Rose Bowl Contest Features College Play

Quarterbacks will be the key men when Penn State and the Orange Bowl will be the first of several U.S. college bowl and football games scheduled for Saturday and Sunday's days.

Leading the opposing Gator bowl squads Saturday will be Tom Shannon of Florida and Dave Liska of Penn State. Other games Saturday will have players from northern schools against the south in the Blue-Gray challenge at Montgomery, Ala. while at San Francisco the West plays the East in the East-West Shrine Game.

The major college action scheduled for Jan. 1 will have southern California and Wisconsin at Pasadena, Calif. In the Rose Bowl to be carried by CBC-TV, Oklahoma and Alabama in the Orange Bowl at Miami, Fla.; Texas and Louisiana State in the Cotton Bowl at Dallas, Tex.; and Arkansas and Mississippi in the Sugar Bowl at New Orleans.

TORONTO (CP)—Frank Mahovlich, the league's leading goal scorer, took over the point-scoring lead Wednesday night as he led Toronto Maple Leafs to a 5-4 victory over Detroit Red Wings and into a tie for first place in the National Hockey League.

Mahovlich scored one goal and assisted on three others as Leafs came from behind a 2-0 first-period deficit in their second game against Wings in two nights. Detroit won 5-1 at home Tuesday night.
