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Seed Oats.

SIR.—The following correspondence is submitted for publication in THE EXAMINER.

PROFESSOR SAUNDERS, EXPERIMENTAL FARM, OTTAWA.

DEAR SIR.—The oat crop on the Island was badly damaged by wet last season. The grain is light, bad, and shrivelled, and for the most part scarcely fit for seed.

The renewal of course would take some years to accomplish.

In the meantime would you advise an importation by the Local Government of a quantity of fresh seed to start with in the spring as a basis for such renewal and if so from what part of Britain, the Continent or elsewhere, would you recommend the importation to be made?

An Ottawa despatch of the 17th says:—Premier McLeod and Provincial Secretary Ferguson, of Prince Edward Island, who have been for the past week here interviewing the government in regard to matters pertaining to the "Tight Little Island," left for home this morning, it is understood, well satisfied with the result of their mission.

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News Notes.

An epidemic resembling influenza is spreading in India.

The women of Acheson, Kansas, have nominated a full ticket for the school board.

Gangs of men are at work on the levees at New Orleans, and the water is receding.

Education in Russia is at a low ebb. Only 12 per cent. of the population can read and write.

A Turkish irade orders that the reserves be speedily equipped and held in readiness for any eventuality.

The Mersey Dock Board has decided to improve the entrances to the north docks. The improvements will cost £30,000.

Owing to incessant rains the river Brisbane, Queensland, has overflowed and inundated the town of that name. The damage is estimated at £300,000.

It is stated that the Russian Government will attempt in April to lift two English steamers, which were off Esaklava during the Crimean war. It is believed that one of the vessels contains 140,000.
