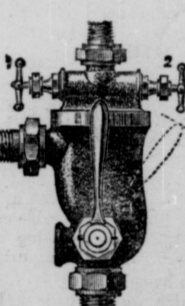

RESURV ACCIDENT.

About noon yesterday Dr. Conroy left his team standing in front of the City Hospital while he was inside visiting some patients. The horse being near his stable and anxious to get home, left the hospital gate during the Dr.'s absence and proceeded up Dorchester street to the doctor's residence, where he stopped. The sleigh, coming in contact with the doorway, was upset, and the doctor, being alarmed, started along the sidewalk in the direction of Water Street. Turning the LePage House corner he proceeded along Water street until he came near the residence of Mr. John Coombs, when he turned to the right and went swiftly down Navigation Company's wharf. On the wharf he ran in between two cars and was knocked down. An examination by Dr. McMillan, V. S., showed that the shoulder blade had been fractured, and in his opinion the animal's usefulness for the future is doubtful. The horse has been a familiar figure about the streets of Charlotteville for some time past, and was a valuable animal. Dr. Conroy's loss is a serious one.

NEWS NOTES.

Advices from Aricaes, Morocco, are that two large French expeditions have entered the British Niger territory. This action of the French is a breach of the Anglo-French treaty of 1890.

United States has added two and a half million dollars to its deficit in the first twenty-five days of March. The so-called revenue tariff appears to have failed as a revenue producer, as well as in other respects.

It appears from a decision of one of the London magistrates that it is no crime for a man's next door neighbor to play the piano or even a fiddle up to eleven o'clock at night. After that hour it may be considered a nuisance.

A new vein of coal has been struck in the Eureka Coal Company's mine at Cumberland, Washington, nine feet thick altogether, with five feet three inches of clean, burning to a white ash and coking well. There is said to be 500,000 tons above water level.

They are telling of a man in Paris who has made a wager that he will ride all the way from Paris to America on horseback. He proposes to ride right across Siberia to the point where Behring Sea, which separates that country from Alaska, is narrowest, and then ride across on the ice.

The weather in Rome has been colder during the last few weeks than in any year, since 1845, and the numerous foreigners who are spending the winter here have been deeply disappointed. The mountains are for the most part frozen, and the slippery pavements have caused many accidents.

The general condition of London is indicated by the fact that 137,000 destitute persons were relieved by the various charitable institutions during the past week, and the interim report of the select committee of the House of Commons, which was appointed to inquire into the existing distress throughout England, has disclosed a state of affairs which, apparently, can only be met by extensive relief work in certain districts.

According to an Ottawa despatch Mr. E. Ohlen, who has been lecturing to his fellow-countrymen in Sweden on the advantages of Canada as a field for settlement, has returned from his tour, bringing with him a dozen delegates, who will select localities for intending immigrants, about 300 of whom will come to Canada next month. Mr. Ohlen has induced a large number of foreigners who intended to settle in the United States to go to the Northwest instead.

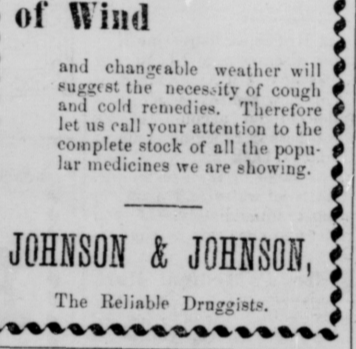
