

TAKE THRILLING 5-3 VICTORY

Youth Club Ousts Flyers

Nearly 3,000 Fans Watch Art Perry Score The Winner

Basilia Youth Club fought their way into the Island Senior Hockey League finals against Summerside Aces by edging out Parkdale Flyers 5-3 in a thrilling packed game before nearly 3,000 fans at the Sports Arena last night.

The youth clubbers moved into a 3-1 lead in the first period in the first period and hung on grimly to the end beating off wave after wave of Parkdale attackers bent on blinking the light behind goaltender Thane Doyle, who once again came up with a masterful display of stopping pucks. The Flyers outplayed the youth club in every period firing 14 pucks at Doyle in the first, 10 in the second and 11 in the third. But Doyle turned aside all but three of the 35 drives.

Art Perry scored the goal that proved to be the winner in the second period on a lazy screen shot from about 10 feet inside the blue-line. Roper didn't see the puck until it was tucked into the corner of the net. That goal, which made the score read 4-2 for the youth club, won Perry a 50 dollar watch donated by J.R. Williams Jewellers.

WHITLOCK SCORES
Crafted, old Buck Whitlock, who started playing before a lot of his teammates could walk, rapped in two goals including the clincher with only 29 seconds left to play in the third period. Merrill Pineau sniped the other two in the first period.

Orin Carver played a tireless game for the Flyers and came through with two goals in the losing cause. One of his goals had the Carver trademark on it as the hard skating rightwinger raced across the length of the ice to beat Doyle on a backhand. Gerald Cruys, a "sleeper" who played a terrific series for the Flyers, got the other goal to tie the score at 1-1 in the first period.

ROPER TERRIFIC
Despite a right hand that was badly damaged in an accident on Wednesday, Frank Roper donned the pads for the Flyers and turned in a stellar and courageous game. He didn't have much business in the first two periods but the shots he did have were tough ones and he won the game of the over flow crowd time and again for his courage under fire. Following the game Jack (Spy) Ready, victorious coach of the youth club, had great praise for Roper. Coach Ready stated that Roper "is a credit to the game of ice hockey."

"It took a lot of old fashioned guts to go out there and turn in the kind of game that Roper did. When I shook hands with him after the game I noticed that his hand was bleeding. Despite his injury and the fact that his team lost I congratulate him on his play. Frank is a tremendous goaltender and don't let anybody ever tell you differently."

It was the most cleanly played game of the entire season and not anything remotely resembling a penalty had to be called.

TAKE QUICK LEAD
It took the youth club only 11 minutes and 25 seconds to take the lead as Whitlock and Pineau combined on a beautiful passing play. Whitlock was on the receiving end of the last relay between the two and fired the puck into an open net after Roper was deked to one side by the fast skating Pineau.

At 6:47 Parkdale got that one back with Gerald Cruys doing the honors. Hurry started the play off when he carried over the B.Y.C. line. His short shot was stopped at the defence but Cruys, following up fast, drove a hot one to the far corner to beat Doyle who made a slide in a vain attempt to block the shot.

At 14:06 the Flyers got right back in the game as Orin Carver put the lead at 4-3. Dunn's shot at the 4:06 mark was missing the net but Carver's stick came out of nowhere to deflect the puck under Doyle.

For the rest of the period, as in the late stages of the second period, the youth club was playing strictly defensive hockey. The puck was driven down the ice left at every opportunity. It didn't get too well with the fans, but it worked for the youth club, who had a lot of faceoffs called in the zone and came out unscathed for the final 16 minutes.

ENTER STANLEY CUP FINALS

Bruins Come From Behind To Edge Red Wings 4-3

DETROIT (CP)—The red-hot Boston Bruins twice struck from behind, scoring three goals in the final period, and defeated the National Hockey League champion Detroit Red Wings 4-3 Thursday night to gain a spot in the Stanley Cup finals for only the second time in the last decade.

Bruins took the best-of-seven semi-final series 4-1, and will meet Montreal Canadiens, who won their series against New York 4-1.

Bruins' veteran centre Cal Gardner scored what proved to be the winning goal at 15:16 of the third period. It was the second game-winning goal he fired during the series.

Other Boston scorers were rookie Bud Boone, Leo Labine, and defenceman Doug Mohs.

Detroit marksmen were Alex Delvecchio, Ted Lindsay and Metro Prystay.

FIGHT FROM BEHIND
The capacity home-town crowd sat in amazement as the stubborn Boston crew, refusing to bow before the reputation of the powerful Wings, fought back for the win.

The Boston club overcame shockers that might have wilted less spirited teams, battling back after Red Wings broke on a 1-0 lead and then coming on a strong for the back breakers after the Wings again claimed the lead in the first minute of the final period.

Bruins withstood a late rush when the Wings pulled to within one goal in the last two minutes and held on for their best showing in years.

Boston players leaped over the boards to mob their rookie goal tender, Don Simmons, who turned aside 23 shots. The Port Colborne, Ont., native replaced Terry Sawchuk at the midway mark of the regular season.

WINGS PULL GOALIE

Metro Prystay pulled the Wings to within one goal with two minutes to play. Although Detroit used an extra attacker in place of goalie Glenn Hall—leaving the net undefended—the NHL champions could not overcome the torrid Bruin forechecking.

WIN 4-3 IN OVERTIME

Rocket Fires Winner As Habs Eliminate Rangers

MONTREAL (CP)— Maurice (Rocket) Richard, Montreal Canadiens' colorful 35-year-old star, fired an overtime goal Thursday night to give Canadiens a 4-3 victory and momentarily seemed to become disorganized and bewildered at the Rangers' savage thrust.

The goal by the famous Rocket, after two minutes and 11 seconds of sudden-death overtime play, climaxed a battle in which Canadiens ran in three goals in the second period and the battling Rangers struck back with three in the third.

The win gave Montreal the best of seven semi-final series over Rangers 4-1 in games. Canadiens and Boston Bruins will open the final here Saturday.

CANADIENS FURIOUS
Both teams were geared-to break-neck pitch when they went into the overtime—Rangers rejuvenated and Canadiens seemingly furious at having their 3-0 lead wiped out.

The Rocket swept in to grab the rebound from a shot by brother Henri—the Pocket Rocket—and blasted a 10-foot backhand shot past little Gump Worsley in the New York nets.

Two goals by Jean Beliveau and a single by Floyd Curry, who got loose on a breakaway while his team was shorthanded, shot Montreal into what appeared a commanding 3-0 lead in the second period. All three goals were scored in three minutes.

The Rangers gave no warning of their big third-period drive. The crowd of 14,201 complacently expected a Canadian victory and possibly a big runaway score.
