



S'ide Skip Wins Game At Big Quebec Bonselpiel

QUEBEC, (CP)—A rink from a non-existing Nova Scotia curling club Tuesday won its second straight game in the international section of the 42nd annual Quebec International Bonselpiel.

Pleasant Lake club, under skip E. Arthur Clark of Summerside, P. E. I., beat H. G. Turnbull of Hamilton by a rousing 14-1 score in a second-round game. Monday the Merritimers whipped veteran Col. A. Bell of Quebec Victoria 12-1.

"We belong to the world's most exclusive curling club," said Clark in an interview. Pleasant Lake has an official club pin and stationary 18 members and no clubhouse, he said. It isn't registered with any provincial or Dominion curling association.

U.S. Athletes Prominent On List Issued By I.A.A.F.

LONDON, (AP)—Miler Wes Santee, shot putter Parry O'Brien and two relay teams gave the United States four new world record holders in track and field Tuesday in the list of recognized marks issued by the International Amateur Athletic Federation.

Only Russia, also with four representatives, matched the American achievement while single top performers went to athletes from Denmark, Germany, Norway and Hungary.

O'Brien, southern California muscle man, and Russian runner Vladimir Kuc, each figured three times in the world-record list.

O'Brien shattered the world shot-put mark three times at Los Angeles last year, his best effort being 90 feet, 10 inches June 11. He put the shot 80-5 1/4 on May 8 and 80 5 3/4 May 21.

Kuc had three three-mile records accepted with his best mark being 13 minutes, 26.4 seconds established at Prague Oct. 23. He also is recognized as the world 5,000-metre record holder with 13:51.2.

Chris Chataway of Britain, runner up to both Roger Bannister and John Landy in their record-breaking miles runs, was listed for his 13:51.6 in the 5,000. The mile marks had been approved earlier.

Santee was listed for his record 1,500 metres at Compton, Calif., on June 4 when he covered the distance in 3:42.8 while running a 4:00.6 mile.

Santee's rival on the present U. S. indoor circuit, Gunnar Nielson of Denmark, received recognition for his 48.6 mark in the 800-yard run set at Copenhagen Sept. 30 and tying the record set by America's Mal Whitfield.

Other U. S. record breakers were the University of Texas' 440-yard relay team, which registered 40.5 seconds at Los Angeles May 22, and Fordham's two-

Smythe Retires On 60th Birthday

TORONTO (CP)—Conn Smythe, who made a contract with Toronto Maple Leafs to be the ultimate aim of many hockey-minded young Canadians, retired as managing director of his National Hockey League team today—his 60th birthday.

He was replaced by his long-time lieutenant, Clarence (Hap) Day, 58, who played for and coached Leafs before becoming a sports agent and managing director. Smythe remains as president and managing director of Maple Leaf Gardens, home of the Leafs.

Day, who gave up a career as a pharmacist for hockey, was with Leafs and Smythe during each of the seven Stanley cups won by the team.

A Smythe, a flight lieutenant and Military Cross winner in the First World War, was a major in the Second World War when he formed his own battery and was wounded overseas.

Monday night in Palm Beach, Fla., Smythe's family and Day gathered at a party to mark the major's 60th birthday and his formal retirement from the managing director's post.

The boys resumed play at 7 p. m. with the MacDonald rink coming from behind in the last half of the 10 rounder to beat the Don Cameron rink 13-10 in a very exciting finish. In this round, the Llewellyn rink eliminated winless as the Silliphant foursome collected their first win by a 12-8 score. Enthusiasm ran high throughout both rounds with the boys displaying lots of interest in the game and most of the time had their work cut out for them in the closer fought matches.

Play will resume at the local rink this morning at 9 a. m. with the two Summerside foursomes playing off for a chance to meet the defending champion Welshmen and a possible trip to the Dominion finals in Sydney, Nova Scotia, in March.

Following the first round of play in the afternoon, approximately 30 boys, including many fellow-curlers of the finalist players were treated to a delightful banquet put on by the ladies' branch of the Charlottetown Curling Club. The chairman read a letter which was received from Mr. Rankin McLaine, president of Prince Edward Island school-boy curling, who is presently participating in the International Bonselpiel with a local team in Quebec City.

Each of the school-boy skips, Barry MacDonald, David Silliphant, Don Cameron and Locke Llewellyn expressed words of thanks to the ladies for the banquet, to the clubs in which they practised and to the club members who were so generous with their time and instructions.

"In my opinion, curling is one of the best character builders that we have in this city," state Earl Nicholson, of the physical fitness staff of the Queen Charlotte High School, during his brief but interesting lecture on the game itself. Mr. Nicholson also thanked the local club for the use of its ice sheets for practice sessions during the school and winter on behalf of the school board of directors.

Prof. Robert LeClair of Prince of Wales College spoke in terms similar to those of Mr. Nicholson and before closing moved a vote of thanks to the ladies for their work in the preparation of the banquet. Mr. Fred Folland of Summerside spoke in glowing terms for the fine sportsmanship displayed by the boys in the game and wished the winning team every success in the forthcoming Dominion finals. Mr. W. 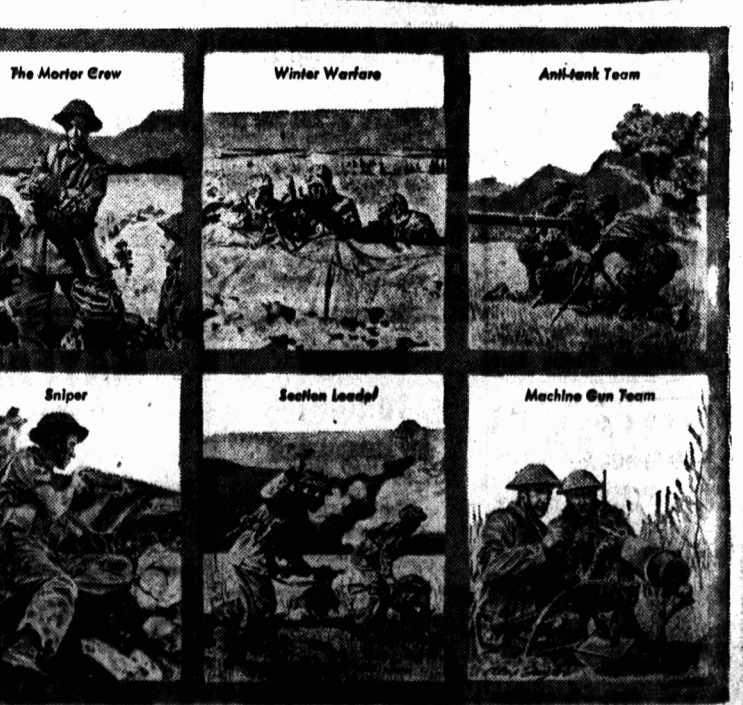
