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Garden Produce, Handicrafts Highlights Of Show

The exhibition of garden produce and work by the ladies of the county was as usual one of the highlights of Eastern King's Exhibition yesterday.

The building in which the exhibits were displayed at Souris was one of the busiest spots on the fair grounds and competition was keen in a friendly way as neighbors compared the awards given to their various entries. The flower exhibition was exceptionally fine and those who entered samples of their horticultural talents in this showing are to be commended very highly.

Entries in the Housekeeping class were also outstanding both in quality and quantity, and the vegetables displayed attracted much attention from all who entered the building. Number of woolen goods and fancy work seemed a little meagre in their displays, and judging from the other classes it would seem that the women of the western part of this Province concentrate more on their families appetites than on needle art work.

It was regretted that a number of entries in the woolen goods and fancy work class were missing when the owners went to gather them up at the end of the exhibition. It is well known how many hours of labor go into making up these fine pieces of work, and it is hoped that those who no doubt took them by mistake will get in touch with the Exhibition Secretary in order that they might be returned to their owners. Pieces missing included a knitting bedspread, luncheon set and tatted pillow cases.

Top winner in the Roots and Vegetables class was Mrs. Reid Underhay of Bay Fortune who took four first prizes with her entries of carrots, parsnips, pumpkins and collection of table vegetables. Mrs. J. B. Matthews of Souris received the highest number of awards in the Fruit and Vegetable class winning five firsts and three seconds. The first prizes were given for her entries of nasturtiums, pansies, snapdragons, verbena and sweet peas, and the seconds for her gladioli, stocks and phlox.

In the Butter and Cheese class Mrs. Edson Rose of East Baltic received three first prizes which was all that were available. Competition in the Woolen Goods and Fancy Work class was very keen, and Mrs. Wm. Howlett of Gowan Brae was very fortunate in being the only entrant to receive three first prizes. These were given for Mrs. Howlett's appliqued quilt, woolen mitts and woolen socks.

Among the judges who capably performed the difficult tasks of judging yesterday afternoon were Major MacRae (Ayrshires), S. G. Wright (Jersey and Gurnsey), Almon Boswell and Hugh J. McKinnon (Sheep), and H. MacLean of the Department of Agriculture and L. F. MacRae (Poultry).
