Council Resolution Said Rights Breach

HALIFAX (CP)—An Edmonton lawyer charged here Wednesday that any change in the criminal code which now prohibits evidence that a person refused a scientific test to establish blood alcohol content, is contrary to the Canadian Bill of Rights.

A resolution calling for the section of the criminal code to be repealed by the federal government was passed by the Canadian Highway Safety Council at the final business session of the three-day annual meeting.

However, the resolution met stiff opposition from Charles H. Grant of Edmonton, a member of the Alberta Safety Council and a practising lawyer.

Mr. Grant claimed that the use of such a refusal as evidence to convict a driver of impaired driving was also contrary to a criminal code section which stated "a man shall not be compelled to convict himself out of his own mouth."

He said that he was convinced of the accuracy of his scientific tests such as what he called the "breathalyzer test" which accurately determines the amount of alcohol in a person's blood.

IS NO INDICATION
"However, alcoholic content of the blood gives no indication of a person's ability to drive. This depends on his age, physical condition and other factors," he said.

John V. Macdonald, deputy attorney-general for Nova Scotia, who headed the council's laws and enforcement committee which submitted the resolutions, said many members were in favor of seeking to have the tests made mandatory.

However, he said the committee felt the resolution introduced represented the "minor recommendation."

Canada Said To Join OAS

BOSTON (AP) — The Boston Globe says it has been told exclusively by Prime Minister Pearson that Canada will announce shortly plans to join the Organization of American States.

The prime minister, in an Ottawa interview with Leonard Lerner, Globe reporter — described as the first personal interview granted any newspaper since Pearson's election April 8 — also is reported by the paper to have made these points:

1. Preliminary considerations are being given to some production in Canada of a war plane called F1X for joint use by the United States and Canada.

2. Sweeping tariff reductions between the two countries will be nearly ready for signature.

3. A U.S.-Canada nuclear pact was taken nearly ready for signature.

4. Canada will be forced to establish a 12-mile fisheries jurisdictional limit.

Pearson is to confer with President Kennedy in Hyannis Port, Mass., Friday and Saturday.

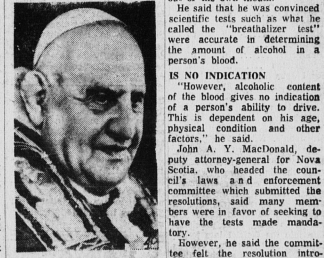

Water Meters Rejected For Charlottetown Homes

Water Meters and Municipalities here yesterday afternoon. Mr. Manuel said full metering had been proposed in the Pilot meter program on the water situation here due to the amount of waste in homes.

HEAVY COST
However, metering would cost approximately \$100,000 and other factors involving interest rates and the life of the meters would mean an annual cost to the city of \$14,000. At present, Mr. Manuel stated, water wasted at an estimated cost of 9 cents per 100 gallons production is costing the city \$7,000 annually.
