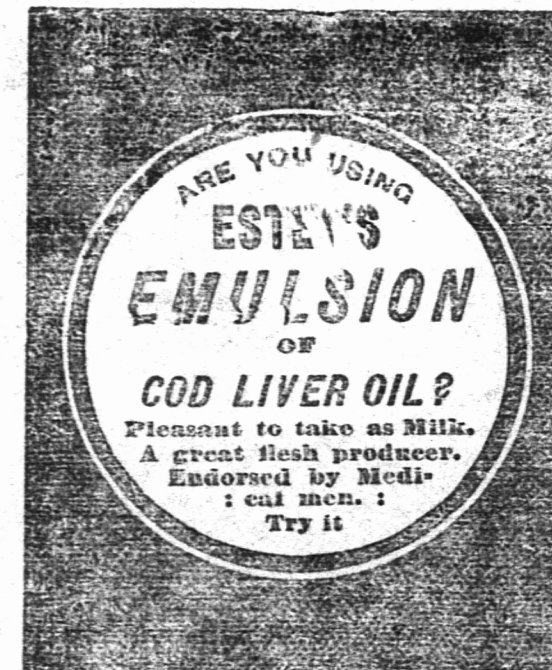

HALIFAX, March 28.—Great excitement was caused here today when it was learned that there were several cases of yellow fever in the military hospital. The disease was brought here by the troopship Atlas, which was given a clean bill of health by the health officer.

OTTAWA, March 28.—The Liberals of London, Ontario, are determined to haul Judge Elliot over the coals for a conduct unbecoming a judge. The Opposition will take the matter up.

Big Storm in England.

LONDON, March 28.—A severe storm is being experienced in North Wales, England and Scotland. The storm is terrible of Berwick, and it is feared the steamer Holmhook has foundered with all on board.

Shot Dead in the Pulpit.

ANNANDALE, S. C., March 28.—Bishop Jones, a noted colored preacher, was shot dead on Sunday night, in his pulpit, by some person outside his church.

Killed Her Daughter.

CHARLESTOWN, W. V., March 24.—Mrs. Marion S. Moore, aged 30, was arrested here last night on a charge of murdering her 13 year old daughter, who was found in the house, two weeks ago, with her throat cut. It is said that Mrs. Moore was infatuated with a hired man in her husband's employ. The servant, however, paid no attention to her advances, but gave repeated evidence of his love for her daughter, and this is supposed to have led Mrs. Moore in her furious jealousy to kill her child.

Indian Missions in the North West.

Those friends who helped to send a bale of clothing and books, etc., to the Assiniboa Mission last November will be glad to hear of its safe arrival at Touchwood Hills. Last week a letter from there written by the Rev. Leonard Dawson, was received here, an extract of which is given below.

St. Andrew's Mission House, Touchwood Hills, Butawa Post Office, Ass.

"After many unfortunate, but unavoidable delays, I have this day received a large bale of clothing for which I have to thank you. The contents are most welcome and will prove a great boon to the Indian population among whom I have the privilege of working. The Government, that is the Indian department, are doing a great deal for the treaty Indians, by teaching them to farm and raise cattle; but this of course constitutes a great change of life for the Indians, who are often in want of food and always poorly clad. My plan is to give away clothing where required, to the sick and very old; but to make the able bodied men and women do some work in return for the clothing, and thus teach them a proper independence. This plan takes away the danger of their outwardly becoming Christians for the sake of the loaves and fishes. . . . My Interpreter has a salary of \$300 per annum, and as the Bishop is unable to help me out of the diocesan funds owing to prior calls, I am obliged to raise this sum as best I can. My wife proposes writing to you more in detail as to the contents of the bale for which please accept my deepest thanks. . . . Extract from Mrs. Dawson's letter. . . . We were particularly pleased with the man's clothing (old), the vests were most acceptable, as many like to wear blankets still, but sadly need warm underclothing. They quite regret the thing, so warm and comfortable. . . . Any bad clothing is very welcome. It makes one shiver to see how little they have to do with sometimes. There are also a few beads which will please some of the feebler ones, who like to do the bead work, but cannot often afford to buy the beads."

