Literature And Life

Augustine Birrell begins one of his essays with these words: "Great is bookishness and the charm of books." Bookworm has two fold meaning—the one who lives among books and reads them constantly, and also it means an insect which preys on books and destroys them.

It is true that there are people who cannot read—do not know one letter from another, but they can do business, make and count money, and are indeed sort of natural philosophers. They can tell the time of day by the sun, and time through the silent night by the stars. The world was their school and university, and their acquired learning was very useful. Some of these folk are very good companions. Who would not rather spend an afternoon with Tom Purdy, Sir Walter Scott's humble friend than with Wordsworth at "Rydal Mount"?

But this does not convince us that we may get on without books. Many years ago a book was written on the enemies of books. The writer referred to the burning of books at Ephesus (See Acts 19:19) where he says the loss would be about \$13000. At the time of the Reformation, sometimes a horrible fate befell monastic libraries. This was a zeal not always according to knowledge.

Water too, has been, destructive to books. Through broken windows rain has poured on libraries. It has also soaked books by coming in through skylights. In one case a book thus spoiled sold for \$200!

But the genuine bookworm, the paper eating insect, has always been a mischief. The energy of these little creatures greatly varied. Once upon time 212 of these pests began to eat their way through a stout folio printed in the year 1477. By the time their 61st page was reached all but four had given in. Only one survived till the 86th page was reached, and he gave in then. At the other end of the book other worms began,—hoping I suppose to meet the others half way but they only reached the 69th page.

Polish prices are paid for books by those who do not read, but they think that it sounds cultured to have rare books in their possession. You feel sorry for some books hidden away in expensive book cases. Never opened. Would they not rather have the marks of a tear—be it a child's—dropped on a page that appealed to some reader? What a blessed thing it is to have some author as a friend! To sit before the fire and experience what Emerson calls pictures: "enclosed in a tumultuous privacy of storm."

Some people have a craze for first editions, but Samuel Johnson, de Quincy and Carlyle cared not for them at all. It has been said by one who loved books and knew what was in them: "When the love of money comes in at the window the love of books runs out at the door." The morals of the stock exchange have corrupted even the library. The worst possible reason for buying books is that the price demanded is high.

There used to be a phrase often seen: "Timeo hominum unius libri" I am afraid of a man of one book; for one reason he is apt to know something.

A couple of years ago I wrote these lines for a friend, who had met with a bookworm in his Homer:

"What wast thou doing here in Homer's pages, Blind to the wonder of queen Helen's town? For round about her still the battle rages, And Poesy doth her with glory crown."

Fruitless must be thy efforts to destroy What to the human heart has long been dear, Love for Astyanax, the wondrous boy, Argus, the dog that yet compels a tear.

Small wonder 'tis that thou dost haste away Thy blind eyes could not read a single letter; Go, burrow 'mong the pages of to-day, For much now writ we deem deserves nought better; But these same wonders kept Keats up all night, New "realms of gold, found here, to his delight."

Most patients complaining of fatigue have a functional (not organic) illness. "When the physician has satisfied himself as to the absence of cancer or other acute or chronic debilitating disease, he is then in a better position to concentrate or study the functional disease." Many fatigued patients have anxiety states, many are depressed, and many bored with life. With nothing special to look forward to each day, "lying around" becomes a habit and the patient feels even too tired to rest.

Fatigue occurs more often in women than in men because of the more routine nature of their daily work and responsibilities. Thus it is pointed out that more can be done for fatigued patients by changing their daily routine than by use of drugs.

If then, you are tired and apparently have no cause to be tired, an investigation by your physician and dentist as to presence of infection should be the first thought. Afterwards can come search for lack of vitamins, lack of gland juices, and the cause of anxiety states.
