Pearson Is Set To Launch Tour Into West and North

OTTAWA (CP) - Liberal Leader Pearson, heartened by his organizers' reports of success in last week's tour of eastern and northern Ontario, begins a far flung week-long tour of western and northern Canada today.

He flies to Winnipeg, Port Huron, Edmonton, White Horse, Prince George, and Vancouver returning to Ottawa next week end for a Saturday meeting in Brockville, Ont., centre of the sub-100,000 constituency. The sub-leads week he will swing through southwestern Ontario.

Mr. Pearson spent the week end here quietly in preparation for the big tour.

The opposition leader, campaigning to form a Liberal government in Ottawa, ended last week with an organizational bang.

It began with an old fashioned political picnic in the bosonic belt of the farm home of John Addison, 32-year-old Liberal candidate in York North riding, 20 miles north of Toronto.

ON WAGON

More than 1,000 plates of cold chicken and potato salad were served, and Mr. Pearson spoke to the crowd from a hay wagon.

The week ended with a flourish when, at Carleton Place in Lanark riding, the heart and soul of the Conservative administration and its recent higher prices for imports.

At this table, East, hoping to muddy the waters by bidding a psychic, opened with a diamond. A.C. sometimes happens in such situations, his effort boomeranged when the American North-South pair, Martin Cohen and H. Sanborn Brown of Detroit, were stirred into bidding and making a slam.

At no other table was a slam bid, and at no other table were more than eleven tricks made. The usual contract was spades or notrump.

Brown doubled a diamond and Cohen showed a strong hand by cuebidding diamonds. Brown jumped to three spades in response to indicate that he was more than an ordinary double and Cohen, disatisfied with spades, cuebid diamonds again, requesting Brown to choose between two contracts.

Brown, showing complete faith in partner, bid four hearts, and furthermore opened on a trump suit, when Cohen carded a West led a diamond and a diamond had no chance to go and he tried to make the usual contract. He cashed the A-K of diamonds and then ruffed a diamond with the ace of trump.

Next he drew four rounds of trumps, discarding two clubs from his hand, and then led a spade from dummy and finesse. He was stalling against the possibility that East might have four spades to the Jack.

The ten lost to the Jack, but that was the only trick taken by the defense.

Brown would have gone down if he had drawn trumps at once, or attempted to ruff a spade in dummy, or attempted to break the spades 3-2. He gained a vital trick by ruffing a diamond in his hand.

STEEL OUTPUT Decline Slows U.S. Reports

CLEVELAND (AP) - The rate of decline in steel production is diminishing as producers look to new orders at a steady pace, Steel magazine reported Saturday.

Only minor weekly fluctuations in output are likely over the next several weeks, the metalworking weekly said. It added that production this week will be slightly less than the estimated output of 1,630,000 tons last week.

The magazine said steel output in May will be about 7,500,000 tons, compared with 9,300,000 tons in April, and the June output will be about 7,000,000 tons. Production during the second quarter is expected to be about 23,700,000 tons, compared with 26,600,000 tons in the first three months of 1962.

With customers continuing to trim inventories, there was almost no chance for a major pickup in steel demand before August. It would take steel users 90 to 120 days to liquidate an inventory surplus of 3,500,000 tons.

An increase in housing starts and construction awards compared with last year and near record new car sales in April were among factors that have kept steel consumption at a high level.

Foreign steel producers were trying to increase export sales by cutting prices of some items.