Emerald Notes.

The people of this province in many cases are behind the times with regard to the breed of horses and horned cattle. Every farmer should get the best breed of stock of all kinds and he will find it pay much better in the end. We are pleased to notice that Dr. Wall of Emerald believes in this method as he has lately added to his stock some choicely bred animals. The Dr. drives a very beautiful Arabian filly coming 3 years old. She has great style and action and is a very promising animal. Last month he bought a very fine cow, bred seven-eighths Jersey. She is pronounced to be a great milk cow and is large and handsome. He also has a cow bred, three-quarters Holstein, that he values very highly and he intends having a test case in order to see which is the better breed for milk, Holstein or Jersey. You will hear from the Dr. again.

What a True Revival Does.

MR. ERRON.—The questions that seem to be perplexing many of our churches at the present time may find an answer in the following clipping from the Epworth Herald:

It will upset card-tables, make happy homes, gather in the children, throw out joy formality, close up the ballrooms, unify churchly functions, help on the millennium, reveal much hidden talent, harmonize family differences, put courage into timid saints, strike a hard blow at saloons, create a regiment optimists, help build the Epworth League, give strength to weak disciples, open tightly closed pocket-books, and cause widespread conviction of sin.

It will make mean people uncomfortable, fill empty seats in the synagogue, bring up the pastor's belated salary, cause the bell's of joy to ring in heaven, emphasize the necessity of repentance, give you a little idea of what heaven is like, fill up the Bible-classes in the Sunday School, furnish arguments no infidel can successfully answer, take hold of some poor sinners who are very low down, and promote mutual confidence between pastor and people. It will square venerable accounts at the grocer's and butcher's, send the busybody with the gossiping tongue to the rear, make old saints hungry for higher spiritual attainments, make people move in the matter of a new church—if you need one, and give you the kind of church singing you should have all the year round.

Kensington Notes.

The Lecture of the Rev. Mr. O'Hill, on the 14th inst., was a rich treat, and as he showed up the evils resulting from the liquor traffic he clearly proved himself master of the subject. He had a good large audience who fully appreciated the points he made against this evil which seems to receive the support and fostering care of Governments for the paltry revenue received in return. His wit was brought into full play while describing the "medicine man," who always prescribed this particular "tonic" for himself. At all times and under all circumstances this medicine was the right one, according to this theorist—"keep out the cold in winter and heat in summer." This Lecture should be published and sent broad-cast in the Dominion.

The entertainment under the auspices of the "Abkhillary" in the Presbyterian church, on Thursday night, was most interesting and calculated to arouse the interest of the people in mission work. LETTERS TO EDITOR.

Scot Act in King's

To the Editor of the Morning Guardian:
SIR,—We have had several years of the restrictions imposed by the Canada Temperance Act of this country, altho' not enforced as vigorously as it might be, it is the only safeguard we have against the damning influence of the liquor traffic. The liquor party when prosecuted for breaches of the law, have hitherto, in most cases, appealed against the judgment of the magistrates, but since the abolition of juries in such cases they have had a narrow chance when their appealed cases are reviewed by the Supreme Court, and hence the movement to repeal the act so that they may without let or hindrance ply their lawless trades.

There is not the least doubt but that their efforts will prove abortive and the Scott Act triumphantly sustained; but it is necessary to remind the electors to be on their guard against the specious methods which will be resorted to by the agents of the rum party to secure signatures to their petition. The party who are seeking the repeal of the act will be represented as the only true friends of total prohibition, and in order to obtain it the Scott Act must go. This and many other deceptive schemes will be reported to I hear that it is proposed by the friends of temperance to contest every inch of ground with the repealers and narrowly watch their movements.

As this is not a political election, if it is obtained, which I doubt, the electors not being wedded to any party on this question will be free to vote without any political bias, as it will be a contest between the conservators of public and domestic peace and the principles and aids and abettors of lawlessness and discord.

We in this county look forward with the aid of pulpit and press and the strong temperance sentiment in the majority of districts in the county to a crushing defeat of the schemes of a party who would by their votes saddle the law abiding people of this country with the curse of free rum.
