Captain Palmer in his address to a large attendance said this is the first group in Prince County to have received such certificates. It was one of a number of pilot projects undertaken for the area.

W.S. McMurtry, director of vocational training for the Island spoke on what the school is trying to do. He put out a plea to the people to support this all important training. It is up to you the people he said, you the people are the ones who are going to determine during the next few years what kind of training the government is willing to provide, but if you lack the interest then there is nothing anyone can do.

He spoke of dedicated men in the field like Ray Sudsbury, vocational instructor of vocational training and Malcolm MacDonald, supervisor of apprenticeship, who have taken steps to extend the courses to the people.

Also addressing the gathering and speaking highly of the work of the vocational training division was Cyril Leary, secretary of the Board of Trade, Alberton. Very Rev. M.J. Rooney, Cameron MacDonald, chairman had high praise and a word of encouragement for the successful candidates.
