# New Crown Company In N.S. To Promote Industry

HALIFAX (CP) — The Nova Scotia government Wednesday formed a new Crown company and handed it sweeping powers to carry out its sole task of bringing new industries into the province.

Ten provincial businessmen of varied interests were molded into Industrial Estates Ltd., and told they could work without government interference to "encourage promotion, expansion, diversification and development of industrial activity in Nova Scotia."

How they go about it is up to them.

They start off with a grant of "roughly \$50,000" from the government and can use their own methods to attract new secondary industry and assist established industries. The government would step in only when an existing firm is endangered by a new one.

**WORK WITH APEC**  
Premier R. L. Stanfield, who announced the new company as "a distinct enterprise, sound and concrete," said he expected Industrial Estates Ltd., to work closely with the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council which is trying to do the same job on a regional basis. But unlike A.P.E.C. this new firm will be financed wholly by the government.

But apart from this financial arrangement, the executive of industrial estates will be in complete control of its operation. Mr. Stanfield said it will "operate independently of government direction and interference." It will make its own staff appointments, select its own office site and decide on internal policy.

Trade Minister E. A. Manson, a director of the new firm, said a general manager would be appointed "shortly."

The broad charter handed the

company says, in effect, that it can acquire lands in the province for developments; it can build factories for lease or sale; it can provide services such as power, water, sewage and roads; it can lend money for machinery, and, generally, "the company will assist, by all means at its disposal any suitable industry in any or all phases of its operations where such assistance is deemed advisable or necessary."

**YEARLY REVIEW**  
A review of the firm's operation will be tabled in the Legislature each year and the house will vote funds for new projects it will outline. Mr. Manson will be the legislative representative in the

firm.

Dr. H. L. Enman, former board chairman of the Bank of Nova Scotia who now lives at Ingonish, will become chairman of the board. Board president will be Frank H. Sobe, mayor of Sclartown, president of the Sobe Grocery chain and a Dosco director. Its secretary-treasurer will be Harold J. Esau, Halifax chartered accountant.

Other board members are: C. G. MacLennan, Truro Creamery president; D. F. Arhald, former Truro chartered accountant and now a Pt. Williams poultry farm owner; J. C. Jackeen, Halifax financier; T. H. Coffin, Halifax barrister; S. W. Kenney, Yarmouth contractor; Clifford LeCoeur, business manager of the Cape Breton Post and Mr. Manson.

## U. K. Chief Of Air Staff Is Visiting Canada

The Chief of the Air Staff of the Royal Air Force, Air Chief Marshal Sir Dermot Boyle, GCB, KCB, AFC, is to visit Canada as a guest of the R.C.A.F. He will fly to Ottawa from the U.K. September 26 aboard a Comet 2 of 216 squadron, R.A.F. Transport Command, and after visiting at several points in Eastern Canada will proceed to the United States.

While in Canada Air Chief Marshal Boyle will have discussions with Air Marshal Hugh Campbell chief of the Air Staff of the R.C.A.F. and with senior officers at A.F.H.Q. He will also visit Air Defence Command Headquarters at St. Hubert, P.Q. and the AVRO Aircraft Ltd., and Orenda engine plants in Toronto.

The R.C.A.F. has placed an aircraft at his disposal during his stay in Canada and it will fly him to Westover Air Force Base, Mass. on September 29. At the invitation of General Thomas

## Fisheries Act Cases Heard

A number of prosecutions under section 3B of the 1957 fishery regulations were dealt with by Magistrate R.S. Hinton at Alberton yesterday.

A Campbellton lobster packer was fined \$35.00 and costs for possession of 46 undersized lobsters and a lobster dealer from the area was given a similar fine for possession of 87 undersized lobsters.

A party from Howard's Cove was fined \$35.00 and costs for possession of 87 undersized lobsters.

A fisherman from Pheasant Shore was fined \$35.00 and costs having 39 undersized lobsters and a Milmegash fisherman was fined \$13.00 and costs for possession of 13 lobsters.

A second Milmegash fisherman was fined \$35.00 and costs

for possession of 278 undersized lobsters.

A charge of obstruction against a fisherman from Campbellton was adjourned to Summerside on Oct. 10th and a charge of possession of ten short lobsters against a St. Louis fisherman was adjourned to Alberton on Oct. 16.

A man from Tignish was fined \$25.00 and costs for possession of liquor not purchased from a vendor and an Alberton resident was fined \$5.00 for operating a motor vehicle not properly equipped with lights, brakes, etc.

Two persons from Waterford were convicted of assault under the Criminal Code and each fined \$25.00 and costs and bound over to keep the peace for one year.
