Consider Health Welfare Estimates

The verbal battles in the Legislature which broke out Monday night, were resumed Wednesday morning and early afternoon as the consideration of the estimates of the Health and Welfare Department continued.

The skirmishes again occurred on the question of maintenance of Falconwood Hospital and Provincial Infirmary. Attacks were made by members on both sides of the House and two withdrawals, one from each side, were made on points of parliamentary procedure. The principal participants, were the Minister of Health and Welfare, Hon. A. W. Matheson, M.A. R. R. Bell, Leader of the Opposition and Mr. Phillip Matheson of Second Queens.

Mr. Bell charged that the expenditures on maintaining Falconwood Hospital and the Infirmary could be decreased from \$250,000 to \$230,000 by the proper purchase of clothing and food stuffs.

He moved a reduction of the amount but the amendment was defeated by a straight party vote. Mr. Bell argued that many goods could be provided cheaper by wholesale purchases. He stated that the clothing was bought retail as were furniture and shoes.

Mr. Phillip Matheson stated that the Department found it expedient to give its business to political friends. The Minister denied the statement and challenged the Second Queens member to name the "political friends."

He read statements and figures of purchases for the institutions for the past five years and challenged the Opposition member to show him where he could receive better bargains.

"Why don't you shop around?" asked Mr. Phillip Matheson.

"We do competitive shopping by tender," replied the Minister.

"How many would believe that statement," retorted the Wheatley River member.

The Minister indicated to the chairman that he wanted a retraction of Mr. Matheson's statement to which the Second Queens member stated "If I have made an unparliamentary statement I retract it."

After the estimates were considered the Minister stated that he would not move the vote to accept them as he wanted to hear some more discussion. "All I am getting is a little dribble from the other side of the House."

At this Mr. Phillip Matheson demanded a retraction of the statement. The chairman, Mr. Alan Stewart ruled a retraction would have to be made as the word dribble was unparliamentary and provocative.

Dealing with the question of relief the Minister stated that he feared the money might be wasted as the total amount paid to each family by the Government was far below what was necessary for existence.

"We must have some drastic change in the setup. We will have to move the people from areas of unemployment to places where there is work," he said.

Mr. William Hughes stated that the relief money filled the stop gaps not covered by private and organized charities and meant some little measure of comfort. A mobile dental treatment unit may be established in the province this year, it was indicated by the Minister. The unit could possibly travel by rail car or by station wagon and jeep. It will be used for treating children.

Dr. MacMillan approved of the Government's work in the fields of cancer and mental health. He noted that many cases of cancer were now being detected in the early stages due to services here and that Falconwood Hospital was, serving, over the years, as a centre where many patients were being discharged in good mental health.
